HALIFAX & WEST COMMUNITY COUNCIL UPDATES

At the February 22nd meeting of the Halifax & West Community Council (HWCC), consideration was given to the following:

Case 20226: Land Use By-law amendment to reduce parking requirements for community centres in Timberlea, Lakeside, Beechville

Public hearing held and closed. HWCC approved the amendment to create new parking requirements specifically for recreation facilities and community centres, which would require 1 space per 500 square feet (46.5 m2) of gross floor area. This is an 80% reduction over the existing standard for general institutional uses. Under existing parking standards, the proposed MARCH 2022 recreation centre would need 307 spaces. The proposed parking standards would require 62 parking spaces.



DISTRICT BOUNDARY RESIDENT REVIEW PANEL



A district boundary review is required in 2022; changes coming from this review will not come into effect until the 2024 Municipal Election.

However, residents can apply now to join the Boundary Resident Review Panel. The Panel will serve as a key component for the <u>2022</u> <u>District Boundary Review process</u>.

The 2022 District Boundary Review process includes:

✓ Phase 1, which will determine the size of Council and its governance structure; and,

✓ Phase 2, which will set specific district boundaries.

The District Boundary Resident Review Panel, supported by municipal staff, will begin their work in Phase 2. The Panel will consider how to draw boundaries of municipal districts, based on the recommendations from Phase 1.

It is recommended that applicants have professional expertise in the field of urban planning, municipal governance, public policy and/or political science.

Applications are due by Monday, March 7, 2022.

BUDGET 2022/23



It's Budget season once again. Currently, each of the municipality's business units are presenting their proposed business plan and budget to Regional Council. We are also listening to members of the public who wish to provide input on a variety of topics.

Regional Council will debate budget changes and refer them for final decision on Wednesday,

PROPERTY TAX REBATE FOR SENIORS



The Property Tax Rebate for Seniors helps low-income seniors with the cost of municipal residential property

taxes. Rebates are 50% of what you paid on last year's property taxes, up to a maximum of \$800.

The program is open for applications from July 1st to December 31st. Applications may be obtained from Access Nova Scotia or local MLA offices closer to the program opening of July 1st.

Senior's must meet the following criteria to qualify for the rebate:

- municipal residential property taxes are paid in full
- lived at the property as your primary residence in 2021
- receive or are eligible to receive the <u>Guaranteed Income</u> <u>Supplement</u> (GIS) or the <u>Allowance</u> from Service Canada

If you are not currently receiving the GIS or Allowance, check with <u>Service Canada</u> to see if you are eligible.

SENIORS CARE GRANT



The provincial department of Service Nova Scotia & Internal Services is offering a new grant program on behalf of the Department

of Seniors and Long-term Care. The Seniors Care Grant will be an annual reimbursement program of up to \$500 to help cover the costs of household services. It can be used to reimburse costs for such things as snow removal, home repairs, lawn care, grocery delivery, and more. It is available to homeowners and renters.

The applicant must meet the following criteria to be eligible for the program:

- They must still reside in their home
- The property or lease agreement must be in their name or include their name
- They are 65 years of age or over
- They have an annual household net income of \$37,500 or less

Applicants can submit online at <u>www.novascotia.ca/seniorscaregrant</u> or by paper applications available at MLA offices and Access Nova Scotia Offices.

Halifax Transit has switched to an automated method for delivering service alerts. To facilitate this new functionality, a new Halifax Transit Twitter account has been created.

The new account, <u>@hfxtransitalert</u>, is fully automated and linked to the CAD/AVL solution in use at Halifax Transit (the same system that powers our <u>GTFS real-time feed</u>).



NEW TO HALIFAX?



A new website has launched to assist newcomers as they settle into life in the municipality. <u>New in Halifax</u> provides important information and resources for new residents. The website was designed as a dedicated, user-friendly experience tailored to the needs of newcomers in our communities.

Previously, the municipality provided a variety of information for newcomers on <u>www.Halifax.ca</u>, including details on assistance for refugees, transportation, education, health and safety, employment, income and taxes, and much more. *New in Halifax* is now the centralized hub for this type of information, so it's all readily available in one place.

The website is part of the <u>Halifax Immigration</u> <u>Partnership</u> (HIP) initiative, which was established in 2013 by the community partners including the Halifax Regional Municipality and is funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). HIP works with partners from many different sectors to ensure that Halifax is a welcoming place for all newcomers to live and thrive, a place in which all belong and can call home.

Local Immigration Partnerships (LIPs) strengthen the community's ability to welcome

newcomers into a place that values and embraces diversity. Today, there are more than 70 LIPs across the country.

New in Halifax will offer the ability for service providers in the HIP network to share information, resources and best practices with each other to further expand offerings to newcomers in Canada.

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PARKS AND RECREATION FEE CHANGES



On April 1, 2022 the Parks and Recreation Fee structure will be changing. These changes will affect all recreation services, programs, rentals, drop ins, voucher and memberships fees.

This does not mean prices are going up across the board; as a result of the fee structure changes that were approved by Regional Council, some fees are increasing in cost while others are staying the same or decreasing. The updated fee structure will reflect the actual cost of providing recreation services to residents.


