
- The Nova Scotia Heritage Property Act does not prohibit applications for registration by persons other than the property owner.
- There are several rare examples of such applications but typically applications are initiated by the property owner.
- In this case, the property owner has been notified of the application and has noted their objection to registration.
- On November 27, 2017, the Province issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the redevelopment of the Dennis Building site. The evaluation and awarding process for this RFP is still ongoing.






1878 Hopkins Atlas - after the redevelopment in 1863.






