

VISION


To create programs and services that will address anti-Black racism faced by Black people in human rights complaints, the justice system, law enforcement and incarceration.







ANSJI Criminal Division serves clients who are African Nova Scotian or Black people of African descent living in Nova Scotia in criminal matters (Adult & Youth) free of charge.

Our lawyers appear at all levels of court in Nova Scotia and have been effective in using a critical race lens to advocate for clients in a system that has historically marginalized and mistreated Black people.



Family Law & Child Welfare Division

Core Legal Services:

- Child Protection
- Custody/Access/Child Support
- Emergency Protection Orders pursuant to the Domestic Violence Intervention Act (DVIA)

If a person needs Child Welfare and/or Family Legal Services ANSJI may:

- Provide representation in appropriate circumstances
- Provide legal information or Summary Advice
- Consult with your lawyer in race-based issues that may be present in your file
- Assist with finding supports to help aid family reunification
- Mediation ullet



<u>Justice Partnership Initiative Program</u>

The staff lawyer also oversees initiatives related to public legal education and support. ANSJI seeks to partner with relevant organizations and institutions to create self-help guides and prerecorded advice sessions, co-host workshops, lectures, and engagement opportunities, and youth led programming and peer training.

Justice Partnership Initiative Program

This program provides free independent legal information and advice to ANSJI's target population. The program helps people navigate informal and formal legal processes in Nova Scotia, with a focus on human rights, employment discrimination, and policing issues.

The program helps provide access to justice for people navigating legal and quasi-legal bodies such as the Office of the Police Complaints Commissioner, local police boards, the Commission for Public Complaints against the RCMP and making applications to the Human Rights Commission of Nova Scotia or the Canadian Human Rights Commission.

Justice Navigators

Justice Navigators assists individuals aged 12 and older who are <u>currently</u> involved in the Justice System.

The Navigator concentrates on preventing recidivism and helps clients navigate areas such as but not limited to criminal law, family and child welfare, mental health, addictions, and social justice issues.

They advocate for clients and promote legal and social reform within the community when necessary.





National IRCA Training Program



Impact of Race and Culture Assessments (IRCAs) are comprehensive pre-sentencing reports prepared for judges, to aid in sentencing decisions for African Nova Scotians and Black people of African descent involved in the criminal justice system.


An IRCA examines the impact that systemic anti-Black racism has on an individual.

In 2021, the Government of Canada supported the implementation of IRCA infrastructure in each province and territory through funding agreements.

Data Collection & Justice System Accountability Unit



The goal of the "Data Collection and Justice System Accountability Unit" is to combat systemic anti-Black racism within Canada's justice system by analyzing and interpreting data and information on justice related matters in Nova Scotia.

The information collected by the Accountability Unit will be shared in reports, publications, community engagements, and in the media. The information will also be used in advocacy aimed at contributing to policy change.

<u>Data Collection & Justice System Accountability Unit</u>

The Data Collection & Justice System Accountability Unit currently has two research assistants, two research associates, and one community engagement facilitator who is working on the research team.

Unit



- An IRCA-Legal project, examining the effectiveness of IRCAs in the court system.
- Developing an IRCA Tool that can be used at bail.
- Supporting a research project aimed at addressing gender-based violence within the Black community.
- A research project, funded by the Law Foundation of Nova Scotia, entitled an "Africentric Approach to Restorative Justice in Nova Scotia." The purpose of this research project is to develop a restorative justice program that is catered to the African Nova Scotian/Black community.
