NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLE DAY

June 21 is National Indigenous Peoples Day, a time to celebrate the heritage, cultures and contributions of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples across Canada.

The date was chosen to align with the summer solstice—an important and symbolic time for many Indigenous communities.

This day of recognition was officially declared in 1996 by the Governor General of Canada, following years of advocacy and recommendations from Indigenous leaders and organizations, including the Assembly of First Nations and the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples.

In 2017, the name was changed from National Aboriginal Day to National Indigenous Peoples Day, reflecting a broader and more inclusive understanding of Indigenous identities.

ZERO EMISSION BUSES NOW IN SERVICE

Halifax Transit has officially launched its first electric buses into service, marking the completion of Phase 1 of the municipality's Zero Emission Bus Project. This milestone includes the arrival of 60 electric buses and the expansion of the Ragged Lake Transit Centre to accommodate them, along with a deep energy retrofit of the facility to meet net-zero ready standards.

The project, the first of its kind in Atlantic Canada, aligns with municipal, provincial, and federal climate goals, including those outlined in HalifACT, the municipality's climate action plan. It was made possible through a \$112 million investment shared by all three levels of government.

The first electric bus arrived in December 2023 for testing and training. Three buses began operating in regular passenger service in December 2024, helping staff assess performance in real-world conditions.

Planning is now underway for Phase 2, which involves a rebuild of the Burnside Transit Centre to support additional electric buses and incorporate future low-emission fuel technologies. Another \$20.7 million has been committed to support this next stage of work.

This project represents a major step forward in modernizing public transit and reducing greenhouse gas emissions across the municipality.

MICROMOBILITY PILOT PROJECT

On May 14, shared micromobility (e-bikes and e-scooters) launched across Halifax, with more to come!

Phase 1 of the service begins in downtown areas and will expand to other parts of the municipality over the coming weeks.

To help improve access, discounted rates will apply automatically to trips that begin in designated flex-fare zones identified as historically underserved.

EMERA OVAL SUMMER SEASON NOW OPEN!

The Emera Oval is now open for the summer season! Residents will be able to enjoy the concrete surface for rollerskating, biking, skateboarding, in-line skating and more. Free equipment rentals, including bikes, scooters and skateboards, will be available – as well as access to public washrooms and first aid stations. Helmets are mandatory for all users and are also available for rent free of charge. Valid ID is required for all rentals.

E-powered and segway-style equipment are not permitted on the Emera Oval to ensure the safety of others.

The municipality will also be hosting Rec Day programming at the Emera Oval on Saturday, June 7 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Activities will include face painting, inflatables and various municipal program demonstrations.

Representatives from Halifax Fire & Emergency, Halifax Regional Police, Speedy Kids, Disc Dolf Nova Scotia, Halifax Tides FC, Sportball Nova Scotia and Athletics Nova Scotia will also be in attendance.

MUNICIPALITY SETS 2026-2030 STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS

The municipality's administration has started creating the 2026-2030 Strategic Plan and Regional Council has approved the proposed approach in finalizing the Plan.

The Strategic Plan reflects the municipality's vision, mission and values – and establishes key areas of focus now and into the future. The four-year plan outlines priorities and goals, which guide how the municipality tracks progress and aligns business plans and budgets. The plan also helps municipal employees understand how their work fits into the long-term goals of the organization, and how they can work together to make a difference in the region.

The draft Plan content has been informed by the results of the 2024 Resident Survey and workshops with Regional Council and the administration's senior leadership.

Beginning in May, Regional Council will review the draft plan. This feedback will then inform a subsequent round of working group meetings and plan development in advance of the final Plan being presented to Regional Council in summer 2025.
