

1. Continuity of Use

- St. Mary's Amateur Athletic and Aquatics Club founded in 1874 by St. Mary's Young Men's Temperance Abstinence and Benevolence Society
- Rowing and aquatics club at Halifax
 Harbour, moved to Northwest Arm in 1900
- Constructed a boathouse on Henry Pryor's former 'Hillside' estate circa 1919 on south side of Jubilee Road



Henry Pryor's 'Hillside' Estate, formerly on south side of Jubilee Road



2. Historical Importance – St. Mary's AA&AC

- o Formed in 1874
- First rowing club to introduce the four-oared shell
- John O'Neill of St. Mary's won the Champion of America Single Scull at the National Championship Regatta, one of few Canadians to win



2. Historical Importance – Halifax Rowing



Boaters with St. Mary's Boat Club in the background, ca. 1910


- Connection to Halifax's history of competitive and leisure rowing
- Amateur scull races on Northwest Arm began in 1876
- Led to the construction of several rowing clubs:
 - Northwest Arm Rowing Club (1901)
 - Jubilee Boat Club (1908)
 - Waegwoltic Boat Club (1908)
 - St. Mary's Boat Club (circa 1920)
 - Banook Canoe Club (1903)
 - o Mic Mac AAC (1923)



2. Historical Importance – CDEs

The character defining elements of 1641 Fairfield Road include, but are not limited to:

- Two-storey, wood clad boat club with Colonial Revival influences, including arched roof with returned eaves and diagonal cross balustrades;
- Lawn bowling and tennis court facilities;
- Tree canopy in groupings on slopes and along the south property line; and,
- View of the Northwest Arm and Dingle Tower.




3. Integrity

- Of the 1940s expansion, tennis courts and lawn bowling remain







- Historical, physical, and visual associations with Waegwoltic Club on Coburg Road, and Northwest Arm
- St. Mary's is only one of two remaining boat clubs
- Physical representation of Halifax's rowing and recreational history

Recommendation

Should 1641 Fairfield Road, Halifax score 35 or more points on evaluation as a heritage site under the HRM Heritage Property Program, the Heritage Advisory Committee recommends that Regional Council:

- 1. Set a date for a heritage hearing to consider the inclusion of the subject property in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality; and
- 2. Approve the request to include 1641 Fairfield Road, Halifax in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality, as shown on Map 1, as a municipal heritage property under the Heritage Property Act.
