
Starting a new month with a nation-wide celebration is a great way to ring-in the summer!

VEHICLE / PEDESTRIAN COLLISION STATS



Working together to keep our communities safe.

Halifax Regional Police (HRP) and Halifax District RCMP release a monthly vehicle / pedestrian collision report to provide police and citizens with more contextual information on this issue.

Ninety-one vehicle/pedestrian/bicycle collisions have been reported since January 1, 2018. Of the 91 collisions, 12 involved a bicycle. The remaining 79 were vehicle/pedestrian collisions, with 86 pedestrian victims. This represents a decrease of five incidents (5.95%) over the same time period in 2017.

For January 1- May 31, 2018, 60.76 per cent (48 incidents) of vehicle/pedestrian collisions occurred in crosswalks as compared with 70.24 per cent (59 incidents) reported during this period in 2017.

\$25,000 RAISED FOR DARTMOUTH NORTH COMMUNITY FARM



Thanks to numerous corporate and community volunteers, the annual Garden Party raised \$25,000 for the Dartmouth North Community Food Centre's community farm. Roxanne Manning, Executive Director, explained that a 20,000-square foot field was transformed to a working community farm in just three years. It is a project founded in partnership with Community Food Centers Canada. The Centre is the sixth in Canada and the first in Atlantic Canada.

With funding raised, the farm will be able to grow 4,000 lbs. of produce this summer. This year's Garden Party resulted in:

- three new community plots
- three standing beds (accessible)
- six flower boxes for cut flowers to display during mealtimes/other programs
- 16 new take me boxes, located on the perimeter of the farm to encourage community members to help themselves to fresh produce
- nine rows of beans and seven rows of cukes and zukes planted

 "Barn raising" - the walls of a new minibarn were raised.

Over 200 volunteers are engaged during the growing season. Produce from the farm is an important source of fresh food for the individuals and families who participate and volunteer at food center programs. The Dartmouth North Community Food Centre is a place where the community comes together to grow, cook, share and advocate for healthy food.

UDPATED SHUBIE PARK TRAIL GUIDE NOW AVAILABLE



A huge thank-you to the Shubenacadie Canal Commission and HRM staff for their support in creating the updated trail guide for your convenience.

Shubie Park is located between Lake Mic Mac and Lake Charles on the Shubenacadie waterway used for centuries by the native Mi'kmaq. The land was once the personal wood lot for King George III that provided masts for the Royal Navy. It is now a 40-acre urban park. The trails run along the National Historic Civil Engineering site, the Shubenacadie Canal system.

Come on in for a visit in the peaceful year-round retreat provided by Shubie Park's urban forest!

DISTRICT FUNDS 2018/19

Each district in HRM receives funds for two accounts every fiscal year that are governed by two separate policies: a) The <u>District Activity</u> Fund, b) The <u>District Capital Fund</u>.

The District Activity Fund, often called The Discretionary Fund, is designed to fund smaller-scale community events and activities; or, to provide funding for local organizations. Recipients must be a charity or local non-profit community group, or a special event.

CHANGES TO HALIFAX TRANSIT ROUTES 16 AND 52 EFFECTIVE AUGUST 20, 2018

The next batch of transit changes related to the Moving Forward Together Plan will go into effect August 20, 2018. Although mainly focused on Clayton Park and Timberlea areas, these changes will impact a substantial portion of the network including parts of our district 6. Routes affected in District 6 include Routes 16 and 52.

Route 16 Parkland will be replaced by the new Local Route 39 Flamingo.

Route 52 Crosstown will be replaced by the new Route 3 Crosstown, with an increased frequency on the Route 64 covering northern parts of Burnside on weekdays.

There are many benefits to having an "<u>urban</u> <u>forest</u>" as trees: improve air quality, provide energy moderation (shade in summer, sunlight in winter), aids temperature management (shade and large quantities of water transpired on a daily basis helps cool the air), increase property value (up to 25%) and aesthetics, deters noise pollution (buffer city noise pollution), aids storm-water reduction, wildlife habitat, physical and psychological well-being.


