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### COMMUNITY CORNER

#### **Ross Road Realignment**

Budget Committee has voted to accelerate the detailed design of the Ross Road realignment by one year. This means long-awaited improvements to the intersection will begin in 2026. Thank you to Councillor David Hendsbee for championing this project and to Council for supporting the faster timeline.

#### Caldwell Road Phase 2

This completion of Caldwell Road has been pushed out to 2026 due to utility pole relocation delays. The delays are due to easement issues, capacity issues, and HRM not having the ability to hurry the process. We are waiting on third party work. Very sorry for the continued frustration this delay causes.

## **Astral Drive Recapitalization**

Astral Drive is slated for 2025 for the first phase of the recapitalization project. Phase One will be from Selig to Stratford including integrated traffic calming. Knowing that Caldwell Road would be delayed yet another year, staff worked hard to get the detailed design work for Astral completed in time to be able to begin phase one this year. Very thankful they got it done in time! Thank you!

### **Sherwood Development**

HRM Planning have completed the Development Permit review for this site. Next step is for the lot to be subdivided to accommodate the proposal. It is now with the applicant to submit applications for subdivision and building permits. We do not have an ETA as to when this will be. I will continue to reach out to staff for updates.

#### **Broom Road Development**

HRM Planning have completed the Development Permit review. The lot needs to be subdivided to accommodate the proposal which will include wastewater extension. The next step is now with the applicant to submit applications for subdivision and building permits. We do not have an ETA as to when this will be. I will continue to reach out to staff for updates.

## MUNICIPALITY SETS 2026-2030 STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS



The municipality's administration has started creating the 2026-2030 Strategic Plan and Regional Council has approved the proposed approach in finalizing the Plan.

The Strategic Plan reflects the municipality's vision, mission and values – and establishes key areas of focus now and into the future. The four-year plan outlines priorities and goals, which guide how the municipality tracks progress and aligns business plans and budgets. The plan also helps municipal employees understand how their work fits into the long-term goals of the organization, and how they can work together to make a difference in the region.

The draft Plan content has been informed by the results of the <u>2024 Resident Survey</u> and workshops with Regional Council and the administration's senior leadership.

In May, Regional Council began reviewing the draft plan. This feedback will then inform a subsequent round of working group meetings and plan development in advance of the final Plan being presented to Regional Council in summer 2025.

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## COUNCIL APPROVES NEXT STEP TOWARD DOWNTOWN DARTMOUTH HERITAGE DISTRICT

At the Tuesday, May 13 meeting, Regional Council voted to advance plans for a Heritage Conservation District (HCD) in Downtown Dartmouth by accepting a staff background study and initiating public consultation.

The recommendation, brought forward by the Heritage Advisory Committee, highlights the area's unique historic character — including its 1750 street grid, harbour views, and heritage buildings like Quaker House and Christ Church.

Council approved two key actions:

- Accepting the background study as the basis for establishing a Heritage Conservation District in Downtown Dartmouth.
- Beginning public consultation in accordance with the Public Participation Program for HCDs, adopted by Council in 2020.

The consultation process will include multiple opportunities for residents to share their perspectives and shape the future HCD plan and by-law. This approach ensures that development in the area continues in a way that respects and reflects its heritage value.

A final plan is expected to return to Council in 2026.

## **COUNCIL APPROVES 2025-2026 EVENTS EAST BUSINESS PLAN**




Regional Council has approved the 2025/26 Events East Business Plan.

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
## RCMP ROAD SAFETY STATS MARCH 2025

## District 4: Cole Harbour – Preston – Westphal – Cherry Brook

In March 2025, RCMP responded to 769 calls for service, down 23% from the same time last year. Officers issued 20 summary offence tickets, primarily for aggressive driving, speeding, and uninsured or unlicensed drivers.

There were 335 proactive assignments, including enforcement of cell phone, impaired driving, seatbelt, and speeding laws — a decrease from 483 in March 2024.

98 traffic stops led to 2 impaired driving charges and 1 suspension. Motor vehicle accidents dropped to 17 (from 22 last year), with only one resulting in injury. One vehicle/pedestrian/cyclist collision occurred, with no injuries reported. Let's all do our part—please drive safely!

- 3. All unclaimed items must be removed by dusk on Sunday. Consider donating unclaimed items to charity.

### **Examples of items you can give away:**

 Books, furniture, appliances, sports equipment, tools, electronics, clothing, and more.

## What not to place at the curb:

 Non-reusable items or those that could be infested with pests (e.g., mattresses).

#### **Curbside Etiquette:**

- Ensure items are clean and in reusable condition.
- Items you want to keep should be kept away from the curb.
- Follow traffic laws for safety.

## **TICK CHECKS**



As we spend more time outdoors, it's important to be aware of ticks and how to protect yourself. Ticks can be found in wooded areas, tall grass, and shrubs — even in urban parks and backyards. To reduce your risk:

- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Tuck pants into socks and shirts into pants
- Do a full body check after being outdoors
   on yourself, children, and pets
- Shower within two hours of coming inside

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## BUS STOP REMOVAL – CIRCASSION DRIVE



As part of HRM's Accessibility Strategy and the approved 2025/26 Capital Budget, the bus stop at Circassion Dr. Before Ellerslie Cr. (6425) will be permanently removed during the 2025 construction season.

The concrete pad and signpost will be taken out and replaced with soil and sod. Minimal disruption to adjacent properties is expected, and all work will occur within HRM's right-ofway.

#### HOUSEHOLD LITTER IN PARKS

In 2021, HRM Solid Waste Resources began enforcement of new illegal dumping regulations. Municipal staff enforce enhanced measures related to illegal dumping and litter, including in parks. The municipality will also be hosting Rec Day programming at the Emera Oval on Saturday, June 7 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Activities will include face painting, inflatables and various municipal program demonstrations.

Representatives from Halifax Fire & Emergency, Halifax Regional Police, Speedy Kids, Disc Dolf Nova Scotia, Halifax Tides FC, Sportball Nova Scotia and Athletics Nova Scotia will also be in attendance.

## FREE WILDFIRE RISK ASSESSMENT FROM FIRESMART




Wildfires are becoming more frequent and severe, especially in areas where homes meet natural vegetation.


### **CAMPFIRES IN MUNICIPAL PARKS**

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### SECOND UNIT INCENTIVE PROGRAM



HRM, with help from funding from the federal government's Housing Accelerator Fund, has introduced a new grant program to help property owners create more housing options.

The Second Unit Incentive

Program offers financial grants to help offset costs associated with building new secondary units. Eligible residents can receive up to \$12,000 to help reduce building expenses related to water and wastewater.
