## <u>ORIGIN</u>

Street naming and renaming requests submitted through corrections exercises from November 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017.

## **LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY**

Halifax Regional Municipality Charter, s.323 "The Council may... (c): by policy, name or rename any street or private road;"

By-law C-300, Respecting Civic Addressing

Administrative Order #29, Respecting HRM Civic Addressing Policies

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Halifax Regional Council adopt the proposed amendments to Administrative Order 29 Respecting HRM Civic Addressing Policies as set out in Attachment A of this report in order to approve:

- 1. the naming of one new private lane as identified in Attachment A and Map 1; and
- 2. the naming of two public streets as identified in Attachment A and Map 2; and
- 3. the renaming of a portion of Moose River Road to Mooseland Road as identified in Attachment A and Map 3.

### BACKGROUND

The *Halifax Regional Municipality Charter* allows Regional Council to name and rename any street or private lane by policy. In accordance with the *HRM Charter*, Council has adopted Administrative Order 29, Respecting HRM Civic Addressing Policies and By-law C-300, Respecting Civic Addressing. Regional Council officially approves all new street names for public streets and private lanes.

### **Civic Addressing By-law and Policy**

The Civic Addressing By-Law (C-300) requires that all names must be approved in accordance with the Civic Addressing Policy. Schedule A of the Policy contains the guidelines that must be followed for all new street or lane names (see Attachment C). Names are required for those streets or lanes which are submitted through:

- a) the subdivision process for new public streets and new private lanes and;
- b) the application process for existing un-named private lanes.

The Civic Addressing By-law defines a private lane as any street, road or travel way which serves three or more structures or facilities and is not owned by Halifax Regional Municipality or the Province of Nova Scotia. Therefore, all private lanes providing access to three or more structures or facilities must be named.

Section A4 of the Street Name Guidelines (Schedule A of Admin Order 29) states that no double-barreled names (names containing two words) shall be permitted except for HRM place names listed in the Nova Scotia Gazetteer or approved heritage names. Admin Order 46, Asset Naming Policies outlines the process by which public streets can be approved as heritage names. Therefore, private lane names shall be approved by Regional Council as part of the street naming process. These names are evaluated using the criteria approved through Admin Order 46.

#### DISCUSSION

The following lists of street names have been reviewed in keeping with HRM's Civic Addressing Policies and By-law. Staff advises that all the proposed names are consistent with the Policies and By-law. Attachment B provides a more detailed discussion on each recommendation, including an evaluation of the names in relation to the Policies and By-law. Therefore, it is recommended that Regional Council approve all names, as contained in Attachment A.

#### **ALTERNATIVE**





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

1. Schedule C is amended by adding the following row after the row starting "Billard" and before the row starting "Birdseye":

## Attachment B: Project Details of Proposed Street Renaming and Naming

## 1. Private Lane Namings:

a) Billybell Way, Mooseland, Private Lane Naming

Reason for the naming:	This private lane is being named as there are currently six structures on the driveway. A map of the proposed Billybell Way is included as Map 1.
<u>Civic Addressing</u> <u>By-law/Policy:</u>	As per section 3(h) of the Civic Addressing By-law a private road means any street, road or travel way which serves three or more structures or facilities and is not owned by HRM or the Province of Nova Scotia. There will be three (3) structures on this lane and in accordance with Policies, any lane providing access to three or more structures shall be named and the structures addressed accordingly.
HRM Civic Addressing Public Safety Committee:	The Committee does not provide recommendations on private lane namings.
Proposed Name:	Billybell Way- This name was suggested by the staff at the gold mine, honoring the miner, Billy Bell. This name meets the street naming criteria laid out in the Policies.
Recommendation:	In accordance with the By-law and Policies civic addressing staff recommends that the un-named lane way to these structures, as shown in Map 1, be named Billybell Way.

## 2. Public Street Namings:

## a) Magill Road, Moose River Gold Mines

Reason for the naming:	This public street was created through a Provincial Government realignment project (Map 2).
<u>Civic Addressing</u> By-law/Policy:	Halifax Regional Municipality's Charter allows for Regional Council to name and rename any street or private road in accordance with the Civic Addressing Policies as submitted through the subdivision process for new public streets and new private roads
HRM Civic Addressing Public Safety Committee:	The Committee does not provide recommendations on new public street names.
Proposed Name:	Magill Road - This name was suggested by the province and commemorates Herman Russell Magill, a miner who died in the disastrous collapse in 1936. This name meets the street naming criteria laid out in the Policies.
Recommendation:	In accordance with the By-law and Policies, civic addressing staff recommends that the proposed public street, as shown on Map 2, be named Magill Road.

## b) Scadding Road, Moose River Gold Mines

Reason for the naming:	This public street was created through a Provincial Government realignment project (Map 2).
<u>Civic Addressing</u> <u>By-law/Policy:</u>	Halifax Regional Municipality's Charter allows for Regional Council to name and rename any street or private road in accordance with the Civic Addressing Policies as submitted through the subdivision process for new public streets and new private roads
HRM Civic Addressing Public Safety Committee:	The Committee does not provide recommendations on new public street names.
Proposed Name:	Scadding Road - This name was suggested by the province and commemorates Alfred Scadding who survived the mine collapse of 1936. This name meets the street naming criteria laid out in the Policies.
Recommendation:	In accordance with the By-law and Policies, civic addressing staff recommends that the proposed public street, as shown on Map 2 be named Scadding Road.

## 3. Public Street Re-Naming:

## a) Moose River Road (portion of), Moose River Gold Mines

Reason for the naming:	A recent realignment of the Moose River Road, Mooseland Rd and Moose River Gold Mines Road has created a continuity issue with the current street configuration. The new configuration is such that Mooseland Road and Moose River Road now travel as a continuous street (Map 3).
<u>Civic Addressing</u> <u>By-law/Policy:</u>	Policy A8 of the Civic Addressing Policies requires a continuous street to have one name throughout its length. Policy 6(c) also states that when considering renaming a public street or private road, the proposed solution needs to address public safety concerns and have regard for the number and type of businesses affected and potential costs to owners/occupiers and also minimize the confusion created for emergency and other municipal services, commercial delivery services and the travelling public by renaming the street. Continuous streets that cross multiple community boundaries may have multiple names, so long as the name change occurs at a boundary and the change of street name is posted as a banner underneath the community sign.
HRM Civic Addressing Public Safety Committee:	The Committee has confirmed that the proposed configuration is in keeping with the Civic Addressing Policies and addresses public safety concerns. They have directed staff to rename.
Proposed Name:	Mooseland Road
Recommendation:	In accordance with the By-law, Policies and Standard Procedures, the Civic Addressing Public Safety Committee recommends that the portion of Moose River Road as shown in Map 3 be renamed Mooseland Road and signed appropriately.

# Schedule A Street Naming Guidelines

## **General Principles**

<u>Uniqueness -</u> there should be no duplication of names.

<u>Distinctiveness</u> - names that sound very similar should be avoided in order to avoid diction problems when people are making emergency calls under stress

<u>Continuity</u> - a road running in one direction should have one name only and should have the same name throughout its entire length.

## Guidelines

## **Street Name Characteristics**

- A1. No name shall be duplicated including similar names that are differentiated by street type.
- A2. No name shall sound like an existing name.
- A3. No name shall contain numbers, special characters, decimals, hyphens, apostrophes, periods, or punctuation of any kind.
- A4. No double barreled names shall be permitted except for HRM place names listed in the Nova Scotia Gazetteer or approved heritage names.
- A5. No streets names shall incorporate product, trademark or copyright names.
- A6. No name of more than 10 characters in length shall be permitted where the street type is more than 2 characters in length and no name of more than 11 characters in length shall be permitted where the street type is 2 characters in length except for HRM place names listed in the Nova Scotia Gazetteer or approved heritage names.

## **Street Network Considerations**

- A8. Continuous streets shall have one name throughout their entire length.
- A9. No street name shall be continued through a right angle turn.
- A10. A continuous street intersecting the same collector road more than twice shall be given a different name.

- A11. The same name shall not be used at both ends of a loop road if the middle portion of the road has not been taken over by the Municipality.
- A12. A cul-de-sac shall have a different street name from its cross road.

## Water Access

A13. Where access to a property is by water only, the street name shall be deemed to be the name of the island or waterbody as listed in the Nova Scotia Gazetteer.

## Heritage Names

- A14. The use of heritage names shall be encouraged.
- A15. All street names for the community of Bedford (Municipal District 21) shall conform with the former <u>Town of Bedford Street Naming Policy (1987)</u><sup>1</sup>.

## Theme Names

A16. Where street names in a neighbourhood are based on a specific theme, the name of all new street within the neighbourhood shall be consistent with the theme.
