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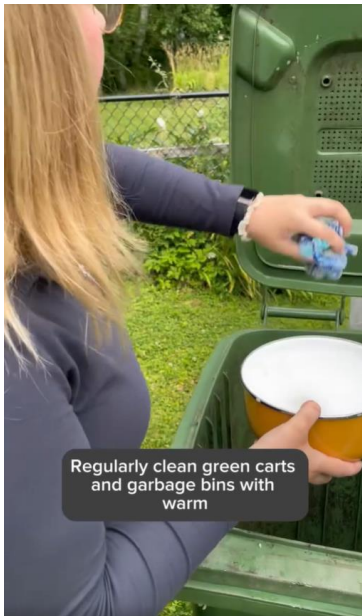

WEEKLY GREEN CART COLLECTION



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that weekly green cart collection **will begin Monday, July 21 and continue until Friday, Sept. 12** in all communities across the

municipality.

In past years, this enhanced service has run from July through September. During the 2025-26 budget process, Regional Council approved a shortened summer collection period.

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Residents are asked to place materials curbside prior to 7 a.m. on collection day to guarantee pickup, ensuring items are contained and secured from wildlife. To find your collection schedule, visit [our website](#).

Bi-weekly green cart collection will resume on Monday, Sept. 15.

HALIFAX COMMON POOL & MUNICIPAL SPLASH PADS



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the Halifax Common pool, located on the Halifax Mainland Common, opened on Sunday, June 15. All municipal splash pads also opened on June 15.



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The Halifax Common pool offers a 25-metre, five-lane swimming pool, three climbing walls, beach entry with play features and large universal change rooms. Access to lane swimming and open swims are free of charge and available on a first-come, first-served basis. For more information and hours of operation, visit [our website](#).

E-SCOOTERS – SHARED MICROMOBILITY PILOT PROJECT



The municipality is improving transportation options in and around the urban centre with the approval of a service provider for shared micromobility (e-scooters and e-bikes).

After a rigorous and competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) evaluation, the municipality has entered a two-year shared micromobility pilot with [Bird Canada](#).

People riding e-scooters generally have the same rights, rules and responsibilities as people riding bikes but there are more specific restrictions with e-scooters.

[By-law M-300, the Micromobility By-law](#) permits e-scooter use in the following locations:

1. roadways having a speed limit of 50 kilometers per hour or less
2. bicycle lanes on any roadway
3. multi-use pathways within streets



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The by-law also specifies that no person shall operate an electric kick-scooter:

1. at a speed in excess of 25 kilometers per hour on a roadway or bicycle lane
2. at a speed in excess of 15 kilometers per hour on a multi-use pathway
3. on a sidewalk

E-scooters are not permitted on multi-use pathways in parks unless they are signed as permitted. See [here](#) for a list of trails where e-scooters are permitted.

E-scooter and e-bike etiquette:

- ride with care around pedestrians
- ring your bell before passing
- obey traffic signs and signals
- park in a secure, upright position in designated areas. Ensure you are not obstructing sidewalks, travel lanes, doorways, driveways, bike lanes, etc.

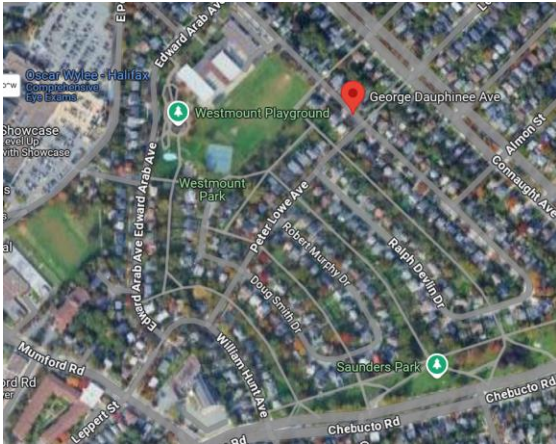

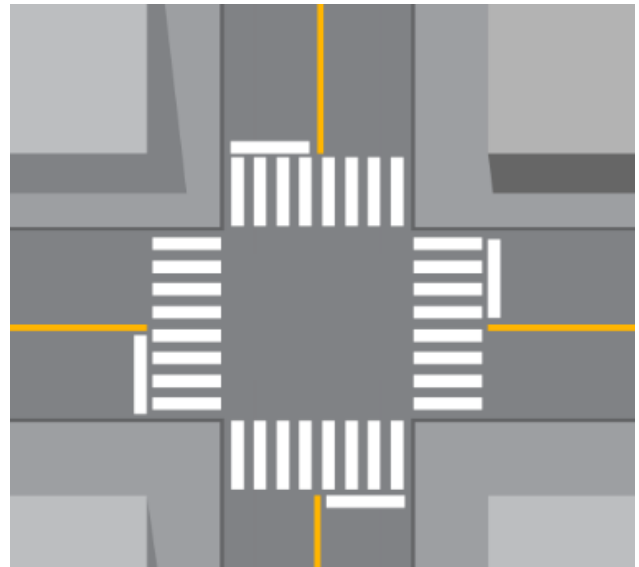
The construction work generally consists of the following:

- the installation of sharrows symbols on the roadway
- new urban signposts

- removal of existing fence and pillars at Stuart Graham Drive
- installation of new boulevard with monolithic curb and sod
- installation of bollards, and asphalt replacement.

SAFETY UPGRADES COMING TO 65 INTERSECTIONS



The Halifax Regional Municipality is upgrading 65 intersections across the region to high-visibility zebra crosswalks. The crosswalk upgrades are part of an overall goal to adapt all signalized intersection crosswalks to zebra crosswalks. This work supports the [Road Safety](#)

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Strategy by improving pedestrian safety at key locations.

After conducting an evaluation of the effectiveness of zebra markings, the municipality formally adopted their use at all signalized intersections in 2024. Upgrades will be made through a multi-year implementation plan.

These enhanced crosswalk markings cannot accommodate additional graphics while meeting the technical requirements. As such, zebra crosswalk markings will replace existing rainbow crosswalk markings at eight intersections this year. New rainbow crosswalk markings will be repainted at alternative locations to replace those impacted by this work, where feasible.

The municipality recognizes the symbolic importance of rainbow crosswalks, particularly during Pride Month, and is committed to implementing this program in a respectful and transparent way. Rainbow and Pan-African designs remain part of the municipality's commitment to diversity and inclusion and celebration of diverse communities. The municipality will engage community to explore alternative ways to continue this recognition in public spaces.

- Quinpool Road and Harvard Street

TICK CHECKS



As we spend more time outdoors, it's important to be aware of ticks and how to protect yourself. Ticks can be found in wooded areas, tall grass, and shrubs — even in urban parks and backyards. To reduce your risk:

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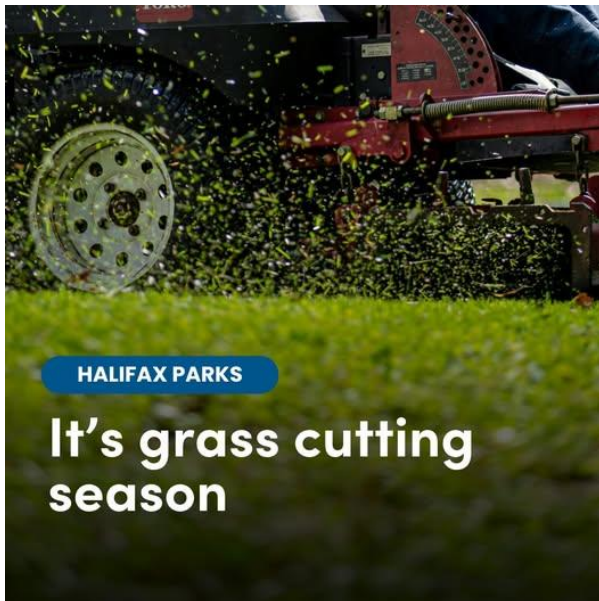
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- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Tuck pants into socks and shirts into pants
- Do a full body check after being outdoors — on yourself, children, and pets
- Shower within two hours of coming inside

HRM GRASS CUTTING



The grass cutting season has begun. From May to October of each year, the municipality cuts the grass at 2,500 individual sites across the region and maintains over 6.2 million square metres of grass found in parks, Halifax Regional Centre for Education (HRCE)

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properties, athletic fields, municipal facilities, and rights-of-ways. Grass cutting is delivered through contractors, community partnerships and in-house resources.

In previous seasons, some right-of-way areas were included in municipal grass cutting service operations, however; that practice was discontinued following the 2023/24 budget decisions.

In November 2021, HRM Solid Waste Resources began enforcement of new illegal dumping regulations.

As part of the Regional Plan Phase 4 Review schema changes were required to differentiate between primary and sub-designations.

A wide range of data can be sourced for free through the catalogue, such as transit routes and schedule data, solid waste collection schedules, and area rates. New data releases occur several times throughout the year, with

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the most recent release on Wednesday, May 7, 2025.

The Open Data initiative was launched in early 2014 to help improve resident engagement and enhance transparency on municipal data. The program was formalized by Regional Council later that year through the adoption of [Administrative Order 2014-006-ADM Respecting Open Data](#).

SUPPORTING PEOPLE SLEEPING ROUGH IN DESIGNATED LOCATIONS



This map shows the designated camping areas for people experiencing homelessness. (Halifax Regional Municipality)

As of Friday, June 20, municipal housing and homelessness staff determined that there were 48 tents and four trailers in the municipality's four remaining designated locations. From the outset, the municipality has been clear that the creation of designated locations would be temporary. They were established in July 2022 to address an immediate need to ensure people had a location to go to if they had no other option but to sleep rough.

The municipality is constantly assessing the need for designated locations. As more indoor shelter spaces and supportive housing options become available, more municipal designated locations will be closed, de-designated and returned to their intended purposes as spaces for everyone.

The municipality remains committed to ensuring those sleeping rough are provided with better alternatives, working toward having safer, long-term housing options for everyone who needs them.

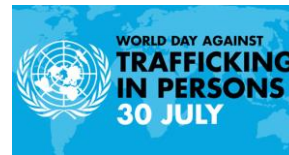

WORLD DAY AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS



On July 30, we pause to reflect on the devastating impacts of human trafficking, a

crime that continues to thrive in the shadows, even within our own communities. As we mark World Day Against Trafficking in Persons 2025, we're reminded that this global crisis is ongoing and growing in scale, reach, and violence.

This year's campaign, "[Human Trafficking is Organized Crime – End the Exploitation](#)," shines a light on the powerful criminal networks driving this exploitation. From 2020 to 2023, more than 200,000 victims were identified globally, yet we know that's only a fraction of the true toll. Victims are trafficked farther, held longer, and subjected to greater harm, all in pursuit of profit.

Despite growing awareness, we must do more. The campaign calls on governments, law enforcement, civil society, and citizens to take stronger action through cross-border

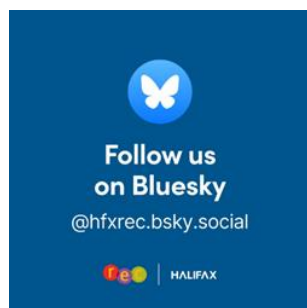


cooperation, tougher laws, smarter technology, and victim-centred support. We need justice systems that hold traffickers accountable while protecting survivors with dignity and care.

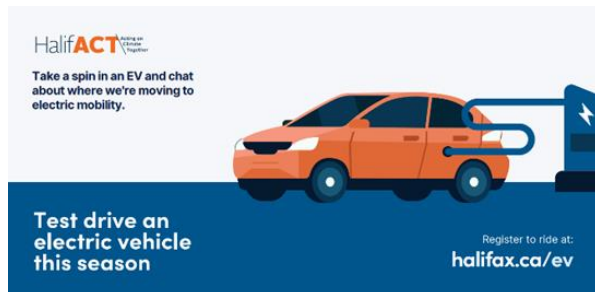

With more Level 2 and Level 3 fast chargers being installed across the municipality, it's easier than ever to consider making the switch to electric. Whether you're interested in reducing your emissions, saving on fuel, or just curious about the technology, this is a great opportunity to learn more.

RURAL TRANSIT INITIATIVE APPROVED



The Transportation Standing Committee has approved a set of recommendations to help strengthen transit service in rural communities across Halifax Regional Municipality.

The recommendations follow a review of the Rural Transit Funding Program, which was first implemented in 2014 to provide financial support to non-profit providers that serve areas outside Halifax Transit's main service boundary.

The report was based on extensive community engagement, a gap-and-needs analysis, and consultation with stakeholders, service providers, community members, and members of the Regional Council.

Key initiatives include creating a Rural Transit Advisory Group to guide implementation, adding a new capital grant funding stream, developing a professional training and support program for providers, exploring fare integration with Halifax Transit, and preparing

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a Microtransit Service Plan to address gaps in service delivery.

This work is expected to proceed in phases starting in the 2025/26 fiscal year, with funding already approved in the current budget. Additional funding may be considered in future reports as initiatives move forward.
