

Location





1. Age


- 1850s originally part of a large vacant lot owned by the Woodill family
- 1862 Fredrick Warner, (carpenter)
 purchased a lot from Woodill for \$600





1. Age

- November 1863 J. Coombes (barrister) purchased lot A for \$1,448
- January 1864 W. Coombes (cabinet maker) purchased lot B (subject property) for \$1,000
 - One of the boundary lines in this deed is described as the "division wall of a double cottage"

Date of Construction	Points	Timeline
1749 - 1785	25	Halifax Garrison Town to the Loyalist migration
1786 - 1830	20	Boom period following construction of Shubenacadie Canal
1831 - 1867	16	From Boom to Confederation
1868 - 1899	13	Confederation to the end of the 19 th century
1900 - 1917	9	Turn of the Century to Halifax Harbour Explosion
1918 - 1945	5	The War Years
1945 - Present	3	Post-War






George Roache (1862-1918), Restaurateur & Vice President of Atlantic Advocate

- Started as a ship cook and steward
- Moved his family back to Halifax in 1905 and purchased this dwelling (also known as Porters House) in 1906
- Operated two restaurants in Halifax
- Vice President of Atlantic Advocate







Blanche (Roache) Davis (1894-1971)

- Daughter of George Roache
- First black woman accepted to the Conservatory of Music in Halifax (now the Maritime Conservatory of Music)
- Gave piano lessons from the dwelling
- Led the way for future black students



Railway Porters and Unionization Morris Davis (1882-1948)



- Advanced to Porter Instructor by 1941
- Awarded Dominion
 Service Medal in 1947
- Retired from CNR in 1947 after 36 years of service

Booker Roache (1905-1988)



- Advanced to Porter Instructor by 1945
- Chairman of Division

3. Significance of Architect / Builder

Fredrick Warner

- Local carpenter who also purchased / sold property
- Likely the dwelling's builder
- Mortgage suggests he was advanced money for construction

William Coombes

May have completed some finishings given that he was a cabinet maker

4a. Architectural Merit [Construction Type]

- Combination frame which utilized both timber and ballon framing methods
- Brick and rubblestone foundation
- Wood cladding



Ballon-like construction evident in spacing of studs with nail marks





4a. Architectural Merit [Construction Type]



Very rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early example	4 - 6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3
Not rare/ common example	0



4b. Architectural Merit [Style]

Character-defining elements include, but are not limited to:

- Two-storey Halifax Box style dwelling with a two-bay façade and a nearly flat roof;
- Central single-stack brick chimney;
- Flat and narrow wood windows with wood trim;
- Paired windows on the façade's second storey;
- Projecting eaves with wood detailing;
- Wood moulded corner boards; and
- Elevated front entrance with enclosed porch, moulded sill, and a wood side door.





4b. Architectural Merit [Style]

B) Style	Points
Very rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early example	4 - 6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3
Not rare/ common example	3



5. Architectural Integrity

Dwelling has Moderate Integrity

- Overall plan and CDEs remain
- Rear addition and chimney added c.1890s;
 storm porch likely added at the same time
- Rear addition expanded in 20th century
- Rear windows expanded
- First-floor windows on façade modified
- Vinyl cladding along side of house





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
5. Architectural Integrity

Exterior change	Points
Largely unchanged	11 - 15
Modest changes	6 - 10
Major changes	1 - 5
Seriously compromised	0






6. Relationship to Surrounding Area



- Has physical associations to the surrounding area
- Consistent with the architectural form of the Maynard Street / Creighton's Field neighbourhood

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6. Relationship to Surrounding Area

Relationship to Surrounding Area	Points
The building is an important architectural asset contributing to the heritage character of the surrounding area	6 - 10
The architecture is compatible with the surrounding area and maintains its heritage character	1 - 5
Does not contribute to the character of the surrounding area	0



Recommendation

That the Heritage Advisory Committee recommend that Regional Council:

- 1. Set a date for a heritage hearing to consider the inclusion of the subject property in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality; and
- 2. Approve the request to include 2316 Maynard Street, Halifax, in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality, as shown on Map 1 of the staff report dated May 6, 2025, as a municipal heritage property under the Heritage Property Act.
