BUDGET 2025/26

On Tuesday, April 8, Regional Council approved the 2025/26 municipal budget, which includes an operating budget of \$1.33 billion and a capital plan of \$314 million.

As public servants, we're often faced with the challenge of balancing many competing priorities, and this year's budget development was no exception. We were committed to ensuring the responsible management of resources, maintenance of essential services and positioning the municipality for sustainable growth, all while minimizing the financial impact on residents.

This municipal budget reflects a careful balance between enhancing critical services and infrastructure while managing fiscal prudence during challenging economic conditions. Despite continued pressures from inflation and rapid regional growth, the municipal portion of the residential tax bill will increase by only 4.7 per cent, with the total average tax bill increasing by 5.2 per cent – approximately \$117. This is based on the average single-family home assessment value of \$338,500.

Importantly, I want to highlight that the residential tax rate remains unchanged, holding steady at 0.770. Due to higher assessment increases, commercial rates have

decreased in each assessment tier and tax area.

- **Sidewalk and bikeway upgrades:** New sidewalks and bike lanes will be installed on both sides of Dutch Village Road within the project area.
- **Transit infrastructure upgrades:** New concrete pads will be added to improve accessibility at bus stops.
- **Streetscaping enhancements:** Trees, benches, garbage receptacles, and interpretive signage will be added to enhance the pedestrian experience.
- **Parking and traffic calming:** Existing parking spaces will be replaced with on-street parallel parking and lane widths will be reduced to help calm traffic and improve safety.

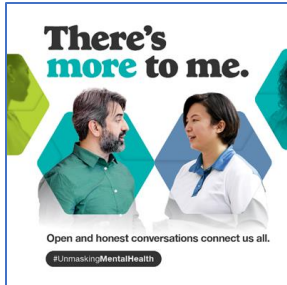
Traffic impacts: Access to businesses and properties will be maintained throughout the project; however, residents and commuters should expect the following traffic impacts:

- Lane reductions and stop-and-go traffic within the project area.
- Temporary closures on side-streets to install new underground infrastructure.
- The sidewalk along Dutch Village Road will remain open for pedestrian use.

Transit Impacts: This work will impact [Halifax Transit](#) routes 28 and 137. Throughout phases of this project, different bus stops along Dutch Village Road will be impacted and routes may be temporarily detoured.

HALIFAX REGIONAL FIRE & EMERGENCY - INTERNATIONAL ACCREDITATION



Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE) has officially been awarded Accredited Agency status from the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI), a designation earned by only a select number of fire departments worldwide.

Accreditation through CFAI is considered the gold standard in the fire service, recognizing departments that meet rigorous international benchmarks for service delivery, planning and continuous quality improvement. HRFE is now among an elite group of fire services in Canada and around the world to hold this distinction.

“Accreditation is more than a procedural achievement—it is a powerful demonstration of our commitment to quality improvement and operational excellence,” said Chief



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Administrative Officer Cathie O'Toole. "This process strengthens not only HRFE, but also the broader network of municipal services that work together every day to keep our community safe."

The CFAI accreditation process is a multi-year effort involving extensive self-assessment, community risk analysis, performance benchmarking and peer review by an independent team of fire service professionals. HRFE's efforts were guided by its [2024-2029 Strategic Plan](#) and the [Community Risk Assessment – Standards of Cover \(CRA-SoC\)](#), both developed to align with the Halifax region's growth and evolving needs.

"This international accreditation is a proud moment for our city and recognizes the outstanding professionalism and dedication of Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency," said Mayor Andy Fillmore. "Halifax residents can take great confidence in knowing their fire service meets the highest global standards for safety, service and accountability. Congratulations to the entire HRFE team on this remarkable achievement."

"This recognition reflects the professionalism, dedication and teamwork our members provide every day and places HRFE among a very select group of international fire and emergency services that have demonstrated their commitment to be better tomorrow than they are today" said Fire Chief Ken Stuebing.

CFAI accreditation reflects HRFE's focus on evidence-based planning, proactive risk reduction and a culture of continuous improvement. The designation is valid for five years, with annual compliance reporting and a reaccreditation process to follow.

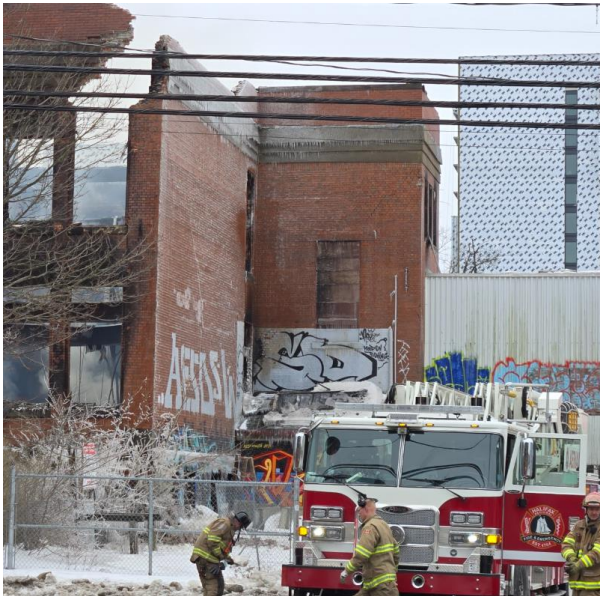

BLOOMFIELD SITE – DEMOLITION



Following its initial response to the fire at one of the three buildings at the Bloomfield site on February 16, Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE), pursuant to the *Fire Safety Act*, installed temporary fencing and established security at the site for public safety. In addition, HRFE contracted a company to demolish the structure damaged by fire because of concerns with the integrity of the building as a result of the fire.

The municipality will be seeking recovery of these costs from the property owner.

Specifically, these costs are for the fencing, security and subsequent demolition of the fire-damaged building.

The property owner has indicated their intent to proceed with demolition of the remaining two structures at the Bloomfield site through the submission of a demolition permit, which

was issued by the municipality on March 11.

Any costs associated with the demolition of the two remaining structures are the responsibility of the property owner.

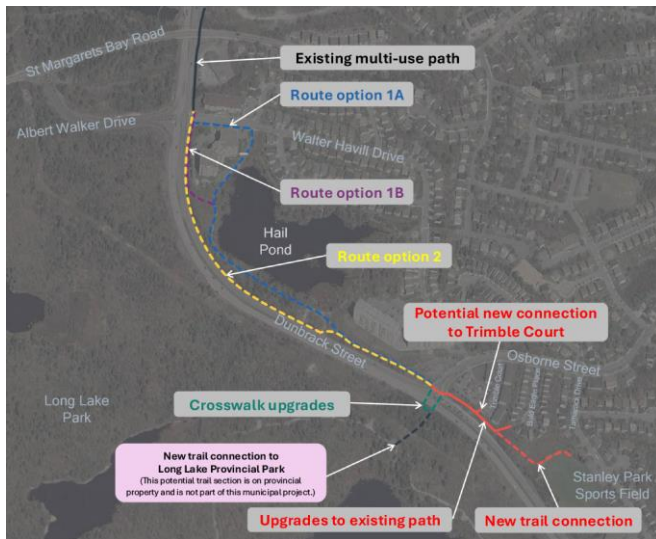

ARGYLE STREET – SUMMER ROAD CLOSURE



The Halifax Regional Municipality is excited to announce the seasonal transformation of Argyle Street into a vibrant pedestrian-first space!

From Monday, April 7 at 9 a.m. to Wednesday, November 12 at 9 a.m., Argyle Street between Prince and Blowers streets will be open

exclusively to people walking, rolling, and cycling. Motor vehicle access will be paused during this time to create a more welcoming, accessible, and active downtown experience for all.

This seasonal initiative, consistent with previous years, is part of the municipality's ongoing commitment to supporting active transportation, accessible public spaces, and vibrant communities — no construction is involved.

SPEED LIMIT REDUCTIONS - FAIRVIEW AREA



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that speed limits have been reduced from 50 km/h to 40 km/h in the residential area of Fairview in Halifax. The impacted streets are inside the boundary on the map shown above and include the following:

- Main Avenue (north);



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- Dutch Village Road (east);
- Highway 102 (south); and,
- Dunbrack Street (west).

The speed limit reduction in these areas has been implemented following provincial approval based on available data and an assessment of roadway characteristics that meet their qualifications. Studies show that a reduction in operating speed from 50km/h to 40km/h increases the pedestrian survival rate by 40 per cent.

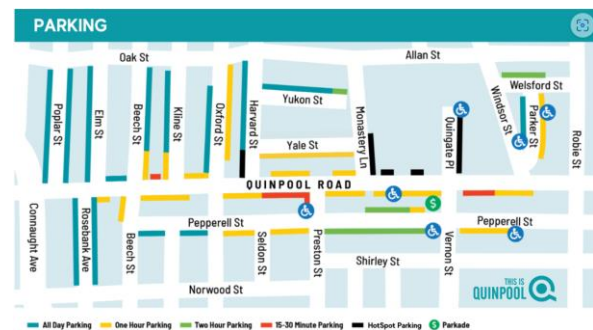
Through the *Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act*, the Province of Nova Scotia legislates speed limits on public roadways to a default speed limit of 50 km/h. The province allows municipalities to request posted speed limits below 50 km/h if accompanied by necessary documentation including current operating speeds and roadway characteristics.

Neighbourhood speed limit reduction is one of many road safety initiatives employed by the Halifax Regional Municipality to achieve the Regional Council-approved commitment to move toward zero fatalities and injuries related to any mode of transportation. Road safety is key to ensuring safe communities with thriving, accessible mobility options for all ages and abilities. 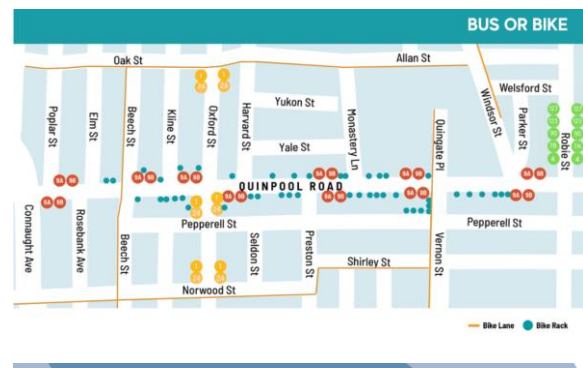
PARKING – QUINPOOL ROAD AREA

Did you know that the Quinpool Road business district has [free parking](#) on most side streets from Robie Street to Connaught Avenue!

There are paid parking spots available through the Hotspot App. Public paid parking is also available at The Keeps's parkade: the garage door is located on Pepperrell Street and is open to the public from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily.



You can also access the Quinpool Road area by Halifax Transit routes along Oxford Street and Quinpool Road. If you are cycling, there are many bike racks available along Quinpool Road shown on the map below.

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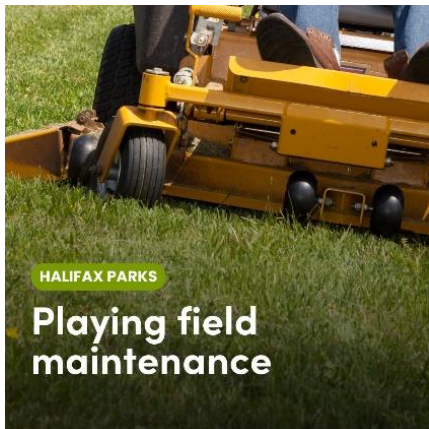
OUTDOOR PICKLEBALL & TENNIS NETS

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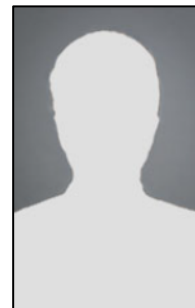
