SUBJECT: Legislative Update – 2023 Spring Sitting

#### **INFORMATION REPORT**

#### **ORIGIN**

2023 spring sitting of the Provincial Legislature.

## **LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY**

The relevant statutes for each piece of legislation passed during the 2023 spring sitting, as well as Council's outstanding legislative requests, are outlined in the Discussion section of this report or in the attached legislative request tracking sheet (Attachment A).

### **BACKGROUND**

Halifax Regional Municipality (Municipality) was created by, and gets its authority from, the Province of Nova Scotia (province). As a result, when the Municipality seeks to take an action outside the scope of its delegated authority, it must request that the province grant such authority through new legislation, legislative amendments, or by requesting that the province undertake an action on the Municipality's behalf.

Regional Council has several outstanding legislative requests with the province, with the oldest dating back to 2008. Council's legislative requests are tracked by Government Relations and External Affairs (GREA), who work with staff across the organization to coordinate efforts to advance requests. Following sittings of the Provincial Legislature, Council is provided with a report which outlines relevant legislative changes with potential impacts on the Municipality, as well as relevant updates on the status of outstanding requests.

The 2023 spring sitting of the Legislature commenced on March 21, 2023, and concluded on April 12, 2023. The sitting was comparatively short, with the Legislature sitting for a total of 14 days. Only eight (8) government bills passed during the sitting. The government's legislative agenda for the sitting was of limited direct relevance to HRM. The most notable legislation from HRM's perspective includes:

- 1. Bill No. 262 Amendments to the Interim Residential Rental Increase Cap Act; and
- 2. Bill No. 273 Road Trails Act.

An overview of these legislative changes is provided in the Discussion section below. The legislative overviews provided are not exhaustive but convey salient aspects of the new and/or amended legislation.

As of April 2023, HRM has fifteen (15) active legislative requests submitted to the province for consideration. None of HRM's active request were addressed during the brief spring sitting of the Legislature. An updated legislative tracking sheet is included with this report (Attachment A).

#### DISCUSSION

#### 1. Bill No. 262 – Amendments to the Interim Residential Rental Increase Cap Act

Bill 262 introduces amendments to the *Interim Residential Rental Increase Cap Act*, which will extend the temporary residential rental cap through to the end of 2025. The amount of the increase for 2024 and 2025 will now be set by regulation. The province may also, by regulation, set either a maximum permissible annual rent increase under the cap or a method to determine the maximum permitted rent increase. The government has noted that the amendments reflect an effort to balance the interests of tenants and landlords.

The 2 per cent temporary residential rent cap was introduced in November 2020 as a response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The cap applies to residential tenants who are renewing their lease or those in a fixed-term lease who are signing another fixed-term lease for the same unit. It does not apply to new tenants signing new leases or rent increases for lot fees in land-lease communities such as mobile home parks.

The rent cap was set to expire on December 31, 2023. Bill 262 extends the rent cap by two years, until December 31, 2025. The amendments enable the province to set the permissible annual rent increase under the cap via regulation; allowing the cap rate to be amended without having to bring it before the Legislature. The government has indicated its intention to increase the rent cap from 2 to 5 per cent per year starting January 1, 2024.

#### 2. Bill No. 273 - Road Trails Act

Bill 273 introduces the new *Road Trails Act*, which seeks to enable the operation of off-highway vehicles (OHV), such as ATVs and dirt bikes, on designated parts of highways to allow for greater trail and amenity connectivity. The Act additionally sets out a new permanent set of rules for OHV operators utilizing these designated highways.

The new Act enables the Minister of Public Works to designate, via regulation, a highway or part of a highway as a "road trail". A "road trail" would include the shoulder and travelled portion of a designated highway but excludes a ditch running along a highway and a controlled access highway. OHV operators will be permitted to operate on designated "road trails" to connect from trail to trail while following the prescribed rules set out in the Act. They are prohibited from travelling in a bicycle lane. Among other requirements, OHV operators will be required to have a valid driver's licence, insurance, registration and a licence plate.

The Act permits municipalities to designate public streets as "road trails" via a municipal bylaw as well, providing the streets is not a controlled access street or owned by the Crown. The Act also empowers municipalities to create offences in the by-law and authorizes peace officers to enforce the rules set out in the Act.

### **Additional Highlights from 2023 Spring Sitting**

Other notable highlights from the 2023 spring sitting are outlined below. Refer to the links for greater detail.

- Bill No. 256 (Patient Access to Care Act) The Act includes measures to reduce administrative burdens
  on healthcare providers and make it easier for healthcare professionals from other parts of Canada to
  work in Nova Scotia. One measure under the Act will permit employers to request a sick note only if an
  employee is absent for more than 5 consecutive days or has already had 2 non-consecutive absences
  of 5 days or less in the previous 12-month period.
- <u>Bill No. 263</u> (Amendments to the *Public Utilities Act*) Increases the total amount of administrative penalties that can be levied on Nova Scotia Power for outages in a year from \$1 million to \$25 million.
- <u>Bill No. 264</u> (Amendments to the *Electricity Act*) Introduces amendments which seek to facilitate more storage solutions for renewable electricity. The amendments enable the Department of Natural Resources and Renewables to issue requests for proposals for energy storage solutions like largescale batteries, as well as issue contracts for "innovative" energy storage projects that can be implemented quickly.
- <u>Bill No. 269</u> (Amendments to the *Construction Projects Labour Relations Act*) The Act seeks to provide greater certainty and labour stability for larger construction projects by allowing unionized contractors and unions to enter into a collective agreement for specific projects to safeguard from work stoppages. The amendment expands the scope of the Act to include large-scale green hydrogen production facilities to facilitated greater investment in the sector.

#### **Legislative Requests Updates**

None of HRM's fifteen (15) active legislative requests were directly addressed during the brief spring sitting. HRM staff continue to meet regularly with relevant provincial departments to discuss Council's outstanding legislative requests, partake in consultations on legislative proposals, and work to identify additional opportunities to advance requests. Below are some updates on active requests.

### MGA / HRM Charter Legislative Review Consultations

Following the 2021 provincial election, the province announced that it would prioritize a review of the *Municipal Government Act* ("MGA") and the *Halifax Regional Municipality Charter* ("HRM Charter"). The mandate letter issued to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing in fall 2021 noted "the review will include their size and scope, the concept of shared services and regional service authorities, with a goal of refining the delivery and governance model for all municipalities." The MGA / HRM Charter review is anticipated to be a multiyear project that is being conducted concurrently with Provincial / Municipal service exchange renegotiation, although they are two distinct processes.

Any consultations undertaken by the province as part of the MGA / HRM Charter review project will provide HRM with opportunities to highlight and bring forward outstanding legislative requests relating to the HRM Charter.

In fall 2022, the Department of Municipal Affairs and Housing issued consultation surveys to municipalities to gather targeted feedback as part of the review process. HRM was provided with a HRM-specific consultation survey in late 2022. The scope of the survey focused specifically on legislative proposals relating to planning aspects of the HRM Charter, but also touched upon modernizing public notice provisions and selling municipal property for less than market value. A combined staff response was prepared for HRM, which was submitted in March 2023 and incorporated several relevant outstanding requests from Council.

HRM staff will be engaged throughout the MGA/HRM Charter review project, including any potential future consultations.

### **EV Infrastructure for New Buildings**

As part of the Municipal Electric Vehicle Strategy, Council put forward a 2021 legislative request for the province to prescribe additional standards under the *Building Code Act* to require "EV Ready" parking stalls for the construction of new buildings within the Halifax Regional Municipality.<sup>1</sup>

Based on feedback from the province, a legislative amendment will not be forthcoming. At the suggestion of the province, HRM will be relying on its existing by-law making authority to mandate EV charging stations in parking areas, with no legislative amendments being required. Consequently, the request has been removed from the list of outstanding legislative requests.
