



STATEMENT OF CORPORAL/ K [REDACTED] Y, R.C.A.F. [REDACTED]

1. Q. Are you familiar with this charge against [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] in that he did create a disturbance on
shore namely by breaking one plate glass window
on the 8th May.
A. That's right, Sir. I live above the store.
2. Q. Where is this store.
A. 42 Tower Road, and these two Naval ratings were
there.
3. Q. You were above the store.
A. Yes, Sir. These boys were hammering at the door
and creating a racket and I thought I would go down
and by the time I got down the window was broke.
4. Q. What time was that.
A. About five or five-thirty.
5. Q. In the afternoon.
A. Yes, Sir.
6. Q. What happened then.
A. When I came down the window was broken so I called
the Shore Patrol and it was about twenty minutes
before they arrived and I trailed the ratings to
the golf course and the Shore Patrol picked them
up there.
7. Q. You are positive of your identification of these
ratings.
A. Yes, Sir.
8. Q. You got a good view of them.
A. Yes, Sir. They were the only two Naval ratings
in the vicinity.

9. Q. You are charged, I/Sto. [REDACTED], "Was guilty of an act to the prejudice of good order and Naval Discipline in creating a disturbance on shore namely by breaking one plate glass window on the 8th May." Is the charge correct or incorrect.

- A. Yes, Sir.

- A. It does not make sense. We went to the country to stay out of trouble. We were pretty drunk.
12. Q. This happened in the city.
- A. We were out in the country. We went to Franklyn Park so that we would not do any damage.
13. Q. It is too bad that you did not stay there. You might kept yourself out of trouble. How did you break the window.
- A. It must have been coming back, Sir.
14. Q. What time did you go out to Franklyn Park.
- A. About two-thirty.
15. Q. And it was around five o'clock that you broke the window at 42 Tower Road.
- A. Yes, Sir. I guess so.
16. Q. And from there you went to the golf club.
- A. I guess that is where we were picked up, Sir.
17. Q. What time did you leave Franklyn Park.
- A. I could not say, Sir.
18. Q. Why did you want to get into the store on Tower Road.
- A. I have no idea.
19. Q. What did you get.
- A. I did not get anything.
20. Q. Anything further you wish to say in explanation or excuse.
- A. No, Sir.





You are not obliged to say anything unless you wish to do so. But whatever you say will be taken down in writing and may be given in evidence. Understand? Do you wish to say anything?

The night I came back on board it was about 12.30 or 1 o'clock, I don't really know myself. I don't remember going back on board any sooner than 12 o'clock. We had a couple of drinks in the "Y" ~~after supper~~. that afternoon. I left the "Y" after supper and I met Able Seaman Woolton. We had some more drinks and I don't remember the rest. It was only in the morning when I came back that he told me I had some civilian gear on and asked me where I got it. I said I did not know and thought that maybe some of my friends who were in a tug and who had civilian gear, well, I thought I might have bought it from them. I passed in front of the First Lieutenant and he saw the ticket, so I was very sure it was not my friend's gear.

As far as I know I was drunk. I went into the "Y" around 6 after supper and probably picked it up from the street as there was so much gear lying around.

No man who was sober would come back on board his ship around one o'clock with civilian gear on.

Q. Did you know you were recalled to the ship?

A. No, I didn't. I was in the "Y" and there were so many people there ---

Q. Did you throw some garments out of the port hole? You need not make a statement.

A. No, I won't make a statement.

Q. Have you anything else to add?

A. If anybody threw a pair of boots at 12.30 over the side, with all the oil they get from the water and the gas, I don't think anybody could see enough to see there was a pair of Wellingtons in the water.

Q. Do you wish to call anybody on your behalf?

A. No.

For investigation re the possession of loot, namely one black leather belt, the property of H. Star & Son, on the 9th May, 1945.

Investigation in this matter heard before W.W. Balfour, A/Captin, R.C.N.V.R., Commanding Officer, H.M.C.S. "Stadacona", on the 14th May, 1945.

Statement of [redacted] [redacted], R.C.N.V.R., Executive Officer, H.M.C.S. "Stadacona".

- Q. Will you tell me what you know of this case?
- A. Yes, sir. This belt was found in this rating's locker by the Officer searching, and the rating himself states--first of all he told [redacted] he had bought it in England. However, on looking over the belt, it was seen that it had the H.Star & Company price tag on it, .65¢, and the rating changed his story before the Officer-of-the-Watch to the effect that he had picked it up just outside the Main Gate on Gottingen street, and brought it in with him, sir.

Statement of [redacted] R.C.N.V.R.

- Q. Will you tell me what you know of this case [redacted]?
- A. It is just as the Commander told you, sir, it was found in his locker. He told me he had bought it in England, but changed his tone later on when we pointed out the price tag on it, and admitted he found it outside the Establishment here, sir, and had not declared it.
- Q. Who was present when this was found?
- A. Master-at-Arms [redacted], sir.

.....

Statement of Master-at-Arms [redacted] 4 [redacted]

- Q. Master-at-Arms [redacted], will you tell me what know of this case?
- A. I did not search this rating's locker myself, sir. Acting Petty Officer [redacted] searched the locker in the presence of Lieut. Higginson and Currey. He found this belt in the locker and wasn't sure as to what steps he should take. He brought it to me for my advice. I queried the rating, and he admitted he found it outside. He was brought to "J" block and was brought up later on.
- Q. Is that the belt?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How do you identify it?
- A. By the price tag inside, and also no buckle on the belt. It has the "H.Star & Son price tag, marked .65¢.

- Q. Will you tell me what you know of this case?
A. I was searching his locker, sir, and finished his two kit bags, and went to the locker and found the belt, so I took it down, and asked where he got it, and he said he got it from home. I looked inside and there was a price mark on it, .65¢, "H. Star & Son", it had come from ashore, and he is a R.N. rating. I took it over to the Officer and showed it to him. I took his name and number, and took him to cell block.
Q. Can you identify the belt?
A. Yes, sir, .65¢ marked on the inside, from "H. Star & Son."

- Q. I am holding this investigation Able Seaman [REDACTED], and caution you that you are not required to make a statement unless you wish to do so, but further caution you that any statement you do make will be taken down in writing and may be used in evidence in subsequent proceedings. - Q. Will you tell what you know of this case?
A. I questioned this rating, sir, as to where he got the goods as shown on your desk, sir, and the rating claimed he got the badges from someone down town, couldn't remember who, someone gave them to him, and claimed the same thing of the other two articles, people gave them to him. He denied he had been into any stores. Claims the badges were given to him by the brewery, Keefe's brewery. He claims he brought them back, and I pointed out he was the receiver of stolen goods at least, and he said he had not thought of it in that way, he didn't mean to take anything.

- Q. Will you tell what you know of this case?
A. Yes, sir, ~~xxxxxxx~~ I started to search his locker, and immediately saw that blue denim jacket and those badges. I don't remember the money belt. I searched his gear thoroughly, and his kit bag and that is all I found.
Q. Who was with you when the search was made?
A. A Petty Officer, I don't know his name, sir.
Q. Can you identify these articles as the ones you took from Stoker [REDACTED]'s locker and kit?
A. Yes, sir.
Q. Are these the articles?
A. Yes, sir, that is the same, sir.
Q. Did you mark them in any way when you removed them?
A. I instructed the man to label them when I gave them to him, put the badges in the pocket.
Q. Was the rating present at the time?
A. He was lying on his bunk at the time.
Q. In what capacity were you acting?
A. Helping carry on the search in "A" block, of which I am block Officer.
Q. Was the locker locked?
A. Yes, sir, it was locked.
Q. Can you tell me what locker it was?
A. I could point it out, I am not sure of the number, sir.
Q. You are not sure of the number?
A. No, sir. It was definitely identified by two other ratings whose lockers were adjoining his, as this man's locker. They got his key from around his neck or person to open it.

- Q. This Petty Officer was the only one--he wasn't present when you found it?
- A. No, sir, there was one man with a sack collecting all the gear found, and I went out in the hallway to hunt him up, and gave it to him. There was another Petty Officer present when I found them?
- Q. You don't know who it was?
- A. I don't know his name.
- Q. Can you find out?
- A. Yes, sir.

- Q. Were you present when the locker and kit of [REDACTED] was searched on the 9th May?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. What was found in his locker?
- A. A various assortment of badges, cooks badges and Sick Berth attendant badges, and a blue denim work jacket.
- Q. Are these the articles, Can you identify them?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How can you identify them?
- A. It is the same badges I saw there, sir, a varied assortment of badges, Sick Berth and Officers' cook.
- Q. Did you take charge of the articles?
- A. No, sir, a fellow with a piece of paper marked them down.
- Q. Who was the person taking and marking them down, can you tell me?
- A. An Able Seaman, sir.
- Q. You saw these articles removed from [REDACTED]'s locker and kit?
- A. Yes, sir, from his locker.
- Q. From his locker. There was [REDACTED] at the time?

In the confusion caused by Mr. Jones' death, the matter has not been dealt with before. I am returning the articles by messenger. It should be comparatively easy to identify and trace this youth should this be considered desirable.





When questioned by the Police accused stated that he was going back to his ship with the goods.

Constable Kelly gave evidence that he had to remove accused [REDACTED] from window that had been broken by [REDACTED], he is also alleged to have been encouraging [REDACTED] to carry out the breaking of the window and the removal of the goods.

[REDACTED] Admitted in his own evidence on being present at the scene of the damage and theft, and did not deny the evidence given against him by the Police. [REDACTED] GAVE NO evidence in his defence.

Statement of Mr. [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] Jubilee Road,
Halifax, Nova Scotia.

I left home after supper, I would say it was close to eight o'clock, somewhere around there, on Jubilee Road close to Henry, 9. I then proceeded over and called for some friends on Lawrence Street and then from there; there was four of us; up Windsor St. and then down Almon St., down Agricola and then we went down Cunard Street to Gottingen St. and up as far as Gerrish and then from Gerrish I went down Gerrish to Barrington and south on Barrington St. to the factory. In the meantime I had called at several stores in making an attempt to get a loaf of bread.

That night I came to the factory and stopped where there was lights on in the factory; I saw lights and I came in and the foreman, his wife and little boy and Mrs. [REDACTED] and her son were here. Mrs. [REDACTED] was brought to the factory by the foreman and his wife as they heard on the radio that the fireworks were going to be displayed and she came here to go on the roof to see them.

We proceeded to the roof too, myself and my party at approximately ten minutes to nine. When I came down here there was a big flare off here at Pier 2, quite bright and one search light in the sky and we were sort of wondering whether they were going to have it. After we got to the roof there was one or two fireworks in different places, if I remember right there was a couple, or and then there was quite a few people on the street but at that time I did not really notice anything like roudyism or anything but then we were on the roof for a short time.

When we got on the roof, I must say I did not notice; up until that time I did not notice whether they were all service men or civilians. When I got on the roof I could see a few people on the other roofs across watching the display but there seemed to be numbers of sailors coming down in the middle of the street. We heard this shouting sort of and carrying on and then we heard glass breaking but that drew us to look over and I saw about, there would be I would say a number of parties of about 8-10-15 sailors and I think it was about the second party that went by here that broke Fraser's window across the street, we saw that. We passed the remark at the time that they were all sailors, we saw no civilians among them nor any soldiers.

When they got down about to Foran's, one or two of them spied us on the roof and they started to throw things at our building; they broke one window. Only at that time we did not see the brick but I heard it, but we saw Fraser's window break and we heard others. Then they continued, there was a number of cracks and we heard glass breaking.

After two or three of them threw stuff at us we drew back from the front in case we would get struck and it was then that I decided to turn out the lights and get out. It was after that, after this click went down that we all left the building. I went out the front door and locked up, they were still coming in clicks and there was a lot of sailors on the street at this time. The women with me were nervous.

We came in here at about, just about dusk, quarter to nine or half past eight, not very long before Mr. [REDACTED] arrived. When I arrived I was accompanied by Mrs. [REDACTED] and son, my wife and boy and we went upstairs and out on the office roof; we went up to see the fire works as we have a good view of the harbour.

We heard a lot of noise on the street and we looked over the roof and saw a gang of sailors coming on the street, they were coming down in bunches and they were yelling and shouting and one of them must have heaved a rock or something threw Fraser's window across the street and the next group that came down threw a rock to knock out the remainder of the window out and he nearly hit the proprietor. Then they threw some rocks at our building here, you could hear the panes going threw and as they continued down the street you could hear more glasssmashing.

We didn't stay very long, ten or fifteen minutes, the ladies were nervous and fearing for safety. We left to go directly to our homes. When we first came in there was a bunch of sailors and they reached their arms around some girls that were passing. We passed around Fort Needham but there was large crowds there and we went directly to the Lodge where Mrs. [REDACTED] lives.

On Monday May 7th, 1945. I was working in Dockyard when the whistles blew in the City of Halifax to celebrate the victory in Europe. At approximately 1115 I finished work and proceeded back to my block at HMCS STADACONA . I got dressed and then went ashore at approximately 1300. I was hanging around Town ~~taking~~ doing nothing in particular. Later in the evening I would say around 2115 I was at the street dance in the vicinity of Lord Nelson Hotel when I observed a friend of mine Sto.1 [REDACTED] [REDACTED] in the presence of a lady friend. M [REDACTED] A introduced me to this lady but I can't remember her name now. At approximately 2300 I went down Spring Garden Rd. to Barrington St. and observed a crowd standing around watching a car or a truck burning. I stood at corner of Barrington And Salter St. and watched it burn. At this time I did not meet anyone that I knew. I went down Salter St. and along Granville St. ~~to Prince St~~ to Sackville St. I stood there in the middle of the Road talking to a policeman who was there on duty. I was there about ten minutes looking up the street south at the fire. I then walked back to barracks with a number of men from the barracks but I didn't know any of their names. I guess it would be around Midnight when I arrived back at my block.



As soon as the ship arrives in I am going to place them in custody for questioning in this connection.




