

2018: 18 people


April 2022: 59 people

What the experts tell us

- People wants are simple: food, water, protection from elements, washroom, safe place to sleep and for valuables.
- People are highly stigmatized.
- Don't care about orders of Government ... just need help.
- Violence is a regular part of everyday life.
- 50% would call the police for help.

The solution



Deeply affordable housing

- Permanent housing
- Geared to income.
- Safe, supportive, sustainable, and accessible.
- Continuous building to meet demand.

HRMs Approach to Homelessness

Homelessness and Housing, along with heath care, community services, are all responsibilities of the Province of Nova Scotia.


- Humanitarian aid
- Prevent people from becoming homeless
- Public education
- Facilitate the creation and preservation of affordable and deeply affordable housing
- Support Provincial sheltering and housing projects

Accessibility Concerns

- High numbers of people sleeping rough struggling with disabilities.
- Some facilities are not accessible or fully accessible.
- Sleeping rough by its very nature is not accessible and many people struggle.
- Accessibility activities or initiatives focus primarily on permanent physical barriers.
- People working in the sector have inconsistent and, in some cases, insufficient training to support people.
- Insufficient support for staff who have a disability to be successful in their own employment.

Intermediary options

- Day Centre and support services
- Communal shelters Hfx Forum
- Temporary housing
 - Pallet Shelters
 - The Bridge or Waverly Inn
- Permanent housing
 - Overlook
 - Apartments





The future

- Rental pressures will continue for the foreseeable future.
- More than 30,000 households are in core housing need.
- January 1, 2024: 5% rent increases now permitted.
- Population increasing faster than housing stock.
- Active loss of housing stock.
- Students and refugees without housing.
- Insufficient plans in place to address the need for deeply affordable and affordable housing.

Next 6 months

- Shubie Campground 17 RVs
- 85 Pallet Shelters
- Tiny Home for 70 people in Sackville Oct and Dec
- 55 Supportive Housing units at the Cove
- One additional option for 25 people
- Enough space for those sleeping rough IF structured to meet their needs ... which it will not be.



- Additional Winter Shelter
- Power in encampments
- Winter camping gear

Big questions:

- How do we address gaping holes in the system, beyond housing, such as space for couples, youth, seniors, single room occupancy, and harm reduction-based facilities?
- How do we prevent the growth of encampments in the future as more people need and want to shelter outside?
- How do we convince and support the Province and the Federal Governments to invest in deeply affordable supportive housing?

Big questions:

- How do we support trauma informed and harm reduction practices but address significant core issues to the crisis such as serious criminal activity around drugs and human trafficking?
- At what point do we help too much and damage people's level of resilience?
- How do we support the sector so it can meet the needs?
