NORTH WEST COMMUNITY COUNCIL UPDATES

On July 18th, the North West Community Council (NWCC) considered the following:

Case 21826: Amending Development Agreement for 771-819 Bedford Highway and 12-32 Esquire Lane, Bedford

NWCC voted to allow additional commercial uses, an expansion of the commercial area, construction of new motels and subdivision of lands for the former Esquire and Travellers Motel sites on the Bedford Highway after a public hearing was held on July 18th. <u>Case 24176: Appeal of Variance Refusal –</u> 1236 Beaver Bank Road, Beaver Bank

NWCC passed a motion to allow the developer at 1236 Beaver Bank Road to appeal a refusal of a variance request that will allow for a shipping container within the required side yard setback.

MIXED USE ZONING SURVEY

On May 17th, Regional Council passed a motion to consider changing the size thresholds for permitted commercial uses, encouraging children's recreation and other low impact commercial uses, while mitigating the higher impact commercial uses for the Mixed Use 1 Zone. Staff are seeking feedback from the communities including and surrounding Beaver Bank, Hammonds Plains, and Upper Sackville to hear your thoughts on the appropriate size of different commercial uses in the MU-1 Zone. 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EMANCIPATION DAY



AFRICAN NOVA SCOTIAN FLAG

The **red** represents blood and sacrifice.
The **gold** conveys cultural richness.
The **green** symbolizes fertility and growth.
The **black** stands for the people.

The wave in the bottom centre has a dual meaning, representing the ocean and movements as well as honouring the journey of African Nova Scotian ancestors through the middle passage during the slave trade.

On the left is half of a **stylized heart** (a version of the Sankofa symbol) with a yin and yang-like symbol embedded to represent heartbreak balanced with awareness.

The image is encompassed with an incomplete circle representing those things absent but yet to come. On August 1st the municipality joined others across the region to observe this special and important day starting with the flying of the Pan-African flag in the Grand Parade. Emancipation Day is the day when the Slavery Abolition Act of 1833 became law across the British Empire, including Canada on August 1st, 1834. On this day, the practice of slavery officially ended for millions of African people and their descendants in Canada and around the world.

Why celebrate Emancipation Day? It's an opportunity to learn more about the history of African Nova Scotian people and communities, it encourages us to continue to address and eradicate systemic anti-black racism. We need to reflect on and acknowledge our shared history of the enslavement of people of African descent in Canada. Celebrating Emancipation Day provides us with ongoing opportunities to maintain meaningful dialogue around race relations and inclusive society. Most importantly, it allows every citizen to begin to take action.

HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement: "The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmag people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Now, making a respectful Land Acknowledgement remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

A land acknowledgment is an important statement that acknowledges we understand the long-standing history that has brought us to reside on this land and that we seek to understand our place with that history. In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
