BUDGET 2025/26

Please be advised of the following key dates for the 2025/26 municipal budget process.

The municipal budget funds all costs associated with servicing a growing municipality. This includes day-to-day municipal operations, capital priority initiatives approved by Regional Council and capital projects and investments to purchase, construct, rehabilitate and replace municipal assets. There are several milestones in the annual municipal budget process. Below are the key dates for the 2025/26 municipal budget process:

 2023/24 Strategic Performance Report and Snapshot: Regional Council will receive the 2023/24 Strategic Performance Report, outlining progress on strategic key performance indicators intended to assess advancement on approved priorities from the *Strategic Priorities Plan 2021-25*

 Business Unit and Budget
 Presentations: Each municipal business unit will present their proposed budget and business plan.

TAX RELIEF FOR NON-PROFIT AND CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

The application deadline for the Tax Relief for Non-Profit and Charitable Organizations program is January 31. This includes for new applications and renewals. If you have participated in the program previously, please make sure to complete the Confirmation Form which can be found <u>here</u>. Due to the Canada Post Strike, the municipality will be issuing tax bills this month with an amended due date for payment.

Inquiries or questions of clarification can also be directed to the program's designated email address at nonprofttax@halifax.ca. A payment plan allows for smaller payment by installments which can assist with cash flow.

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WINTER PARKING

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the municipal overnight winter parking ban is now in effect during declared weather events to ensure effective snow clearing. Residents are encouraged to plan ahead when snow is in the forecast and secure offstreet parking when the overnight winter parking ban is enforced.

The parking ban can be enforced throughout the entire municipality or just by zone. Zone 1 – Central refers to the Halifax peninsula and downtown Dartmouth within Highway 111 (the Circumferential Highway) and some surrounding areas. Zone 2 – Non-Central is any area outside of Zone 1. You can find out what zone you are in here.

To get updates on when the parking ban is in effect, sign up for our <u>hfxALERT</u> system or check out our <u>public service announcements</u> or <u>@hfxgov</u> on X.

The municipality has enhanced enforcement for parking ban violations in areas around hospitals, schools, bus routes and challenging streets to ensure unobstructed access for snow equipment and emergency vehicles. Officers will also be ticketing vehicles obstructing sidewalk clearing. Regardless of the status of the overnight winter parking ban, vehicles can be ticketed or towed at any time if their vehicle is interfering with snow clearing operations as outlined in Section 139 of the <u>Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act.</u>

SNOW CLEARING SERVICE STANDARDS

During a storm, our crews have 4,322 lane kms or road, 1,000 kms of sidewalks plus bike lanes, multi-use pathways and bus stops to clear. They begin their work before the winter weather event even begins by applying salt or brine to streets and sidewalks across the region and snow clearing efforts begin once the snow has begun to accumulate.

Streets and sidewalks are prioritized based on traffic volumes, local amenities such as hospitals and schools and steepness. We work as quickly as possible to get all streets cleared, but Priority 1 roads should be cleared to bare pavement within a maximum of 12 hours of the end of a weather event and Priority 2 Roads should be snow covered but passable within a maximum of 24 hours from the end of an event. If your street or sidewalk does not meet the standards, please call 311 and they will dispatch a crew. In exceptional weather events, these timelines may not be able to be met, but we do our best to clear as quickly as possible.

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EMERA OVAL OPENS FOR THE 2024/25 SEASON

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the Emera Oval, located on the Halifax Common, is now open.

Every year, the Emera Oval is transformed into the largest outdoor, artificially refrigerated ice service east of Quebec City. The skating surface is equal to three NHL hockey rinks, and the facility includes an accessible washroom, street parking on Cogswell Street and wheelchair access to the ice surface.

ICE SAFETY



The municipality is no longer conducting ice thickness testing as changing climate patterns, including rapidly fluctuating temperatures, have made ice thickness testing no longer feasible or reliable.

Residents are asked to take safety precautions for themselves and their families by avoiding any further recreation activities on frozen lakes and ponds, including walking, snowmobiling, and skating. If you are going to engage in any activity on frozen lakes, make sure to take precautions. You can find a complete list of guidelines from the Canadian Red Cross regarding ice safety <u>here</u>.

DISPOSING OF YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

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The holidays are over! You can dispose of natural Christmas trees by placing them curbside on your regular green cart collection day. Natural Christmas trees picked up from the curb are processed into mulch for landscaping. Please remove all plastic, tinsel, ornaments, metal rings, nails, stands and plastic tree bags before disposing of your tree.

SENIORS CARE GRANT

The Seniors Care Grant helps low-income seniors with the cost of household services like lawn care, snow removal, grocery delivery, transportation, small home repairs and phone service, healthcare services like physiotherapy and mental health support and home heating. Grants are \$750 for each household. You can find out more information and the application form here.





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HEATING ASSISTANCE REBATE PROGRAM

The Heating Assistance Rebate Program provides assistance to low and moderate income Nova Scotians for help with the cost of home heating. Rebates are \$600/household. Find out more and apply by March 31 <u>here</u>.

WINTER SAFETY TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

With winter weather arriving potentially any day, Halifax Regional Police is sharing some winter safety tips to help road users be winter ready.

Plan ahead to ensure your vehicle is roadworthy.

- Check your safety inspection sticker and the tread on your tires.
- Consider topping up your vehicle with extra windshield washer fluid.
- Keep a shovel, a bag of salt or sand and your snow brush and ice scraper in your vehicle.

Driving safely for the road conditions

- Stay up to date with the weather conditions.
- Visibility is key. Before you hit the road, clear all snow from the roof, hood, license plate, windows, mirrors, lights, turn signals and cameras of your vehicle. Scrape/defrost your windshield if necessary.
- Be mindful that winter conditions create challenges for pedestrians who may need

to walk in the roadway to avoid snowcovered or icy sidewalks.

- Never drive distracted. Keep your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road. Watch for other road users, pedestrians and cyclists.
- Adjust your speed to the conditions. Leave extra space between you and the vehicle in front of you so that you can safely slow down and/or stop. Remember not to accelerate or brake too quickly when the roads are slippery.

Think before you park on the street. When and where you park in the winter can have a big impact on clearing streets and sidewalks, which, in turn, can affect road safety. To help make a responsible parking choice, ask yourself:

- Is the overnight parking ban currently being enforced?
- Is your vehicle causing a safety issue?
- Is it making the road impassable?
- Is it impeding snow operations underway in the area?

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COUNCILLOR CODE OF CONDUCT

Nova Scotia's Councillor Code of Conduct was adopted by Regional Council at our December 10th meeting. The new Code of Conduct will replace our previous administrative order and has specific guidelines and sanctions for any violations. The code of conduct includes stipulations for general conduct, the use of confidential information and municipal property, equipment and services, restrictions on any gifts and benefits, relationships with development groups, proper use of influence, business relations, nepotism, fairness, adherence to policy and laws, respecting council decisions, communicating accurately, respectful interactions with Council and staff, and more. 
