

OVERNIGHT WINTER PARKING BAN NEW ZONES

The municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect annually from December 15 to March 31. The ban is enforced from 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. during declared weather events and snow removal operations only, including this weekend.

Stay up to date on the winter parking ban by signing up for hfxALERT will send municipal winter parking ban notices along with urgent and non-urgent notifications from Halifax Regional Police, Halifax Fire & Emergency's Emergency Management Division.

NEW: Halifax recently introduced two zones for the overnight winter parking ban:

Zone 1 - Central

Zone 2 - Non-Central. Find out what zone you're in using this interactive map.

FIREWORKS: PLEASE CONSIDER THEIR IMPACT ON YOUR NEIGHBOURS

As beautiful as they are, fireworks have an impact on our neighbors and their pets, the environment, and wildlife.

-Mental Health-

Noise from fireworks can have a long-lasting negative impact on people who suffer from mental health disorders, such as but not limited to:

- Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
- Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- Misophonia (when people experience strong discomfort, annoyance or disgust when they hear particular triggers)

-Wildlife-

The shock of fireworks can cause wildlife to flee, ending up in unexpected areas or roadways, flying into buildings and other obstacles and even abandoning nests, leaving young vulnerable to predators.

-Pets-

Fireworks can be beautiful to us but are *terrifying* to them! Many animals have sensitive hearing and associate loud noises with danger. Whenever possible, please notify your neighbours when you plan to use consumer fireworks.

Keep pets inside and comforted. If outside, have your pets securely on lead/leash. When scared, pets are known to run off and get lost in the night if not secured.

-Environment-

Fireworks cause an abundance of litter that can scatter for kilometers, polluting neighborhoods, waterways and green spaces.

-Safe use of Fireworks-

If you must use fireworks, you must abide by burning and noise by-laws, which means fireworks may only be used during certain days and times. Fireworks are only permitted on New Year's Eve, Canada Day, Natal Day, and on recognized religious holidays.

Consumer fireworks do not require a permit on your own property.

-Questions & Concerns-

For general, non-urgent questions or concerns regarding the use of fireworks in our municipality, please contact **311.** If you witness illegal fireworks use, **please call 911.**

MODULAR HOUSING UPDATES

Municipal updates are issued on a weekly basis to keep us all informed about the status of the emergency accommodations that the municipality is helping to provide for unhoused individuals. There will be two modular housing unit sites: Church Street (downtown Dartmouth) and Cogswell Street (Centennial Pool parking lot in Halifax).

Exact timing for occupancy at both the emergency accommodations sites is dependent upon the Province of Nova Scotia, which is responsible for determining placement of individuals and providing wrap-around services onsite through a service provider.

At the Dartmouth modular site, occupancy was approved for the four modular bedroom units (total capacity 24 persons) on January 13; the provincial service provider (Out of the Cold) facilitated placement of individuals on January 16. Most individuals who have been accommodated at the Gray Arena have moved to the Dartmouth modular site. Alternate accommodations have been provided by the province to those individuals at the arena who did not relocate to the modular units.

With the Dartmouth site now occupied, the design and construction team has shifted focus to completing the **Halifax modular unit site**. Nine units will be installed on a portion of the Centennial Pool parking lot accessed from Cogswell Street. This site will be able to accommodate 38 individuals. It is anticipated the civil site work for the modular units will begin the week of February 7.

Crisis Accommodations Funding

• The municipality has provided some of the crisis accommodation funding approved by Regional Council to a coalition of 11 community service providers for hotel stays to support those experiencing homelessness. In conjunction with service providers, the municipality is also directly covering the cost of hotels rooms for some individuals. Between September and the first week of January,109 people accessed hotel rooms via this funding, for a total of 2,496 nights.

During cold weather events, the municipality has been continuing to support Nova Scotia's Department of Community Service to address homelessness by providing access to municipal facilities as emergency shelters such as the George Dixon Centre in Halifax. There are also community-run warming centres located at St. Matthew's Church (Barrington Street) and the Sackville Area Warming Centre (located at Gateway Community Church).

The Province announced it will be working with HRM and the Government of Canada to create 65 additional supportive housing options. The former Travelodge hotel in Dartmouth is being converted to supportive housing units for people who are chronically unhoused. This is in addition to both modular housing sites that the municipality has already funded (Dartmouth and Halifax). More information can be found here.

If you see an individual in need of shelter during extreme weather and they have requested help, please call 311 or 211 to connect them with service providers and ensure help is on the way. But if their life is in danger, please call 911.

2022-23 COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM

The Program provides annual cash grants to registered non-profit organizations and charities located throughout the Halifax region. There are two types of grants: a project grant of up to \$5,000 and a capital grant of up to \$25,000. The grants can aid specific types of projects in numerous categories, from Arts and Crafts, Diversity and Inclusion, Recreation and more.

SKATING ON OUR FROZEN LAKES & PONDS

HRM Parks staff have now started ice testing on various lakes across the municipality. Most of the lakes are now ice covered, however some lakes have not formed ice to the recommended thickness of 15 cm required for safe use. The Canadian Red Cross recommends that ice be at least 15 centimeters thick for individual skating, and at least 20 centimeters thick for group skating.

Parks staff will continue to monitor, test and update the ice thickness table as conditions permit. Be sure to check the updates for your local lake here before heading out.

Please note that only measurements over 15cm will be posted, and not all of the lakes have been tested.

RCMP TALK SNOW MOBILE SAFETY

The Nova Scotia RCMP would like to remind snowmobile enthusiasts about the importance of safety when on the trails this season.

Here are some tips to keep in mind before you head out on the trails:



- Always check the weather conditions before you leave.
- Never ride alone.
- Take a cell phone in case of emergency.
- Have a map and take note of shelters available along the way.
- Let someone know your plans, where you are going, the route you plan on taking and the time you expect to return.
- Always wear protective clothing, including a helmet, gloves and eye protection.
 Wear layers of clothing to keep warm and dry.
- When possible, avoid crossing bodies of water. If you are crossing bodies of water, never ride in single file and wear a life jacket over your outer clothing.
- Ride at a reasonable rate of speed. Know your riding partner's driving limitations as well as your own and operate only at a speed that allows you both to remain in total control of your snowmobiles.
- Ride sober. Don't drink or consume drugs before or while snowmobiling.
- When venturing into remote areas, snowmobilers should be alert and take all precautions necessary, as help could be several hours away.

CITIZENS ON PATROL

The RCMP has shared that its community-based crime prevention initiative, Citizens on Patrol, is seeking new volunteers province-wide to help keep



communities safe. This successful program has been running for decades.

The Citizens on Patrol Program is a partnership between police and volunteers that helps ensure the safety of homes and communities. COP volunteers are trained by the RCMP and are the eyes and ears of their communities.

Volunteers contribute a minimum of four volunteer hours each month. COP members make observations and take notes of areas visited throughout their communities and should suspicious or unlawful activity be observed, RCMP dispatch is contacted and details of the suspicious or unlawful activity is reported for appropriate police response.

In order to become a COP volunteer, you must:

- Be at least 19 years of age.
- Possess a valid driver's license and maintain a good driving record.
- · Complete an interview.
- Pass the security screening required by the RCMP.
