### NEW TAXI LEGISLATION

The new taxi by-law and administrative order are now in effect. On Saturday, September 28, the taxi zones that previously restricted pick ups and drop offs were eliminated. Taxis are now permitted to pick up and drop off passengers anywhere in the municipality.

Some of the other changes include:

- License cap increase: The number of owner licenses has increased from 1,000 to 1,600. Those drivers currently on the wait list will be offered a taxi owner’s license in order. This process is expected to take a number of years before the wait list is exhausted.
- Mandatory training: Drivers are now required to complete mandatory training, including cultural sensitivity, once it becomes available. They will also be required to complet
- e a winter driving course.
- Debit, credit, and GPS requirement: Taxi owners will have six months to install these devices in their vehicles.

### MI'KMAQ HISTORY MONTH



October marks Mi'kmaq History Month, a time to commemorate the rich culture, history and heritage of the Mi'kmaq Nation. The month-long celebrations officially begin on Treaty Day. Recognized annually on October 1, Treaty Day observes the key role of treaties in the relationship

between the Nova Scotia Mi'kmaq and the Crown. This year's theme, *Year of the Indigenous Languages*, aims to establish a link between language development, peace and reconciliation.

### FUNDING FOR DARTMOUTH NORTH COMMUNITY FOOD CENTRE AND DARTMOUTH FAMILY CENTRE

The Provincial Government has announced \$100,000 in funding to improve services in Dartmouth North by bringing the Dartmouth Family Centre and Dartmouth North Community Food Centre together under one roof. The brand new Family Centre will be built adjacent to the Community Food Centre on Primrose St. The municipality may also participate in funding for this project. ### TREE WASTE DISPOSAL

The Halifax Regional Municipality is continuing to clear tree debris as a result of Hurricane Dorian. Service levels have been adjusted for debris disposal sites and curbside collection.

#### Short-term municipal sites

Effective Friday, Sept. 27 there are a total of eight free short-term debris drop-off locations throughout the municipality. These are located at:

- 2 Lyle Street, Dartmouth
- 144 Thornhill Drive, Dartmouth
- 26 Thomas Raddall Drive, Halifax
- 50 Cheviot Hill, Porters Lake
- Kinsac Ballfield (near 1703 Beaver Bank Road), Beaver Bank
- Sheet Harbour Community Centre, 183 Pool Rd, Sheet Harbour
- Lake Charlotte Boat Launch, 11475 Hwy 7, Lake Charlotte
- Peace Park, 67 Park Rd, Musquodoboit Harbour

Each location will be open 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. until Sunday, October 6<sup>th</sup>. Residents will be responsible for delivering and unloading all materials at these sites at their own risk. Note: Bags, construction debris or other waste will not be accepted at these locations.

#### Curbside collection of tree waste

Residents can continue to put up to 10 armload sized bundles of tree waste curbside until further notice as part of regular collection. No bundle of branches should exceed 75 lb (34 kg) and no individual piece be more than 4 feet long (1.2 m) or larger than 8 inches (0.2m) in diameter. This size limitation is due to what can fit in the collection vehicle and what can be processed by the equipment at our composting facilities.

### PET WASTE RECYCLING PILOT

On February 7<sup>th</sup>, 2019 I requested a staff report on options for disposal of pet waste. The report came to Regional Council last month. In recognition of the evolving waste management industry and continuous improvement, Regional Council has directed the CAO to draft a staff report exploring a pilot project for the collection of pet waste as organics in select municipal parks in 2020/21. Managing pet waste as an organic reduces waste in the landfill, as pet waste represents 8 to 12% of residential waste. For more information, [read the staff report](#).

### POST DORIAN RE-PLANTING

The Halifax Regional Municipality’s Urban Forestry Team is planning for the replanting of trees lost in Hurricane Dorian last month. Each tree that was removed will be placed on a priority list for replanting, unless there is another reason we cannot replace the tree (i.e. new utilities underground etc.) Some site may take longer due to the need to grind the stump of the old tree or construction occurring near the site but our intentions are to have them replanted in the next 2 to 3 years.

### ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

Electric vehicles are advancing as an affordable and clean method of transportation, so Regional Council has directed the CAO to report back to the Environment and Sustainability Standing Committee with both an electric vehicle infrastructure strategy and a light-duty fleet strategy, complete with budgetary considerations for installing public electric vehicle charging stations and to convert a portion of the municipal fleet to electric vehicles.

The CAO will then return to Regional Council with recommendations regarding legislative amendments that would enable the municipality to require necessary zero emission vehicle infrastructure in new developments.

## TRANSIT CHANGES

On November 25<sup>th</sup> Halifax Transit will introduce large-scale service changes in Sackville, Bedford, Dartmouth, and Halifax Mainland South as part of the Moving Forward Together Plan. These service changes are outlined in Halifax Transit’s 2019/20 Annual Service Plan, which was approved by Regional Council in April 2019. Below, you'll see brief route descriptions, schedules and maps for each new route effecting our community. Minor route adjustments are outlined as well. Explore your new route options with a route comparison table here, see detailed new route descriptions here, and find answers to frequently asked questions here.

The existing route will be changed to end at Highfield Terminal. That means it will no longer provide service to Cobequid Terminal or within Burnside Industrial Park which is what the route currently does on Saturdays and Sundays. Here is the new [Route 66 Map](#) and [Route 66 Schedule](#)

### New Local Route 87 Sackville – Dartmouth

This new local route will provide service between Sackville Terminal and Dartmouth Bridge Terminal via Sackville Drive, Dartmouth Road and Windmill Road. This route will travel on Sackville Drive and will replace service on Bedford Highway and Dartmouth Road where existing route 66 Penhorn service will be removed. ### New Local Route 64 Burnside

This new local route will provide service in the Burnside Industrial Park between the Marketplace Drive/Wrights Cove area and Highfield Terminal. Check out the new Route 64 [schedule](#) and [map](#) for more detail.

### Changed Local Route 66 Penhorn

This changed route will provide service between Gaston Road, Penhorn Terminal and Highfield Terminal via Micmac Terminal. This route will follow the same route as the existing route 66 Penhorn between these areas.

## HALIFAX TRANSIT FARE CHANGES

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents Halifax Transit fare changes are now in effect. Adult and senior conventional bus and ferry cash fares have increased by 25 cents and there will no longer be an increased fee for MetroLink routes 159 to Portland Hills and 185 to Sackville.

Halifax Transit are also running a pilot program that allows children age 12 and under to ride the bus and ferry for free. This program will run from September 30<sup>th</sup> until March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2020.

## PARK AND RIDE FEES

As transit ridership increases, Park and Ride lots are filling up. It has been brought to our attention that many non-transit users are taking advantage of the free parking and leaving little room for the people looking to take advantage of transit service. Therefore we are moving forward with investigating fees for some Halifax Transit Park & Ride locations. A staff report exploring the possibility of implementing a fee for access to some Park & Ride locations will be coming to Regional Council in the near future.

### VEHICLE PEDESTRIAN STATISTICS

There have been 141 vehicle/pedestrian/bicycle collisions reported from January- August 2019 in Halifax Regional Municipality. There were 9 collisions in July and 6 collisions in August.

### PARKING DISRUPTIONS AT DARTMOUTH GENERAL HOSPITAL

Parking improvements are underway at Dartmouth General Hospital. As this work intensifies there will be increased disruptions starting on September 30<sup>th</sup> continuing into early December.

This change involves renovations to the existing parking lot, and as a result could cause congestion and increased traffic leading to the main entrance. During this phase, parking in the main hospital lot will be decreased and an equal number of parking spaces to those impacted in the main lot will be available at 10 Acadia Street.

Please plan for extra time to park and arrive for appointments when visiting the hospital. Parking spaces nearest the entrance are reserved for the elderly, expectant mothers, and those with restricted mobility. Patients travelling with a family member or friend can be dropped-off and picked up at the covered main entrance.

### NEW CUSTOM RESCUE PUMPERS FOR HRFE



### STADIUM PROPOSAL UPDATE

A proposal for a site-specific development that includes a stadium and a commercial district was received by the municipality from Schooners Sport & Entertainment (SSE) last month. The proposal content addresses a range of topics, including, but not limited to:

- SSE partnerships (e.g. Canada Lands Company, Sport Nova Scotia)
- Design principles for design of a stadium
- Incremental benefits (e.g. residential, commercial)
- Timing of build-out for residential and commercial areas, and absorption assumptions
- Projected sales and construction value of the residential and commercial real estate in the development site
- Design and capital costs
- Land acquisition costs
- Proposed ownership structure
- Funding support SSE is seeking from the Halifax Regional Municipality
- Funding assumptions
- Funding and financing options
- Direct and indirect economic impacts (e.g. locally, provincially and regionally)
- Alignment with Council priorities

The SSE proposal assumes that some or all the funds for the municipality's financial support would be generated from a tax incremental financing (TIF) model. As part of the [Oct. 30, 2018 motion by Regional Council](#), the TIF model was identified as a potential means for the municipality to secure funding for the debt financing of a stadium.

Five funding options are outlined in the SSE proposal regarding the manner (timing, mechanism, etc.) in which the municipality may consider using the funds generated from the TIF to contribute to the stadium.

**Option #1:** Maximum Financial Contribution of \$2M Per Year Over the Term of the Loan with TIF Revenue Going Directly to SSE

**Option #2:** Upfront Cash Payment

**Option #3:** Smaller Upfront Cash Payment with Committed Cash Payments over the Term of the Loan

**Option #4:** Loan Guarantee

**Option #5:** Sliding Scale of Committed Cash Payments

Contents of the SSE proposal that have been approved by SSE for public release can be accessed [via the municipal website](#).

Over the coming months, the municipal project team will be analyzing the proposal considering planning, municipal services, impact for sports and recreation, financing and how it aligns with Council priorities and will present a report to Regional Council including evaluations on the need, cost-benefit, risk, economic impact, partnership opportunities and current cost estimates. It is anticipated the CAO's report with recommendations will be presented to Regional Council in late winter/ early spring.

A decision by Council to proceed with the proposal would require the subsequent fulfilment of several conditions set out by Canada Lands, the current land owner, before sale of the Shannon Parks site to SSE can be considered. These conditions including public engagement, approval of the concept plan, collaborating with the Millbrook First Nation and confirming our overall support for the project's benefit to the community.

### SUMMER IMPAIRED DRIVING STATISTICS

Halifax Regional Police charged 32 drivers with impaired related offences during the month of July and 33 drivers with impaired related offences during the month of August. Police received 19 calls throughout the month of July and 16 calls throughout the month of August from citizens who suspected impaired drivers. We thank citizens for calling in suspected impaired drivers and encourage citizens to call 911 immediately if you suspect someone is driving impaired.

Here are some signs of an impaired driver:

- Driving unreasonably fast, slow or at an inconsistent speed
- Drifting in and out of lanes
- Tailgating and changing lanes frequently
- Making exceptionally wide turns
- Changing lanes or passing without sufficient clearance
- Overshooting or stopping well before stop signs or stop lights
- Disregarding signals and lights
- Approaching signals or leaving intersections too quickly or slowly
- Driving without headlights, failing to lower high beams or leaving turn signals on
- Driving with windows open in cold or inclement weather

If you see a potential impaired driver, call 911, give them your location along with a description of the vehicle, including the license plate number, colour, make and model, the direction of travel for the vehicle and a description of the driver.


