TRAFFIC CALMING – ARLINGTON, DOULL, PIERS & SPRINGVALE



Halifax Regional Municipality is committed to road safety for all users. In February 2016 Regional Council approved the <u>Traffic Calming</u> <u>Administrative Order</u> which focuses on making neighbourhood streets safer for all users by slowing down traffic. Traffic is calmed by constructing physical measures to encourage safer driving behaviours.





Under the <u>Traffic Calming Administrative</u> Order, a review of Arlington, Doull, Piers & Springvale Avenues was completed which included the collection of vehicle speed and volume data as well as other features of the roadway. As a result, Arlington, Doull, Piers & Springvale Avenues were identified as eligible for traffic calming measures. Speed tables are selected as the appropriate traffic calming measure for Arlington, Doull, Piers & Springvale Avenues.

Speed tables encourage slower speeds of travel by causing discomfort for drivers travelling at higher speeds. There is no negative effect on cyclists riding at moderate speeds, and there is no effect on resident access or on-street parking. Transit buses can also traverse speed tables with minimal impact. With the construction of speed tables on Arlington, Doull, Piers & Springvale Avenues we expect slower vehicular speeds.

This work is planned for the 2025 construction season. Efforts will be taken to reduce the impact to your property during construction. Both on-street and private driveway parking may be impacted. Notice of project timing and impacts to parking and driveway access will be provided before construction.

MUNICIPALITY SETS 2026-2030 STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS



The municipality's administration has started creating the 2026-2030 Strategic Plan and Regional Council has approved the proposed approach in finalizing the Plan.

The Strategic Plan reflects the municipality's vision, mission and values – and establishes key areas of focus now and into the future. The four-year plan outlines priorities and goals, which guide how the municipality tracks progress and aligns business plans and budgets. The plan also helps municipal employees understand how their work fits into the long-term goals of the organization, and how they can work together to make a difference in the region.

The draft Plan content has been informed by the results of the <u>2024 Resident Survey</u> and workshops with Regional Council and the administration's senior leadership.

Regional Council began reviewing the draft plan in May. The feedback will then inform a subsequent round of working group meetings

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and plan development in advance of the final Plan being presented to Regional Council in summer 2025.

TICK CHECKS



As we spend more time outdoors, it's important to be aware of ticks and how to protect yourself. Ticks can be found in wooded areas, tall grass, and shrubs — even in urban parks and backyards.

To reduce your risk:

- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Tuck pants into socks and shirts into pants
- Do a full body check after being outdoors — on yourself, children, and pets
- Shower within two hours of coming inside



HRM GRASS CUTTING



Grass cutting season has begun. From May to October of each year, the municipality cuts the grass at 2,500 individual sites across the region and maintains over 6.2 million square metres of grass found in parks, Halifax Regional Centre for Education (HRCE) properties, athletic fields, municipal facilities, and rights-of-ways. Grass cutting is delivered through contractors, community partnerships and in-house resources.

In previous seasons, some right-of-way areas were included in municipal grass cutting service operations, however; that practice was discontinued following the 2023/24 budget decisions.




The Halifax Regional Municipality is inviting residents to provide feedback on recreation membership options.

A wide range of data can be freely accessed through the catalogue, such as transit routes and schedule data, solid waste collection schedules and area rates. New data releases occur several times throughout the year, with the most recent release on March 26, 2025.

The Open Data initiative was launched in early 2014 to help improve resident engagement and enhance transparency on municipal data. The program was formalized by Regional Council later that year through the adoption



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of <u>Administrative Order 2014-006-ADM</u> <u>Respecting Open Data</u>.

HALIFAX TRANSIT SCHEDULE & ROUTE CHANGES



Halifax Transit is adjusting resources to better meet the needs of residents throughout the municipality. Therefore, the following Halifax Transit service changes took effect on Monday, May 19:

Route 10C:

This route will have a Saturday schedule adjustment.

Routing changes:

- Route 330 will undergo a routing change to travel along Dunbrack Street. No stops will be impacted.
- Route 84 will undergo a routing change to travel along Reconciliation Way. No stops will be impacted.

Bay changes:

- Regional Express Routes 320, 330, and 370 will service Scotia Square Bay 4 instead of the stop at Duke Street before Albemarle Street.
- Routes 2, 7B, 9A/B, 29, 93, 135, 136, 137, 138, 158, 159, 161, 165, 168A/B, 182, 183, 185, and 186 will service different bays at Scotia Square.
- Routes 5, 58, 63, and 158 will service different bays at Portland Hills Terminal.

Reinstated Trips:

A total of 9 previously cancelled trips will be reinstated across Routes 65, 68, 84, 85, 165, 168A, 168B, 182 and 185.

E-powered and segway-style equipment **are not permitted** on the Emera Oval to ensure the safety of others.

The municipality will also be hosting Rec Day programming at the Emera Oval on Saturday, June 7 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Activities will include face painting, inflatables and various municipal program demonstrations.

Representatives from Halifax Fire & Emergency, Halifax Regional Police, Speedy Kids, Disc Dolf Nova Scotia, Halifax Tides FC, Sportball Nova Scotia and Athletics Nova Scotia will also be in attendance.
