

Government of Canada

- Central Government for all 10 provinces and 3 territories.
- Capital in Ottawa, Ontario.
- Derives powers from the Constitution.
- Elected by Party System:
 - Head of party with most seats is **Prime Minister**.





Government of Nova Scotia

- 10 separate Provincial Governments in Canada.
- Each shares/divides responsibility to govern with the Federal Government.
- Derives powers from the Constitution.
- Political Party System much like at the Federal Level;
- Head of party with most seats becomes Premier of the Province.



MUNICIPAL/ REGIONAL GOVERNMENT



Halifax Regional Municipality

- Many municipalities/local governments across Canada.
- Rather than the Constitution, municipalities are created and regulated by the Province, but they are granted their own powers.
- Provides local services that we depend on everyday.



Halifax Regional Municipality

- 5,500 km/sq about the size of PEI
- Roughly 400,000 Residents 14th largest in Canada
- Largest municipality in Atlantic Canada

How is HRM Governed?

- Halifax Regional Council is the decision making body for the Municipality.
- Made up of the Mayor and 16 Councillors (one from each district).
- No political party system.
- Meetings take place in Halifax City Hall/Virtually.

Municipal Elections

- Regular elections for the Mayor and members of Regional Council every 4 years (Last Election held in October 2020).
- Special elections are held as needed to fill vacancies.
- Who is able to vote?
 - You are at least 18 years old;
 - A Canadian citizen;
 - Have resided in Nova Scotia for six months;



Mayor

- The Major is elected "at large," or by all voters within HRM.
- Represents and leads the Municipality.
- 1st among elected equals.





Councillors

- 16 Councillors 1 for each district of the HRM.
- Elected only by residents in their DISTRICT.
- Work on behalf of their districts & people who live there.




Council Chamber Halifax, Nova Scotia

Civic Administration

- The civic administration (Public Service/Staff) is focused on implementing the decisions and polices of Regional Council.
- The Chief Administrative Officer ("CAO") is the head of HRM's professional public service and communicates Council's direction to staff.
- HRM employs over 4000 staff.
- The organization is divided into departments known as "Business Units" which carry out specific functions of the municipality.


