EMANCIPATION DAY



Aug. 1 is
Emancipation

Scotia, a day
to
acknowledge
the history
and legacy of

slavery in Canada and to recognize the strength and contributions of people of African descent.

Emancipation Day marks the anniversary of Aug. 1, 1834, when the Slavery Abolition Act of 1833 came into effect, ending slavery in most parts of the British Empire, including Canada.

The day provides an opportunity to reflect on the ongoing impacts of systemic anti-Black racism, and to engage in meaningful conversations about equity, justice, and inclusion. It is also a time to honour the heritage, culture, and resilience of African Nova Scotian communities across the region

NATIONAL ACADIAN DAY



Since 1881, Acadians have celebrated National Acadian Day on Aug. 15, a tradition established at

the first National Acadian Convention in Memramcook, N.B.

The day is marked by community gatherings, music, and the *Tintamarre*, a festive procession where participants make noise as they walk together to celebrate Acadian identity and solidarity.

National Acadian Day is an opportunity to learn about the history and cultural contributions of Acadians, and to participate in celebrations taking place across the municipality.

The Halifax region is home to the largest Acadian and Francophone population in Nova Scotia. In recognition of this important day, the municipality will host its 12th annual National Acadian Day flag raising ceremony at 12:00 noon in the Grand Parade.

UPDATE ON STRONG MAYOR POWERS MOTION



At the July
10 Regional
Council
meeting,
Regional
Council
voted in
favour of a
motion

requesting consultation from the Province of Nova Scotia if it considers introducing strong mayor powers in Halifax or other municipalities.

The motion directs the Mayor to:

- Write a letter to the Minister of Municipal Affairs requesting that the province engage in discussion with Halifax Regional Municipality and other municipalities prior to any legislative changes.
- Write a letter to the Nova Scotia
 Federation of Municipalities Board encouraging them to adopt a similar position.
- Submit both letters by July 22 and circulate any responses to Council.

Council also directed the Chief Administrative Officer to prepare a staff report on how strong mayor powers have been implemented in other Canadian jurisdictions and what lessons may apply locally.

Strong mayor powers vary depending on provincial legislation but could include authority over hiring senior staff, preparing budgets, or vetoing council decisions. How such powers

would apply in Nova Scotia would be determined by the province.

UPDATE ON MORRIS STREET EAST CONNECTION



At the July 8
Regional
Council
meeting,
Regional
Council
considered a
motion
requesting a

new report on the Morris Street East Connection, a proposed cycling link through the south end of the Halifax peninsula.

The motion, introduced by Mayor Andy Fillmore, asked staff to revisit alternatives to the current design. Specifically, options that would maintain two-way vehicle traffic on Morris Street and avoid impacts to traffic flow on Lower Water Street. Council voted 13–4 against the motion.

The Morris Street East Connection is part of the broader Peninsula South Complete Streets project and was originally approved in October 2024. It includes a two-way protected bike lane and would convert Morris Street to one-way eastbound for vehicles. Other routing options were considered during earlier phases of project planning.

CAO CATHIE O'TOOLE ANNOUNCES INTENTION TO RETIRE



On July 9, Cathie O'Toole announced her intention to retire as Chief Administrative Officer of the Halifax Regional Municipality after over 25 years of public service.

Ms. O'Toole, who has served as Chief

Administrative Officer since January 2023, will continue in her role into October and assist Mayor and Regional Council in the development of a transition plan for the municipality.

"It has been an honour to serve both the municipality and Halifax Water, and I take pride in the projects and initiatives I have had the privilege of working on and leading," said Ms. O'Toole.

In the coming weeks, additional details will be shared, including Ms. O'Toole's last day, and the transition plan.

COGSWELL DISTRICT PROJECT CONSTRUCTION TO REACH SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION BY END OF YEAR

The final phase of construction of the Cogswell District project marks a major milestone in transforming this key area of downtown Halifax into a vibrant, connected urban space. Over the next six months, the project will deliver significant infrastructure improvements, including the completion of Upper Water Street's realignment, modernized underground services and new corridors such as Amalamek Way and Nora Bernard Street.

Active transportation infrastructure will be expanded with the completion of the multi-use path network. With new lots prepared for future development, green spaces like Granville Park nearing completion and major roadways reopened or reconnected, this phase will bring the project's construction to substantial completion — creating a more accessible and well-connected downtown district. HALIFAX REGIONAL COUNCIL SUPPORTS NEW COMMUNITY MEDIATION PILOT

Halifax Regional Council has approved funding and directed staff to collaborate with the United Way Maritimes to create and implement a Community Mediation pilot program. This initiative will provide voluntary, confidential, and impartial mediation services to residents experiencing interpersonal disputes across multiple neighbourhoods in the municipality. The pilot program aims to improve community safety and cohesion by offering no-cost mediation and conflict coaching in accessible, neutral locations, including virtual options. The program will focus on common neighbourhood conflicts such as noise, parking, property boundaries, and nuisance issues, while excluding legal and certain sensitive matters.

This partnership leverages United Way Maritimes' extensive community presence and expertise to deliver services in diverse urban and rural areas including Spryfield, Fairview, Dartmouth North, and East Preston. A project coordinator will be hired to oversee program design and delivery, with referral pathways established through municipal staff, community partners, and self-referrals. This program supports safer, stronger communities by offering a helpful way to solve disputes without legal action.

MUNICIPALITY LAUNCHES SURPLUS LANDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING PILOT PROGRAM

Through the federal Housing Accelerator Fund, the Halifax Regional Municipality is launching the Surplus Lands for Affordable Housing Pilot Program to support non-profit housing development. The program will make four surplus municipal properties available to eligible non-profit organizations for one dollar to help offset land acquisition costs:

48 Pinecrest Drive, Dartmouth

15 Laurelcrest Drive, Eastern Passage

18 Scotia Drive, Bedford

6850 Bayers Road, Halifax

The municipality is holding an open house where you can learn more and ask questions on **August 12** – Bedford Public Library (5–7 p.m.) Applicants must meet existing residential zoning requirements. Successful projects will offer below-market rental units and be ready for construction by October 2026.

E-SCOOTER RULES



With more people using e-scooters across the municipality, it's important to know where and how they can be used. Under By-law M-300 (the Micromobility By-law), as well as the Province of Nova Scotia's Motor

Vehicle Act, here's what you need to know:

Where e-scooters are allowed:

On roads with speed limits of $50 \, \text{km/h}$ or lower In bike lanes

On multi-use pathways within streets

Where e-scooters are not allowed:

On sidewalks

On park trails, unless they are specifically signed as permitted

At speeds over 25 km/h on roads or bike lanesAt speeds over 15 km/h on multi-use pathways

Safety first:

Riders must wear a helmet
Riders must be at least 14 years old
E-scooters may also be used on private property
with permission from the property owner.
By following the rules, we can all help ensure
micromobility options like e-scooters continue to
be a safe and accessible part of how we move
through our communities.

HEAT SAFETY

Extreme heat events can occur in Nova Scotia, typically between July and September, and are characterized by temperatures remaining high during the day and night for several consecutive days. The following precautions may help mitigate the impact of extreme heat:

- Dress appropriately and wear sunscreen.
 Be sure to wear a hat and loose layers of light-coloured clothing.
- Stay hydrated. Have lots of cool drinks available and be sure to drink before you feel thirsty. Hydrating foods are also helpful. Stay away from sugar and alcoholic drinks as these can dehydrate you.
- Keep cool. Stay indoors and avoid physical exertion during extreme heat events. If you plan to spend time outdoors, or will be working outdoors, take breaks from the sun by spending time in a cool place such as a tree-shaded area or an airconditioned space including public libraries or recreation facilities such as pools or splashpads.
- Draw curtains at home during peak hours and use a fan or air conditioner. Drawing curtains helps avoid passively heating your home.
- Keep your pets hydrated and in a shady area.



Visitors to Dollar Lake Provincial Park will soon enjoy a more welcoming and comfortable experience, Colchester-Musquodoboit Valley MLA Hon. Scott Armstrong has announced. A \$1.6 million investment from the Houston Government will support campsite upgrades, paved parking lots, a new washroom and lifeguard building, improvements to concession areas, and accessibility improvements to the day-use area and beach access, improving visitor experiences and ensuring sustainable access to Dollar Lake's natural beauty.

"The multi-year redevelopment at Dollar Lake Provincial Park is fantastic news for families and outdoor enthusiasts," said MLA Armstrong.
"These thoughtful enhancements will preserve the park's natural beauty, and the addition of serviced campsites make it an even more inviting destination for all.

This local project is part of a broader investment in 16 provincial parks across Nova Scotia, under the government's \$13.8 million capital plan focused on enhancing visitor experience and improving park infrastructure.

This includes water and sewer system upgrades at camping parks, washroom improvements, trail enhancements, and parking lot redevelopments; investments all aimed at improving visitor safety, comfort, and access.

More than one million people visited provincial parks in 2024, a record that underscores their importance to both recreation and rural tourism.

Visitors are reminded to follow provincial burn restrictions. Campfires are banned in day-use parks and only allowed at camping parks during approved hours, based on the BurnSafe map. Violations may result in a \$25,000 fine.
