NORTH WEST COMMUNITY COUNCIL UPDATES

On September 13th the North West Community Council (NWCC) considered the following:

<u>Case 23495</u>: Amending Development Agreement for 3009 Highway 2, Fall River (PIDs 00526871 and 40500449): Public hearing was held and closed. **Motion passed to extend development agreement.**

<u>Case 21639</u>: Margeson Drive Master Plan -Margeson Drive and the Highway #101 Interchange, Middle Sackville – Public Participation Program.

Motion passed to create a Public Participation Committee for Case 21639.

Improvements to Lucasville – Hammonds Plains Intersection

Motion passed to request Regional Council request a staff report on the intersection of Hammonds Plains and Lucasville roads to:

- upgrade intersection to ease congestion of east / west bound traffic.
- Appropriately plan for transit
- Increase pedestrian safety

Every year on October 1, Nova Scotians mark Treaty Day to celebrate the rich history, proud culture and important contributions of Mi'kmaq people. These centuries-old treaties honour the enduring bond of friendship and respect between Nova Scotia's Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities and reaffirm the historic presence of the Mi'kmaw who have occupied the land for thousands of years.

With school now back in full swing we are reminded of the challenges that can come along with parking by-law compliance in school zones.

At the forefront of the parking rules in school zones is the safety of our children - and the safety of others, including parents dropping off their children, school bus drivers, teachers, and others who may happen to be walking or driving through the area. The rules are also in place so that buses and others can maneuver in the area as they need to.

HRM's Parking Enforcement and Compliance team have been putting a special emphasis on parking by-law enforcement in school zones this month through compliance and educational efforts.

Here are some stats provided from Parking Enforcement and Compliance from the first two weeks of this school year in HRM:

- 29 Schools on list for proactive patrol
- 54 Patrols
- 47 Tickets
- 111 Warnings

It is key for those who frequent school zones particularly parents – to be informed on how to drop off kids safely, and legally. Here are some Park Safe tips shared with me from Parking Enforcement and Compliance:



No Parking signs: This means a vehicle CAN stop in these areas to drop off and pick up school children. It does not, however,

mean that the driver can arrive 15 minutes before school is dismissed and wait for their child. In many cases, the No Parking areas around schools are for specific periods of time such as from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. No Parking areas are normally located where it is safest to momentarily stop a vehicle to drop off and pick up children.



No Stopping signs: These areas are likely to be found at intersections, school crossing guard locations or crosswalks where there is a high concentration of students crossing the street. Drivers who park in these areas are jeopardizing the safety of students walking to and from school. Your vehicle cannot park OR stop within this signage.

Stop signs: Parking within 10 meters of a stop sign is not permitted. Parking there can obstruct the view of people crossing and driving.

School Bus Zone: School bus signage must be kept clear so that children can step off the bus and onto a curb instead of exiting on the street.

Blocking driveways: Be a good neighbors. Watch out not to block entrances to garages or driveways

Double parking: Do not double park when dropping off and picking up students from school

Crosswalk: leave 5 meters between your vehicle and any crosswalk marking to ensure children can be visible when crossing the street.









A new West Bedford Park & Ride will also open requiring minor route modifications to four (4) routes to service the Park & Ride.



HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement: "The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmag people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Now, making a respectful Land Acknowledgement remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

A land acknowledgment is an important statement that acknowledges we understand the long-standing history that has brought us to reside on this land and that we seek to understand our place with that history. In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
