## 1. Age



Kaye Street after the Halifax Explosion

- Constructed from 1920 to 1921 following the destruction of much of the North End of Halifax as a result of the Halifax Explosion on December 6, 1917.
- Built to house the Kaye
   Street Methodist and Grove
   Presbyterian churches, both of which were destroyed in the explosion.





Grove Presbyterian before and after the Halifax Explosion

- Kaye Street Methodist and Grove Presbyterian destroyed in the Halifax Explosion.
- Surviving members of the two congregations began to hold services together in a temporary building.







Kaye Street Methodist before and after the Halifax Explosion

- Officially united into a single congregation, the United Memorial Church, in June, 1920.
- The building featured a number of items donated in memory of victims of the Explosion.





## 3. Significance of Builder/Architect



Andrew Cobb (1876-1943)

- The United Memorial Church building was designed by architect Andrew Cobb (1876-1943)
- Cobb studied architecture at Acadia
   University, MIT and École des Beaux-Arts
   in Paris. His work included many houses
   and major institutional buildings
   throughout Atlantic Canada.



### 3. Significance of Builder/Architect








- Cobb designed many notable buildings throughout Halifax in a range of architectural styles.
- He designed buildings throughout Atlantic Canada, including prominent university buildings at Mount Allison University, New Brunswick, and an entire mill town in Corner Brook, Newfoundland.


