- Purchased other two parcels in 1896
- Demolished the previous owners' boarding house, which cause the decline in 1898
- The increase in 1900 indicates that the construction date is 1899



2a. Historical Importance



William MacKenzie (1853-1931), Bedford Station Master

- Began railway career in 1872; moved to Bedford in 1881.Appointed Bedford station master in 1884; served 58 years in railway operations.
- Station served as a hub for commuters, freight, and mail services in Bedford and surrounding areas.
- Trained young people who later employed by railways



2a. Historical Importance

Dr. Luther Burns MacKenzie (1880–1981)

- Son of William Mackenzie.
- Played a key role in the development of the New York University (NYU)-Bellevue Medical Center.
- Spearheaded major fundraising efforts for NYU
- NYU Alumni Meritorious Service Medal (1947), honorary doctorates from NYU (1957) and Dalhousie (1980).

Peter G. Christie (1941–2021)

- Owned and subdivided the property (1974– 1975).
- Third Mayor of Bedford (1988–1991); later
 MLA for Bedford-Fall River (1999)
- Served as Minister of Community Services, Service Nova Scotia, and Finance.

- Chief of Bedford's Bucket Brigade Fire Station

4b. Architectural Merit [Style]

Character-defining elements are as listed in the Staff Report, but most notably include:

- Two-storey building with a T-shaped plan steeply pitched, cross-gabled roof;
- Gabled wall dormer with narrow two-over-two windows, extended eaves and bargeboards;
- Two-storey, five-sided bay windows with hipped roof;
- Box bay on the south elevation with wood trim and double hung windows;
- Pedimented wood porch with fretted railings, brackets and beadboard ceiling;
- Entry door with transom and side lights;
- Chimneys of the west and south wings;
- Wood shingle cladding; and
- Moulded fascia boards.

5. Architectural Integrity

High level of architectural integrity with modest changes

- Remain the T-shape layout.
- Early alterations are recognized as CDEs
 - Box bay window
 - Enclosed porch
- French doors
- Rear addition

6. Relationship to Surrounding Area



Surrounding area of the subject property

- Located on the hill west of the Bedford Basin, one of the earliest developed area
- Surrounded by low density residential buildings, including several same-period houses
- In proximity to the Bedford station
