

A MESSAGE FROM COUNCILLOR STEELE


Happy September, District 12!

BEECHVILLE, LAKESIDE, TIMBERLEA COMMUNITY CORNER

Traffic Light Installation on Timberlea Parkway

Thank you everyone for your patience while this project is underway. The light installation is substantially complete. The remaining work includes installing a few extra sensors at the intersection to bring the lights to optimal performance. This should be completed in the next couple weeks.



St. Margaret's Bay Road Sidewalk Update

Significant progress has been made on the St. Margaret's Bay Road sidewalk improvements between Raines Mill Road and Beechville Park Drive. The project has successfully completed:

- A new retaining wall
- Storm infrastructure connections
- Safety railings
- Over 380 linear meters of new sidewalk

Remaining work includes installation of sign bases and signage, including two Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) at pedestrian crossings on Raines Mill Road and Oliver Street.

These upgrades will enhance pedestrian safety and accessibility along this busy corridor. Thank you to residents for your continued patience as final touches are completed.

Munroe Subdivision Update

Progress continues on the Munroe Subdivision project, with major construction milestones now completed. Crews have installed a new stormwater system, retaining walls, pedestrian railings, laid roadway base gravels, poured concrete curb and gutter, and roadway asphalt is now completed as well.

What's left? Just a few final touches:

- 130 m² of sidewalk and landscaping on Oliver Street
- Sign bases and signage installation (including RRFBs)
- Minor landscaping

Thanks to residents for their patience as this work wraps up. The improvements will enhance safety, accessibility, and overall infrastructure in the area.

Sunday, Aug. 17 proved to be a perfect day for the community barbecue at Veterans Park.

Westridge Ballfield Reconstruction

The Westridge Ball field reconstruction has begun. The work includes the complete re-grading and resodding of the field, new fencing, back stop and dugouts. Also included are new bleachers and asphalt walkways.

Construction began the week of Sept. 1 and is expected to be completed by mid-November and will reopen in the spring of 2026 once the turf is established.

Susie's Lake Fire

A heartfelt thank you to the Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE) and the Nova Scotia Department of Natural Resources (NSDNR) crews for their swift and professional response in bringing the Susie's Lake fire under control. Your dedication and quick action helped protect both the wilderness area and nearby communities. Thank you for your ongoing commitment to keeping our region safe.

Regency Park Resurfacing

The work on Regency Park Drive has concluded. This work was part of our Thin Overlays Program as part of



HRM's Pavement Maintenance & Rehabilitation Strategies. The work includes concrete curb repairs, concrete sidewalk repairs, hardware adjustments, milling, planer patching, paving top lift, pavement markings and reinstatements.

DUTCH VILLAGE ROAD RECONSTRUCTION

Work continues to progress on Dutch Village Road. This project aims to improve safety and address active transportation and transit gaps along this roadway. Features and considerations include:

- A sidewalk on the west side of the street, addressing the current sidewalk gap.
- Raised protected cycle lanes on both sides of the street.
- New accessible concrete bus stop pads.
- Additional high-quality pedestrian crossings. Shortening existing pedestrian crossing distances and adding accessible pedestrian signals.
- On-street parallel parking spaces, replacing the perpendicular parking spaces which are encroaching on the right of way.
- Streetscaping elements, such as benches, trees, planters, waste receptacles and pocket parks.

UPDATE ON MORRIS STREET EAST CONNECTION

At the Aug. 5 Regional Council meeting, councillors voted 11-5 to rescind the previous decision to proceed with the Morris Street East Connection bikeway project. Staff recommended reversing the July 8 motion and initiating new planning and engagement for an alternative East Connection that maintains two-way traffic on Morris Street. I supported the rescission, as one-way vehicle traffic on Morris Street will still be considered as an option. Recent communications from stakeholders, including Emergency Medical Care Inc. and the Port of Halifax, raised new concerns about one-way traffic, requiring further staff consultation.

The decision follows a July 16 letter from Premier Tim Houston advising the municipality that the Province would act under new authorities in Bill 24 if Council did not reverse its decision. Bill 24 grants the Minister of Public Works the authority to direct municipalities to build, change, or remove transportation infrastructure in the interest of safe and efficient movement.

On July 8, Council had directed staff to proceed with implementing the Morris Street bikeway using temporary materials, and to return with an evaluation report two years after installation. The approved design would convert Morris Street to oneway eastbound for vehicle traffic and install a twoway protected bikeway connecting University Avenue to Lower Water Street.

The Morris Street East Connection is part of the Peninsula South Complete Streets project, approved in October 2024, and is included in the municipality's AAA (All Ages and Abilities) Regional Centre Bike Network.





UPDATE ON THE STATUS OF HRM'S REGIONAL PLAN

On Friday, Aug. 8, 2025, the Halifax Regional Municipality received a letter from the Province of Nova Scotia's Minister of Municipal Affairs in response to the municipality's submission of the updated Regional Plan.



In the letter, the Minister indicated that the Regional Plan, as submitted, could not be accepted by the province and therefore could not be approved.

I am disappointed with this refusal as it was unexpected, and it delays much needed housing. For example, at the August 19 Regional Council meeting, HRM staff advised that the refusal has affected at least 12 development projects totaling 2000 units. Currently we are expecting a revised plan to be brought back to Council in late 2025.

Underway since 2020, the Regional Planning process has incorporated years of extensive public engagement to inform updates to the 2014 Regional Plan – aimed at supporting sustainable growth across our region.

On Thursday, June 19, 2025, Regional Council passed a motion to repeal the existing 2014 Regional Municipal Planning Strategy (also known as the Regional Plan) and adopt the proposed 2025 Regional Municipal Planning Strategy with related amendments to other planning documents including the Regional Subdivision By-Law, Secondary Municipal Planning Strategies and Land Use By-Laws.

In accordance with the Halifax Regional Municipality Charter, adoption of the Regional Plan and other planning documents is subject to provincial review and approval.

Over the past several months, municipal Planning & Development staff have been actively working with provincial staff to address feedback that had been previously received from the province. The decision by the province to not approve any of the proposed amendments was not expected, given the ongoing collaboration with provincial counterparts leading up to and following the submission for approval.

Moving forward, this means that the current 2014 Regional Plan, last amended in May 2025, remains in effect, as the new proposed amendments have not been approved by the province. Over the coming weeks, municipal staff will re-engage with the province to determine the next steps on the planning process and ensure the Regional Plan is updated in a way that aligns with provincial interests and fulfills the municipality's obligations under existing legislation.

provides non-profit organizations the opportunity to operate a community rink on municipally owned property. The municipality offers grants of up to \$1,000 to a minimum of seven successful applicants to assist them in covering the insurance cost associated with the operation of the community rink.

Applications opened on Monday, Sept. 1 and will remain open until Friday, Oct. 3.

The Outdoor Community Rink Program aligns with Regional Council's commitment to advance community-based projects and support residents' ability to participate in outdoor winter activities in their own communities.

SURPLUS LANDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING PILOT PROGRAM

The municipality is now accepting proposals from non-profit housing providers for the Surplus Lands for Affordable Housing Pilot Program.

Eligible entities include societies, non-profit associations, non-profit corporations and



registered charities in the Halifax Regional Municipality that commit to affordable housing provision. Partnerships with the private sector are also eligible, provided the land title and administration of affordable housing remain in the name of the non-profit partner.

Applications are due by Sept. 5, 2025 at 11:59 p.m. Learn more about eligibility, criteria and the application process at here.






COUNCILLOR SLOW DOWN SIGNS
