# SALMON RIVER DRIVE BRIDGE



The Salmon River Drive bridge (Walker's Bridge) replacement project involves replacing the existing bridge to ensure long-term safety and reliability for motorists and pedestrians. Construction is expected to take place over two years in 2025 and 2026.

#### NEW ONLINE RECREATTION SOFTWARE

Members are now prompted to create their new password in an email coming from communication@xplorrecreation.com.






# **COMMUNITY CORNER – DISTRICT 4**

#### **Caldwell Road Phase 2**

This completion of Caldwell Road has been pushed out to 2026 due to utility pole relocation delays. The delays are due to easement issues, capacity issues, and HRM not having the ability to hurry the process. We are waiting on third party work. Very sorry for the continued frustration this delay causes.

#### **Astral Drive Recapitalization**

Astral Drive is slated for 2025 for the first phase of the recapitalization project. Phase One will be from Selig to Stratford including integrated traffic calming. Knowing that Caldwell Road would be delayed yet another year, staff worked hard to get the detailed design work for Astral completed in time to be able to begin phase one this year. Very thankful they got it done in time! Thank you!

#### **Sherwood Development**

HRM planning staff are finalizing the Development Permit review. They have a final subdivision application under review for a townhouse lot on Sherwood, but there is no timeline yet.

#### **Broom Road Development**

HRM planning staff are finalizing the Development Permit review. The next step will be to subdivide the property, but there is no ETA on this yet. Staff have not received an application for any building permits to date.

# LIVING LAKESHORES

This spring, the municipality's Environment and Climate Change team, in partnership with TransCoastal Adaptations (TCA) at Saint Mary's University and the Ecology Action Centre, will launch a new project called Living Lakeshores.

This project aims to increase the resilience of freshwater shorelines in the Halifax region and build community understanding of natural restoration approaches in sensitive ecosystems.

The municipality will be offering free shoreline naturalization training to residents, delivered by TCA.

#### **BUDGET 2025/26**

On Tuesday, April 8, Regional Council will give final review and approval of the 2025/26 budget.

Following the Wednesday, March 26 Budget Committee meeting, the proposed tax rate of 0.772 tax rate (an increase of 0.002 from 2024/25) - two thousandths of a cent higher than last year will be forwarded to Regional Council.

The municipal budget funds all costs associated with servicing a growing municipality. This includes day-to-day municipal operations, capital priority initiatives approved by Regional Council, and capital projects and investments to purchase, construct, rehabilitate and replace municipal assets.

#### 2025/26 PLANNED CAPITAL WORK -**DISTRICT 4 HIGHLIGHTS**

We're investing in safer, smoother streets across District 4 as part of HRM's 2025/26 Capital Works Program.

Key street recapitalization projects planned for this season include:

- Astral Drive (Seilig to Stratford): Sidewalk renewal and traffic calming measures to enhance pedestrian and vehicle safety.
- Astral Drive: New sidewalk for bus stop connections
- Hillsboro Drive (Highway 7): Reinstatement of existing traffic calming features to maintain a safer traffic flow.
- Sirius Crescent (Poplar to Poplar): Upgrades to improve road condition and support a more comfortable drive for residents.
- Brookfield Avenue, Atholea Drive, Pearl Drive, and Upper Governor Street: Traffic Calming Measures to be put in place.

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### NEW SECOND UNIT INCENTIVE PROGRAM FOR PROPERTY OWNERS



The Halifax Regional Municipality has introduced a new program to help property owners create more housing options across the region through nonrepayable funding.


The Second Unit Incentive Program offers financial grants to help offset costs associated with building new second units. Eligible residents can receive up to \$12,000 to help reduce building expenses related to water and wastewater.

Funded through the <u>Housing Accelerator Fund</u> (HAF), this program is part of the municipality's commitment to increasing housing availability and supporting sustainable community development.

The program is available to owner-occupants of a one-unit dwelling who are up-to-date on property tax payments, where land use by-laws allow. A building permit is also needed to apply.

Applications will be open until June 1, 2026, or until funding is fully allocated. More information on how to apply can be found <u>here</u>.

## NATIONAL DAY OF MOURNING



On April 28, Nova Scotians will join with Canadians across the nation, and over 100 countries around the world, to recognize the National Day of Mourning.

This day has been designated as a time when workers, families, employers and others come together to remember those who have died or been injured at work.

According to recent statistics from the Association of Workers' Compensation Boards of Canada (AWCBC), there were just over 270,000 accepted claims for lost time due to a work-related injury or disease in Canada in 2019, and sadly, 925 workplace fatalities.

On this important day, we pause to remember those who have died or been injured on the job and take time to collectively renew our commitment to making safety a top priority in our individual workplaces.

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## MOBILE FOOD MARKET



Regional Council has approved an increase in funding from \$75,000 to \$175,700 to the Mobile Food Market.

Rising costs, soaring rates of food insecurity and growing interest in community- based, welcoming and dignified ways of accessing food has resulted in an unprecedented demand for the services of the Mobile Food Market. Since 2019, there has been a dramatic increase in food distribution and has challenged the ability of the Mobile Food Market to respond to communities. Additional funding will be used to continue supporting a senior leadership role, an additional full-time employee, and for program funding.

Regional Council has also approved the continued support for two years until 2029 and directed the Chief Administrative Officer to work with the Mobile Food Market and other partners for the purchase of a new hybrid or electric vehicle.

#### NEW ONLINE TOOL FOR BURN RESTRICTIONS



The Halifax Regional Municipality has launched Before You Burn, a new online tool that provides residents and visitors with up-to-date information on whether burning is allowed in the Halifax region. Before starting an open-air fire, check <u>Before You Burn</u> to stay informed and ensure compliance with municipal and provincial regulations.

#### WHY BYB?

- No more guesswork this tool is specific to your civic address.
- Quick visual access to the burn status for the municipality (open, restricted, ban, etc.).
- More detail including the Halifax-specific fire risk index.
- Detailed descriptions of all burning types (campfires, brush burning, etc.).

The new <u>Before You Burn</u> tool displays the burning restrictions in effect across the municipality by comparing municipal by-laws and provincial legislation with live data from the <u>provincial fire restrictions webpage</u>.

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# HALIFAX WANDERERS DND APPRECIATION GAME FLY PAST

Regional Council has given permission for the Royal Canadian Air Force to conduct a fly past over the Wanderers Grounds to mark the annual Department of National Defense (DND) appreciation game.

The annual event brings awareness and appreciation to the contributions of the Canadian Armed Forces and the DND. This event will also fundraise in support of military families through the Military Family Resource Centre.

# HALIFAX WATER ANNUAL BUSINESS PLAN AND FIVE-YEAR STRATEGY



Regional Council has approved the 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and five-year business strategy for Halifax Water.

Halifax Water has a mandate to own and operate water facilities and utilities for the purpose of providing water, wastewater and stormwater services to customers. The organization is governed by the Halifax Water Board of Commissioners, in compliance with April 2025



the <u>Halifax Regional Water Commission</u> <u>Act</u> and <u>Administrative Order 2018-001-ADM</u> (Respecting the Halifax Regional Water <u>Commission).</u>

The five-year strategic plan establishes the organization's objectives and strategic initiatives from 2025 to 2030. The 2025/26 Annual Business Plan outlines a number of goals that have been established to meet these objectives.

An updated integrated resource plan is expected in 2027/28.

#### SNOW PROPERTY DAMAGE

Our crews and contractors do their best to avoid property damage while clearing streets and sidewalks as quickly as possible, but damage can happen when we're dealing with heavy equipment and challenging conditions.

Contractors who plow the streets and sidewalks are responsible for repairing any damage caused by their equipment. The municipality is responsible for damage caused by municipally owned clearing equipment.

Residents who have sustained damage to their property or know of damage to municipal property should report it as soon as possible by emailing <u>contactus@311.halifax.ca</u> or calling 311. Unless there is an immediate safety concern, most damage will be repaired in the spring, when weather has improved.

#### HALIFAX REGIONAL POLICE CRIME UPDATE: JULY – DECEMBER 2024

Halifax Regional Police provides semi-annual crime data for Central (downtown Halifax), East (Dartmouth), and West (Bedford to Sambro Loop) divisions.

Here is a summary comparing July–December 2024 to the same period in 2023:

#### **Crime Trends**

- Crimes against persons have decreased by 4.77%
- Homicides down from 4 to 1
- Assaults down 5% (67 fewer cases)
- Attempted murders increased from 3 to 6
- West Division saw a 3% increase in these crimes

#### **Crimes Against Property**

- 20% increase (1,143 more incidents reported)
- Central Division saw the highest increase in property crimes (55% rise)
- Theft over \$5,000 up 39% (29 more cases)
- Theft under \$5,000 up 29% (1,190 more cases)
- Break & enter down 11% (49 fewer cases)
- Motor vehicle theft down 10% (15 fewer cases)

#### **Federal Crimes**

- 9.6% decrease
- General Federal Crimes (Firearms Act, Youth Criminal Justice Act, etc.) up by 6 cases

#### **Traffic & Enforcement**

- Traffic collisions up 8% (169 more incidents)
- Summary Offence Tickets up 15% (463 more tickets)
- Central Division had the largest increase in tickets (27% rise)

# HRP RELEASE IMPAIRED DRIVING STATS FOR FEBRUARY



Halifax Regional Police charged 43 drivers with impaired related offences during the month of February.

- 22 for impaired driving by alcohol
- 4 for impaired driving by drugs
- 17 issued suspensions for consuming alcohol before driving

Police received 16 calls from people reporting suspected impaired drivers.

If you suspect someone is driving impaired, call 911 immediately with details, including the vehicle's description and direction of travel.

#### WILDFIRE SEASON PRECAUTIONS

Wildfire season runs from March 15 to Oct. 15. While burning restrictions are in effect yearround, additional restrictions are in effect during wildfire season. Fire safety is key to protecting your home and community. Follow these tips every time you make an outdoor fire:

- Always check the daily burn restrictions before starting a fire to ensure it's safe and allowed.
- Never leave your fire unattended unattended fires can spread quickly and become dangerous.
- Completely extinguish your fire douse it with water, stir the ashes and repeat until everything is cool to the touch.

Through a voluntary process, residents may register to receive a wildfire risk assessment for their property using the FireSmart standard. The FireSmart program is a national initiative designed to help communities and property owners reduce the risk of wildfires. It provides education, guidelines and practical actions to minimize fire hazards in homes, businesses and public spaces.
