



1. Age




- William John Robertson built two dwellings on Lot #2 of the original Creighton's Field subdivision, 36 and 38 Creighton Street
- Mortgages taken out by the Robertsons clearly indicate the first dwelling being built in 1849 and the second in 1862
- Historic maps and aerials show 38 Creighton Street (the Robertsons' primary dwelling) being substantially larger than 36 Creighton Street (the subject dwelling)
- Thus, the earlier, smaller, 1849 mortgage most likely paid for the construction of the smaller 36 Creighton Street (2096 Creighton Street) dwelling

1900 - 1917	9	Turn of the Century to Halifax Harbour Explosion
1918 - 1945	5	The War Years
1945 - Present	3	Post-War





William John Robertson b. ~1816, d. 1890

- Worked as a carpenter, housebuilder, and architect
- He built 36 Creighton Street [subject property] and 38 Creighton Street [since demolished]
- He likely built other homes in the area, though his work is undocumented and predates historic building permits
- He and his wife Eliza were commemorated in an 1885 newspaper article for their golden [50th] wedding anniversary, a rare occurrence for the time
- For most of W. J. Robertson's ownership, the house was a rental property.

Thomas Edward Everett b. 1832, d. 1919

- One of the first and most notable tenants, residing at 36 Creighton from 1868 to 1871
- One half of Everett Bros. Hats, Caps and Furs, with his brother Henry L. Everett
- Hat retailer and manufacturer located on Hollis St opposite Province House and later at 100 Granville Street
- He commissioned and moved into 5 Bauer Street (now 2013 Bauer Street) in 1872
- His brother left the firm, and it became T. E. Everett & Co.












Portrait of Hal B. Forbes in his Gottingen Street workshop (2017) and examples of his restoration work.

Hal B. Forbes b. 1955, d. 2018

- Costume studies major at Dal, graduating in 1982.
- Worked up the ranks behind the scenes at the Neptune Theatre
- Restored many homes in Halifax's North End
- Established a heritage carpentry workshop on Gottingen Street
- Worked as Canadian singer Rita MacNeil's costume designer and personal assistant.



3. Significance of Architect/Builder



- Original architect and builder was William John Robertson
- Restored by Hal B. Forbes

4a. Architectural Merit [Construction Type]



- Timber frame construction
- Built atop a coursed rubblestone foundation
- Timber frame construction was superseded by balloon frame construction through the mid to late 1800s.

4b. Architectural Merit [Style]









- Scottish Vernacular style
- Basic form of a Nova Scotian vernacular "half-house"
- Five-sided, hipped-roof, "Scottish" dormer
- Particularly well-ornamented example with hooded front windows and a grand front entrance



4b. Architectural Merit [Style]

Character-defining elements of 2096 Creighton Street are as listed in the Staff Report, but most notably include:

- Single Scottish (5-sided, hipped roof) dormer with six-oversix, single-hung, wood-frame central window and slender, two-over-two, single-hung, wood-frame flanking windows;
- Front entrance with transom and sidelights, pilasters, and entablature;
- Pair of six-over-six, single-hung, wood-frame front windows with bracketed hood mouldings;

B) Style	Points
Verv rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early	4 - 6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3
Not rare/ common example	0



5. Architectural Integrity

- Retains its original rectangular layout [the small rear structure is a shed; it shares no walls with the dwelling and is not an addition]
- Almost all character-defining elements remain intact
- Two notable changes:
 - Large, rear shed-dormer with three windows
 - Foundation has been parged with cement

6. Relationship to Surrounding Area



Aerial of Creighton Street showing subject property [red] and registered heritage properties [yellow]

- Part of the original subdivision of lands of George A. S. Creighton.
- The subject dwelling is one of the oldest houses in this subdivision, which was subdivided only five years prior to its construction
- Example of middle- and working-class housing characteristic of the historic Creighton's Field subdivision
- Compatible use and scale with surroundings
- Stands out for its high heritage integrity and its particularly ornate expression of the Scottish vernacular style
- Proximity to other registered heritage properties and many contributing [unregistered] heritage properties



6. Relationship to Surrounding Area





Points	Comments
6 - 10	The building is an important architectural asset contributing to the heritage character of the surrounding area.
1 - 5	The Architecture is compatible with the surrounding area and maintains its heritage character.
0	Does not contribute to the character of the surrounding area.

Recommendation

Should 2096 Creighton Street, Halifax score 50 or more points on evaluation as a heritage property under the HRM Heritage Property Program, the Heritage Advisory Committee recommends that Regional Council:

- 1. Set a date for a heritage hearing to consider the inclusion of the subject property in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality; and
- Approve the request to include 2096 Creighton Street, Halifax in the Registry of Heritage Property
 for the Halifax Regional Municipality, as shown on Map 1, as a municipal heritage property under
 the Heritage Property Act.
