

Location





1. Age



- Originally part of the Mitchell family's 600-acre farmland estate
- In 1855, Judah Borden purchased a quarter-acre lot, which was vacant
- The deed from 1858 references a "dwelling house"

Benjamin Wier

- Controversial and successful shipping merchant
- Elected to Halifax Council in 1851 and the Nova Scotia Legislature soon after
- Political mining scandal
- Supported the Confederates during the US Civil War
- Later advocated Canadian Confederation



Archbishop Thomas Louis Connolly

- Priest of St. Mary's Church and later Archbishop of Halifax
- Advocated for Confederation and separate Catholic schools
- Oversaw church / school construction

DeWolf Family

- Longstanding presence in Bedford shipping and naval legacy
- Purchased by Harry George & Kate DeWolf in 1921
- Shipping agent and President of T.A.S. DeWolf and Son Ltd.



Vice Admiral Harry DeWolf

- Most well-known child of Harry Sr. & Kate
- One of Canada's most decorated World War II Naval Officers;
 appointed Vice Admiral due to his service
- Raised in another DeWolf home, Sullivan's House
- Captained the HMCS St. Laurence; help evacuate France
- Saved 859 passengers & crew from the SS Arandora Star
- Later captained the HMCS Haida; led several missions

4a. Architectural Merit (Construction)



- 1.5-storey wood-framed construction; that appears to sit on a masonry foundation
- Exact construction type unknown
- Displays craftsmanship and exterior finishings typically seen in vernacular buildings from this era

4a. Architectural Merit (Construction)

Very rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early	4-6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3

4b. Architectural Merit (Style)



- Built in the Classical Vernacular style (1830-1880)
- 1.5-storey dwelling has a rectangular plan, wood shingle siding, and classical features
- Character defining elements:
 - Gable roof with return eaves
 - Two hipped dormers with coupled windows
 - Window fenestration with 6-over-6 windows
 - Enclosed porch with original side doors
 - Two brick chimneys, one with clay pot

4b. Architectural Merit (Style)



B) Style	Points
Very rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early	4 - 6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3
Not rare/ common example	0

5. Architectural Integrity



- Dwelling has a good level of integrity
- Some original features, like dormers and chimneys, still exist
- Rear addition, along with southwest gable reno, are the most significant modification
- Other modifications include:
 - Modern windows installed
 - Taller, non-functional shutters installed
 - Original side porches removed





6. Relationship to Surrounding Area

- The surrounding area has lost of its historic buildings to modern development
- The dwelling is one of the oldest in Bedford
- Honeycote, and some nearby streets, partner to illustrate residential development from the mid-to-late 1800s

Recommendation

Should 1262 Bedford Highway, Bedford score 50 or more points on evaluation as a heritage property under the HRM heritage property program, the Heritage Advisory Committee recommends that Regional Council:

- 1. Set a date for a heritage hearing to consider the inclusion of the subject property in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality; and
- 2. Approve the request to include 1262 Bedford Highway, Bedford in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality, as shown on Map 1, as a municipal heritage property under the Heritage Property Act
