# PUBLIC MEETING - RE-ZONING CONRAD QUARRY LANDS

A public information meeting will be held Wednesday February 12<sup>th</sup> at the Port Wallis United Church to discuss possible Industrial and Highway Commercial development at the Conrad Quarry Lands in Waverley. The meeting will begin at 6:00 p.m. with an open house event followed with a presentation by HRM staff at 7:00 p.m. The meeting is open to anyone who wants more information about the application or wishes to express any comments they may have.

The Conrad Quarry lands are located just north of the Montague Mines Rd/Highway 107 interchange. Rezoning this land would allow for <u>Industrial and Commercial development</u>, this public information meeting will help to identify uses that are appropriate or suitable for the site.

Your feedback would be appreciated as we consider the future use of this land.

# FUNDING FOR DARTMOUTH NORTH COMMUNITY FOOD CENTRE AND DARTMOUTH FAMILY CENTRE



The Dartmouth North Community Food Centre and Dartmouth Family Centre are fundraising to bring all the important services they offer under one roof.

Last month, I'm so pleased to say that Regional Council voted in favour of providing a special grant of \$80,000 towards this vital project. The funding contributes to a more than \$500,000 capital campaign that will improve service to low income individuals and families by bringing the Family and Community Food Centre programming together at 6 Primrose. The city's contribution will be matched by a private donor and will be used, in part, to create a new Children's Discovery Garden, adjacent to the 20,000 square-foot Community Farm. The remaining funds will be used for equipment and other program assets at the new site.


#### HELP SHAPE THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET

#### SINGLE USE PLASTICS

According to Oceans North and Ocean Conservancy's report to the G7 in 2018, 8 million metric tonnes of plastic waste enters the ocean each year. In HRM, it is estimated that we use between 125 – 208 million plastic shopping bags per year. Even though the bags can be recycled through our Blue Bag program, these bags still make up a visible portion of HRM's non-recyclable waste stream and account for over 3% of litter observed throughout Nova Scotia.

Banning plastic bags is a small step in reducing litter and ocean plastic, but it represents a larger political and cultural shift to encourage more reusable materials. Paper bags or higher quality reusable bags hold more, result in less waste and are more durable.

Nova Scotia is the third Canadian Province to ban plastic bags, Prince Edward Island became the first province to create a ban, followed by Newfoundland and Labrador. Countries like Italy, Rwanda and Kenya and the EU have all moved on plastic bag bans and Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has committed to a country-wide ban on harmful single-use plastics as early as 2021. Congratulations to Sobeys for taking leadership in implementing a ban this month!






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#### **POSSIBLE TRANSIT ROUTE CHANGES**

As part of the budget process, Halifax Transit has outlined several proposed service adjustments for routes in our area.


First, route 54 Montebello will be extended to service the Bridge Terminal and will be expanding service through the community. The route will no longer service Freeze Drive between Lexington Ave and Appian Way or Appian Way between Breeze and Columbo Drive.

Route 55 will also be adjusted. The route will no longer service Thistle Street, and instead be moved to Wyse, Alderney, King, Queen and Ochterloney to provide service to the Alderney Ferry Terminal. Service to the Portobello turning loop will be discontinued due to low ridership and the route will use Craigburn Drive instead.

Corrugated cardboard (like pizza boxes), should be cleaned, flattened and bundled with the rest of your cardboard. Cardboard is sorted and baled at our facility, then sent to processing plants to be made into recycled materials.

#### **POLICE PUBLIC MEETING**

#### **VEHICLE PEDESTRIAN COLLISSION STATS**

Halifax Regional Police and Halifax District RCMP have reported a total of 240 vehicle/pedestrian/bicycle collisions from January to December 2019 in the Halifax Regional Municipality.

Of the total collisions, 72 involved a bicycle or a scooter. The remaining 168 incidents were vehicle/pedestrian collisions, with 175 pedestrian victims. 25 incidents occurred in December. Read the full report <a href="here">here</a>.

#### FRAUDULENT CALL ALERT

Halifax Regional Police are notifying the public of a recent scam where the scammer identifies themselves as a police officer or representative of the Canada Revenue Agency and advises the victim that they have been identified as possessing fraudulent bank accounts and requests money, usually by forwarding gift card information, or converting cash to Bitcoin, to avoid prosecution.

They are told a warrant has been issued and the police may already be on their way to arrest them. No police agency, nor the Canada Revenue Agency will ever make such phone calls. Do not provide or confirm any personal information to the caller and hang up the phone.

## IMPAIRED DRIVING STATISTICS FOR DECEMBER

Halifax Regional Police charged 77 drivers with impaired related offences during the month of December.

Police received 13 calls during the month of December from citizens who suspected impaired drivers. We thank citizens for calling in suspected impaired drivers and encourage citizens to call 911 immediately if you suspect someone is driving impaired.

Here are some signs of an impaired driver:

- Driving unreasonably fast, slow or at an inconsistent speed
- Drifting in and out of lanes
- Tailgating and changing lanes frequently
- Making exceptionally wide turns
- Changing lanes or passing without sufficient clearance
- Overshooting or stopping well before stop signs or stop lights
- Disregarding signals and lights
- Approaching signals or leaving intersections too quickly or slowly
- Driving without headlights, failing to lower high beams or leaving turn signals on
- Driving with windows open in cold or inclement weather

If you see a potential impaired driver, call 911, give them your location along with a description of the vehicle, including the license plate number, colour, make and model, the direction of travel for the vehicle and a description of the driver.

#### **POLICE SERVICE REVIEW**

In 2018, Regional Council asked that Halifax Regional Police (HRP) conduct a service review of the HRP and RCMP to ensure the municipality were receiving efficient and effective policing.

The final review included 29 recommendations that Regional Council has directed staff to accept and implement the majority of these recommendations including the regular administration of the Public Attitude Survey, more efficient processes to respond to high priority calls and an increased communication between HRP and the RCMP.
