This is a Picnic which is held once a year through the generotaty of Mr. J.B.O'Connell, and it is supposedly for the Orphanages only.

However, last year and again this year there was a crowd of some 1000 or more children who presented themselves and were also let in, and they were very hard to manage.

Might I suggest that this memorandum be given to the permanent officials, so that in future years they can make some satisfactory arrangements. I am sure that the Boy Scouts Association would be glad to provide some of the senior scouts to help with the children and would suggest that some system be provided to keep the children under control.

PICNIC NAMES OF HIS PARTY

J. D. O'Connell Will Give Children's Picnic on Friday Afternoon-Interesting Interview With Orphan's Friend.

J. D. O'Connell, "the picnic King," now paying his second visit to Halifax in a period of nine or ten years—although thanks to his munificence, the picnics have been annual features during those years—made this morning all arrangements for the picnic this year—and it promises to be a record breaker. It for the picnic this year—and it promises to be a record breaker. It will be held from two to five o'clock Friday afternoon in the Public Gardens, and all arrangements for the transportation of the children have been consummated. The Nova Scotia Light and Power Company will provide without charge cars for the children at St. Joseph's Orphanage, the Monastery of the Good Shepherd and the Protestant Orphanage. Pender's bus will convey those at the City Home and the Jost Mission, and the Three S Taxi those at the Children's Hospital who are in physical condition to join the merry party.

VIEWS ON CIVILIZATION

MR O'Connell, who is a guest at the Lord Nelson Hotel, spoke lightly there this morning, when interviewed, of "home"—although he has no less than three "stopping places" in a world which he does not think has any right to speak of itself as "civilized." "I never speak of our 'civilization' but in sarcasm,' he said. "I call the present socalled 'civilization' in which thousands are starving while plenty abounds just savagery." Incidentally he remarked that "Heaven is his home" but the three stopping places enroute to which reference has been made are Sussex, in his native province of New Brunswick, in summer; Miami, Florida, in the spring and Fall, and Hatuey, Camaguey, Cuba, in the winter. ONE HUNDRED CITIES

MR. O'Connell who has been giving pienies for sixty years, began them on the handsome capital of eight cents—earned by himself. Now, one hundred cities of which Hallfax is one has each its fund created by him, and averaging \$10,000, which it holds on the condition that two-thirds of the interest is to be used

KING annually for picules for orphan children, and the remaining third for gifts of cash to them. Moreover he has fed thousands of people in the Province of Camaguey, and is still feeding the remnant left by the deadly cyclone which visited it last spring.

HOW IT BEGAN

A THOUSAND papers all over the North American Continent have told the story of the beginning of the picnics—thirty years ago Mr. O'Connell experienced a profound sorrow—the death of his wife and child, and it apparently was an experience which served to deepen his interest in all childhood, and stimulate his generosity. This is only the second time in nine or ten years that he has come to Halifax for the annual picnic, but every year, as certainly as summer came round, his picnic fund made hundreds of little people riotously happy. He has seen well to it that they should not be overlooked. However, they will give him a wholehearted welcome—they think it perfectly jolly to have "the founder of the feast" with them, and the 1933 picnic is really going to be a record breaker.

MAKES ARRANGEMENTS

THIS morning Mr. O'Connell was at the City Hall perfecting ark rangements for the outing—he went over to the Public Gardens last evening for the Show by the Elks in aid of Rainbow Haven, which has always had a warm place in his heart. This morning he inquired particularly after Farmer Smith, having not known that she was abroad. He is apparently in collusion with the Weather Man who has certainly done things handsomely for his stay thus far. Obviously his splendid part of "The Orphans' Friend" agrees with him—he is looking very well indeed, and apparently is as keen over the coming picnic as the smallest boy in the Orphanages.
