## Judge rejects RCMP request for production order

Court rules investigation may be 'infected' with tunnel vision

A Pictou judge has denied A Pictou judge has defined an RCMP application for a production order for medical records in relation to a fatal motor vehicle crash, saying the officer has already decided who was responsible for the accident and is looking for evidence to confirm his curpling. evidence to confirm his suspi

evidence to confirm his suspi-cion that they were impaired. In a provincial court deci-sion released Friday, Judge Del Atwood said the applica-tion filed by the Mounties reveals "material ambiguity reveals material amonguity on a number of important points," including the identity of the person who was driv-ing the vehicle involved in the mishap.

"It is not clear whether the

The judge did not disclose further details about the crash in his decision, citing a need to protect the privacy interests of those involved and the right to a fair trial in the

the right to a fair trial in the event charges are laid
Atwood noted that in the officer's correspondence to the court, he asked the judge to review, authorize and fax the signed warrant to the Stellarton RCMP detachment.

"It appears that the officer labours under the misapprehension — shared by a number of policing services in this part of the province that the role of the court in the warrant-issuance process the warrant-issuance process is an automatic one, merely to rubber-stamp applications by investigative agencies," the judge said. "Not so. This is because the decision whether to issue an order or warrant

to issue an order or warrant involves the exercise of judi-cial discretion." Atwood then addressed the problems he had with the document, known as an information to obtain.

The officer declared under oath that the RCMP have oath that the RCMP have statements from witnesses identifying the operator of the vehicle and claiming that person was driving at a very high speed.

But Atwood said his re view of the ITO, which he confirmed as accurate with the prosecutor at the hearing, shows police actually have just one witness statement

identifying the driver. "From this, I draw the inference that either the ITO has failed to disclose other pertinent statements, or the ITO overstates the evidence which has been gathered by

police," the judge said. "In either case, I am led to the conclusion that the ITO does not present the court with that full-and-frank disclosure necessary ... to warrant the issuance of a production order. This would be

In the ITO, the officer then mentioned a suspicion that the driver's ability to operate the vehicle was impaired by alcohol.
"An ITO that reveals a sub-

and TIO that reveals a sub-jective suspicion only — rea-sonable or otherwise — does not pass the test," Atwood said. "This is because ... mere suspicion is not sufficient for

(production) order."

Atwood said, was the officer's statement that the medical records he was seeking would further his investigation and allow him to gather evidence to prove that the suspect was responsible for charges of im-paired driving causing death and bodily harm.

"To be sure, an investiga-tion will almost inevitably identify persons of interest," the judge said.

"However, a proper inves-tigation will not fix itself prematurely on any one person, but will seek to put theories

of liability to the test.
"Not so here, it seems. The investigator has locked on a person of interest and now

seeks to gather information, not to test and challenge the accuracy of this preliminary theory, but to nail it down. "This is dangerous terri-

tory. I say so because almost every commission of inquiry conducted in Canada into proven instances of wrongful conviction has identified investigative tunnel vision as being a major factor lead-ing to miscarriages of justice.

Tunnel vision involves focusing prematurely on a person of interest, then gathering and analyzing evidence selec-tively. Evidence that confirms the identity of the person of interest as the offender will be preserved and made prominent; evidence that might

be exculpatory will be dis-counted and written off." Atwood said he believes this investigation is "infected with that very frailty."

"The investigator does not seek to scrutinize circum-stances of ambiguity. Rather,

he has decided already who is responsible and he seeks evidence to confirm what is clearly a premature conclu-

sion. That is an improper investigative purpose." "Even if I were wrong about the factual and legal inadequacies of this ITO, I find that, exercising residual judicial discretion inherent in this process ... it would be im-proper for the court to grant the order sought where the purpose to be advanced by it would be improper. The ap-plication is denied."
