THE LOCAL IMPACT

The outcomes of our programs are clear and measurable, and felt locally in our families, schools, workplaces and neighbourhoods.

We exclusively serve families and youth in HRM – youth at risk of not fulfilling their potential due to circumstances outside their control.

We facilitate mentoring for our community's future leaders, employees and citizens.

Studies show intentionally mentored youth:

- Better school achievement
- Improved mental health
- Greater confidence
- Reduced interaction with law enforcement
- Lower likelihood of engaging in risky behaviours
- Increased community connectedness

Every \$1 invested in Big Brothers Big Sisters programs results in an \$18 - \$23 ROI to the community.






FUNDING THE IMPACT

We must **fundraise 85% of our annual budget** required to support the hundreds of youth and families we serve each year.

We have diverse revenue streams, of which our clothing donation social enterprise is a vital component. We collect and sell reusable goods to generate between 15% and 20% of this revenue every year.





SOCIAL ENTERPRISE = LOCAL IMPACT

CHARITY OPERATED - 100% LOCAL SINCE 1999



Our initiative is completely charity-run.

This means everyone from our drivers to our call centre representatives are locally-based employees.

We're proud to be a local employer contributing to our local economy, all while keeping nearly 2 million pounds of goods out of landfill every year.



Our donation bins are owned and managed by us.

We don't engage a third party to maintain or service our bins, and we pride ourselves on being prompt and diligent in keeping the area around them clean.

We gain express permission to place our bins on host sites and highly value the relationships we have with those property owners.

FUNDING THE IMPACT – The Power of 3

Donation bins have a significant economic, environmental and social impact. For charities, increased volume of textiles resulting from additional support of textile recovery practices would lead to increased resale revenues, and in turn support local jobs and community social programs.



Economic

- Local jobs
- Support of other local businesses
- Savings on tipping fees



Environmental

 2 million pounds of reusable items diverted from landfill every year



Social

- Each bin generates approximately \$6K in revenue per year
- Revenue supports charitable work
- Directly impacts local families and youth

Textile Waste – A Growing Problem

(Based on 2023 Divert NS provincial landfill audit, 2024 Halifax Solid Waste Strategy survey, 2017 Environment and Sustainability Standing Committee research.)

- Textiles = over 18% of landfill content in NS
- 50% of reusable items still thrown out by HRM residents
- 37 lbs discarded per household annually
- Some fabrics take 200+ years to decompose

Convenience of Donating a Major Factor

- 85% prefer bins due to convenience (per Solid Waste Survey in 2024)
- 18% survey respondents said if bins were more accessible it would increase their textile diversion
- Reduced bin access = fewer donations
- Municipal support for bin locations is key to success in diversion



Collaboration & Accountability

Other communities across Canada have set precedent for increased accountability for donation bin operators, and Big Brothers Big Sisters would be supportive of this approach in Halifax. In addition, helping charities secure donation bin locations and directing residents to donate through comprehensive campaigns would see a certain decline in textiles being sent to landfill.



Requiring bin licensing or permits with reasonable, low fees for charity owned bins.



Agreed upon standards of practice to ensure trust and a high level of accountability.



Support the work of charities collecting textiles through marketing initiatives and collaborative digital campaigns.

Recommendation

Permit the placement of donation bins operated and managed by charities on municipal property.

HRM facilities are central, in or near every neighbourhood in the municipality and are frequented by community members. This would address the need for more convenient donation locations throughout the region.

Big Brothers Big Sisters would strongly support requiring special agreements with bin owners/operators to ensure:

- Cleanliness of bin sites addressed
- Customer service response to donors and bin site hosts
- Tracking volume of goods collected



Commitment to Partnership

OUR PROMISE TO OUR BIN HOSTS:

- We ensure high standards of tidiness at all times by collecting donations from the bins on a daily basis if needed.
- We will promptly remove any items from around our bin that are not suitable for donation.
- Our bins will always be managed by Big Brothers Big Sisters, ensuring the highest level of accountability.
- We will always ask permission before placing or moving a bin on a partner's property.






Tangible Impact
