On October 4th the North West Community Council (NWCC) considered the following: Case 22820: Amendments to Development Agreement, Hanwell Drive (Sunset Ridge subdivision), Middle Sackville


NWCC gave Notice of Motion to consider the proposed amending development agreement to permit a multiple unit dwelling with ground floor commercial space at Hanwell Drive, Middle Sackville and scheduled a virtual public hearing for November 8th.

Case 23556: Amendments to the Sackville Drive Land Use By-law – Access to Multi-Unit **Dwellings Across LS Zoned Properties**

NWCC passed a motion requesting the Chief Administrative Officer to commence the planning process to consider amendments to the Sackville Drive Land Use By-law to allow access to new multi-unit dwellings across lots within the LS (Large Scale Commercial) Zone.




Seaforth. These changes are part of the <u>Moving</u> <u>Forward Together Plan</u> (MFTP).





The municipality has secured 24 modular units that can provide accommodations for up to 73 individuals. One site will be in Dartmouth, and another in Halifax.

These safe accommodations will soon be available to residents experiencing homelessness; all bedrooms will have a single bed and mattress, a desk with a drawer, a locking closet, and a private bathroom with a sink, toilet, mirror, and shower.

The municipality continues to collaborate with the province, along with professional service providers and volunteers, to provide support to those experiencing homelessness in our region. In August, Regional Council unanimously approved investing up to \$500,000 towards a range of emergency accommodations for those experiencing homelessness. Further to this, Halifax Regional Municipality:

- Recently transitioned Gray Arena to a temporary emergency shelter with Out of the Cold as the service provider and funding from the province for wrap around services
- Assigned Assistant Chief of Emergency Management, Erica Fleck to a threemonth role — that began September 20, 2021 — to lead the emergency response to homelessness for the municipality
- Is hiring a coordinator for a one-year term to act as a liaison with professional service providers and ensure better aligned efforts in support of those experiencing homelessness
- Has been allocated more than \$20M through the federal government's Rapid Housing Initiative program for 137 units of new permanent, affordable housing

SACKVILLE SPORT STADIUM POTENTIAL REVITALIZATION SURVEY

The Sackville Sports Stadium was originally constructed in 1989. It is a 118,300 square-foot multi-district facility overlooking First Lake. It houses a fitness centre, two swimming pools, a skating arena, curling arena from September to March, indoor fieldhouse from April to August, two studios, Rec Zone, Cycle Zone, Training Zone, yoga studio, childcare, and meeting rooms. It offers programs and services in the areas of fitness, sport, wellness, arts, crafts, and general leisure programs, servicing Sackville and its surrounding communities.

Halifax Regional Municipality is exploring options to potentially revitalize the Sackville Sports Stadium in future years. Your useful feedback will help the municipality understand the satisfaction rates with the existing design, layout, and amenities of the Sackville Sports Stadium, and guide what renovations, additions, or amenities will be investigated should revitalization take place in the future.

These surveys are intended for those who currently use the Sackville Sports Stadium and those who may use the stadium in the future who reside in the service area of the Sackville Sports Stadium (around the communities of Sackville, Beaver Bank, Fall River, Bedford, Lucasville, and Hammonds Plains).



WINDSOR STREET EXCHANGE - FALL 2021 SURVEY

I encourage you to participate in a survey to help inform the design of the Windsor Street Exchange Redevelopment project.

The Windsor Street Exchange Redevelopment project involves the redesign of the intersection of Bedford Highway, Windsor Street and Lady

Hammond Road. Approximately 48,000 vehicles travel through this area each day, and the Windsor Street Exchange is operating above its available capacity during peak travel periods. The goal of the project is to:

- add active transportation connections and transit priority measures through the intersection
- improve the movement of vehicles and goods through the area
- improve safety for all road users.

The project team is looking for feedback from the public on the concept design options. The public may provide feedback by participating in an online survey hosted by the municipality. The feedback from this phase of engagement will be considered in the detailed design work on one of the options.



HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement:

"The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Now, making a respectful Land Acknowledgement remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

A land acknowledgment is an important statement that acknowledges we understand the long-standing history that has brought us to reside on this land and that we seek to understand our place with that history. In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
