




Board of Police Commissioner's Dashboard – February 26th, 2018

Crime Stoppers - January - December 2016 - 2017



The graph shown represents crimestoppers tips received by both HRM policing agencies and not ones that may have been received by Fishery Enforcement, SPCA, Fuel & Tobacco Compliance etc. occurring within HRM. A +12% increase in crimestoppers tips was experienced in the 2017 calendar year within HRM when compared to 2016. In 2016, HRM police made 30 arrests as a result of the tips received, in the 2017 calendar year 28 arrests were made or a -7% decrease. In 2017 a +21% increase in the number of cases cleared within HRM over the same period in 2016. Tipsters received a total of \$6,980 in 2017 and \$8,200 in 2016 or a decrease of -15%. ■ In HRM total Property/Drugs recovered as a result of Crimestoppers were valued at \$129,400 in 2017 or an increase of +41% over 2016. ■
