WINDSOR STREET EXCHANGE

At the Feb. 25 meeting, Regional Council voted 15-2 in favour of proceeding with the Windsor Street Exchange project under its current design and funding agreement.

The proposed project aims to add active transportation connections and transit priority measures through the intersection, improve the movement of vehicles and goods through the area, and improve the safety for all road users.

The previous design was rejected at the Jan. 28 meeting, when Council raised concerns about the lack of a firm commitment to Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) and active transportation in the design. On Feb. 25, staff presented a supplementary report with a revised recommendation based on Council input. This includes design and construction of new structures within the project area to accommodate additional dedicated transit lanes and separated pedestrian and cycling facilities.

Municipal staff will also now start planning a second phase of the project, which will include road-widening to provide additional right-of-way for dedicated transit lanes in both the inbound and outbound directions. It will also include separated sidewalks and cycling facilities for active transportation connections from Joseph Howe Drive to Kempt Road.

UPDATE ON BREAK-INS IN DARTMOUTH EAST

In your email you must provide the following information:

- A phone number you can be reached
- Driver's licence information of the person who was driving at the time of the accident
- Your permit with your VIN Vehicle Identification Number
- Your insurance information
- A date and time as well as a location and a brief description of what occurred

### RECREATION FUNDING ACCESS APPLICATION

The Funding Access Program provides recreation opportunities to children, youth and adults in financial need. Depending on the need, the cost of recreation programs could be 50% or 100% covered by the program.

To qualify, you must:

- Live in HRM
- Show proof of financial need
- Apply before registering for a program

All Halifax Recreation programs are eligible except private swim lessons, birthday parties, third-party programs, and rentals.

Proof of financial need must accompany <u>your</u> <u>application</u>. You must include the following as applicable to your application request.

- <u>Canada Child Benefit Statement</u> for children and youth under 18 years of age
- <u>Notice of Assessment</u> for individuals 18 years of age and over
  - Sample Notice of Assessment
- Letter from the <u>Department of Community</u> <u>Services</u>

#### **COMMUNITY MEDIAITION**

Regional Council has approved funding for a Community Mediation Project, to promote public safety, improve community wellbeing and further the civilian delivery of non-core policing functions.

Trained community mediators can help neighbours, relatives, and others resolve conflicts peacefully. Mediation can prevent the escalation of community disputes, reduce harm, and avoid time and cost of resolving conflicts through the legal system.

Staff propose a one-year community mediation pilot (with the possibility of year-by-year renewals).

Once approved in the 2025/26 Operating Budget, Council has directed the Chief Administrative Officer to provide a contribution of \$100,000 to the United Way of Halifax to create and implement this pilot program.

#### **HRP HEADQUARTERS**



The hours at police headquarters, located at 1975 Gottingen Street in Halifax, are 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The following services are available at the front window Monday to Friday, after 4 p.m., and 24/7 Saturday and Sunday:

- Ticket withdraws

- Reporting non-dispatchable incidents (filing a report that doesn't require an officer to come to the scene)

- Reporting motor vehicle collisions
- Releasing seized vehicles

#### WHEN TO CALL AN ARBORIST

Halifax Regional Municipality is fortunate to have a dedicated team of tree care professionals responsible for maintaining and managing our large inventory of public trees.

In HRM, a public tree is defined as any tree where the majority of the trunk is on municipal land, including parkland and the space between the curb and private property (right-of-way).

Ownership of the tree in front of most properties in HRM typically depends on how close the tree is to the roadway, but it's not always that simple. The width of the right-of-way space varies across the municipality, from street to street.

If you are unsure if a tree is public or private, you can call 311 and we can assist with a measurement.

#### Why does this matter?

HRM maintains and manages public trees, ensuring their health and safety.

If you have concerns about a public street tree (or park tree), you can call 311, and a Certified Arborist can assess it and determine if action is required.

#### When to call an Arborist for Private Trees

For trees on private property (e.g. side-yards, backyards, private portion of the front yard), hiring an arborist is advisable if you notice dead or dying branches, cracks in the trunk, leaning or unstable trees, fungal growth, visible signs of stress, damaged roots, pest infestation, cavity or hollow sections, storm damage, tree trimming, safe tree removal and tree assessments.


#### Why Hire an Arborist?

### HALIFAX REGIONAL POLICE CRIME UPDATE: JULY – DECEMBER 2024

Halifax Regional Police provides semi-annual crime data for Central (downtown Halifax), East (Dartmouth), and West (Bedford to Sambro Loop) divisions.

Below is a summary comparing July–December 2024 to the same period in 2023.

#### **Crime Trends**

- Crimes against persons have decreased by 4.77%
- Homicides down from 4 to 1
- Assaults down 5% (67 fewer cases)
- Attempted murders increased from 3 to 6
- West Division saw a 3% increase in these crimes

#### **Crimes Against Property**

- 20% increase (1,143 more incidents reported)
- Central Division saw the highest increase in property crimes (55% rise)
- Theft over \$5,000 up 39% (29 more cases)
- Theft under \$5,000 up 29% (1,190 more cases)
- Break & enter down 11% (49 fewer cases)
- Motor vehicle theft down 10% (15 fewer cases)

#### **Federal Crimes**

- 9.6% decrease
- General Federal Crimes (Firearms Act, Youth Criminal Justice Act, etc.) up by 6 cases

#### **Traffic & Enforcement**

- Traffic collisions up 8% (169 more incidents)
- Summary Offence Tickets up 15% (463 more tickets)
- Central Division had the largest increase in tickets (27% rise)

### HALIFAX POLICE RELEASE IMPAIRED DRIVING STATS FOR JANUARY



Halifax Regional Police charged 45 drivers with impairedrelated last month:

- 32 for impaired driving by alcohol
- 6 for impaired driving by drugs
- 7 issued suspensions for consuming alcohol before driving

Fifteen drivers were at least twice the legal limit, and seven refused a breath test, which is also a chargeable offence.

Police received 15 calls from people reporting suspected impaired drivers. If you suspect someone is driving impaired, call 911 immediately with details, including the vehicle's description and direction of travel.

#### **REC FEES CHANGING**

Parks and Recreation fees are changing on April 1, 2025.

In 2022, changes to the Parks & Recreation fee structure for recreation programs, services, rentals, drop-ins and membership fees were announced. In accordance with the five-year fee structure changes, Parks & Recreation fees, including membership fees, will be increasing effective April 1, 2025.

# The fee changes will also provide more clarity and predictability for residents:

- New user categories will be based on the age group and type of organization.
- Consistent subsidization for fee categories. For example, the fee structure will ensure all youth programs across the municipality receive the same subsidy.
- Reduced risk of unexpected fee increases. The new fee structure accounts for inflation, helping to reduce unexpected and potentially significant fee increases.
- Predictable five-year review cycle. New requirement to review fee structure every five years.
- No user charge for Parks that are rented for public events that are open to the public, nonexclusive and free of charge.
- Overall standardization, consistency and transparency of fees across the municipality.
