VOLUNTARY WATER CONSERVATION

Water Conservation Tips



Halifax Water is urging residents to follow the Voluntary Water Conservation Measures requested for the municipality. Water levels at Lake Major and Pockwock Lake continue to be lower than normal. Despite recent rain, much more precipitation is needed to return to normal levels.

To conserve water, Halifax Water is requesting that all customers and those who live or work within a building serviced by Halifax Water follow voluntary water conservation measures until further notice. By reducing our water usage, we can help ease the demand on our lakes/source water and reduce or delay the need for mandatory water conservation measures.

Mandatory water conservation measures are in effect for customers serviced by Lake Major; however, voluntary conservation measures



remain in place for those serviced by Pockwock Lake.

Limit activities that use excess water, such as:

- Watering lawns.
- Washing vehicles.
- Filling pools.

MI'KMAW HISTORY MONTH



October is Mi'kmaw History Month, a time to commemorate the rich history, proud culture and important contributions of the Mi'kmaq people. In 1993, Premier John Savage and Mi'kmaw Grand Chief Ben Sylliboy declared October as the official month to recognize and celebrate Mi'kmaw culture and heritage.

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

On March 6, 2025, the Province and Mi'kmaw Kina'matnewey jointly launched the Mi'kmaw Language ReVITALization Strategy, a collaborative plan to support the growth and sustainability of the language throughout Nova Scotia. The Province will provide \$1.3 million in annual funding to advance Mi'kmaw language revitalization initiatives. This investment will strengthen capacity in Mi'kmaw communities, help expand language learning programs, develop new resources and promote the use of Mi'kmaw in communities, workplaces and schools.

Chief Leroy Denny, Chair, Mi'kmaw
Kina'matnewey, stated that: "Our language is
at the heart of who we are as Mi'kmaq. The
release of this strategy marks an important
milestone in the shared journey towards
reconciliation between the Province of Nova
Scotia and the Mi'kmaw Nation."

On July 17, 2022, the Province of Nova Scotia, proclaimed, and Mi'kmaq affirmed, the Mi'kmaw Language Act, which recognized the Mi'kmaw language as the original language of Nova Scotia. The Act took effect on October 01, 2022. The Mi'kmaw Language Committee is a result of that Act and is comprised of representatives from Mi'kmaw communities and organizations as well as provincial government representatives. This Strategic Plan is a critical initial outcome of the Act.

TREATY DAY - OCTOBER 1



Every year on Oct. 1, Nova Scotians mark
Treaty Day to celebrate the rich history, proud
culture and important contributions of
Mi'kmaq people.

These centuries-old treaties honour the enduring bond of friendship and respect between Nova Scotia's Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities and reaffirm the historic presence of the Mi'kmaw who have occupied the land for thousands of years.

RIDE-SHARE SAFETY TIPS



As students settle into the city, police are using the opportunity to remind everyone of

some safety tips while using ride-share services and public transit.

Whether you are heading home after a night out, commuting to school or work, or exploring the city, your safety matters.

A few simple precautions can make all the difference.

Book through official apps: Only use trusted rideshare platforms and local taxi apps. Never accept rides from individuals offering unsolicited transportation.

Wait in safe areas: Stay indoors or in well-lit public spaces and near other passengers at bus stops, when possible, especially at night.

Verify the vehicle and driver: Double-check the car's make, model, license plate, and driver photo in the app before getting in.

Share your trip: Use the app's "Share Trip" feature to keep friends or family informed.

Track your route: Follow along using a maps app.

Avoid riding alone: When possible, ride with a friend or let someone know your plans.

Stay alert: Avoid distractions and stay aware of your surroundings.

Check for belongings: Do a quick scan before exiting the vehicle.

Trust your instincts: If something doesn't feel right, end the ride in a safe, public place or call for help.

- Call 911 if there is an immediate threat or danger
- Call the police non-emergency line at 902-490-5020 for noise or driving complaints
- Report crimes online if they are no longer in progress, like stolen goods

NATIONAL DISABILITY EMPLOYER AWARENESS MONTH



October
is <u>Disability</u>
<u>Employment</u>
<u>Awareness Month</u>
(DEAM) a time to

recognize the contributions of people with disabilities in the workforce. Throughout the month, DEAM initiatives aim to bring awareness to barriers experienced by those living with disabilities and encourages workplaces across country to create inclusive and accessible environments for all.

Did you know?

 Nova Scotia has the highest provincial average of individuals with disabilities, with 38 per cent of Nova Scotians over the age of 15 identifying as having a disability (Canadian average is 27 per cent)

- Nova Scotia became the third Canadian province to create accessibility legislation with the passing of the Nova Scotia Accessibility Act in 2017, following Manitoba (2013) and Ontario (2005)
- According to the Canadian Survey on
 Disability 2017, the four most common
 disabilities among Nova Scotian adults
 include pain related disabilities,
 flexibility issues, mobility, and mental
 health related disabilities, with almost
 20 per cent of individuals identifying as
 having a pain related disability

Numbers of individuals with disabilities is expected to grow as our population ages, making the municipality's commitment to improving accessibility and inclusion across our organization, in our programs and services and in the communities we serve increasingly important.

In support of this goal, and in alignment with the provincial accessibility framework, the Office of Diversity & Inclusion/ANSAIO developed an <u>Accessibility Strategy</u> that was unanimously approved by Regional Council in May 2021. We all play a part in working to break down the barriers that exist for people living with disabilities.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL CHILD



Oct. 11 is <u>International Day of the Girl Child</u>, a, a day dedicated to celebrating the voices and power of girls, championing their rights worldwide, and reflecting on the challenges they continue to face because of their gender.

Canada led the international effort to establish this day to draw attention to the persistent inequalities and dangers that too many girls face around the world. The United Nations subsequently adopted a resolution to formally recognize this important date.

Across Canada and around the world, girls are making an impact and creating positive change in their communities and far beyond. They are leading the way as students, entrepreneurs, volunteers and activists, and proving that you are never too young to shape the future and improve the lives of others.

PERSONS DAY – OCTOBER 18



Oct. 18 is Persons Day in Canada. October 2025

It marks the day in 1929 when the historic decision to include women in the legal definition of "persons" was handed down by Canada's highest court of appeal. This gave some women the right to be appointed to the Senate of Canada and paved the way for women's increased participation in public and political life. Though this decision did not include all women, such as Indigenous women and women of Asian heritage and descent, it did mark critical progress in the advancement of gender equality in Canada.

REGISTRATION 2025 VOLUNTEER CONFERENCE

This will be the municipality's 25th year hosting the Volunteer Conference.

networking activities as well as two training workshops, with sessions such as Basic Financials, Volunteering with the Vulnerable Sector, and Digital Tools & Technology. Participants will also enjoy a keynote speech and a seated meal. This year's keynote speaker is Hope Swinimer, founder of the non-profit Hope for Wildlife.

SHARED MICROMOBILITY PILOT PROGRAM – PHASE 2

Phase 2 of the Shared Micromobility Pilot launched on Sept. 3. The service boundary grows and e-scooters increase from 300 to 600.

With more riders and students back to school, ride safe: follow speed limits, don't ride on sidewalks and park in designated zones.

In 2023, Regional Council directed staff to develop a two-year shared micromobility pilot project to license a limited number of business(es) to operate short-term e-scooter and bicycle rental services in Halifax region. The pilot supports a number of municipal goals including Action 88 of the Integrated Mobility Plan (IMP), and Action 8 of Section 5.2.3 of HalifACT, to decarbonize transportation.

In 2023, Council approved <u>By-law M-300</u>, the <u>Micromobility By-law</u>, which sets rules for escooters and micromobility operation.

ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION CROSSING AT SCOT/CHISHOLM



Regional Council has directed the CAO to consider a new active transportation crossing over the CN rail corridor between Scot Street and Chisholm Avenue in future planning. The CN rail cut is a barrier between the Halifax peninsula and mainland Halifax. Many residents use informal paths in this area to connect to higher-density residential areas on the peninsula side and shopping, services, and employment destinations on the mainland side.

A bridge at this location could:

- Improve safety by eliminating informal rail crossings
- Connect to future bikeways and sidewalks at the north end of the peninsula
- Provide an alternative to the Windsor Street Exchange for some walking and cycling trips

HALIFAX WEST ARMDALE

Preliminary estimates suggest the project could cost between 2 to 4 million, plus costs for property acquisition or easements. It will be considered during the update of the Integrated Mobility Plan and the successor to the Active Transportation Priorities Plan.

HALIFAX'S INCLUSIVE ECONOMIC STRATEGY UPDATE



Regional Council has received an update on People, Planet, Prosperity: Halifax's Inclusive Economic

Strategy, which guides economic growth in the municipality from 2022 to 2027.

The strategy focuses on ensuring all residents can contribute to – and benefit from – Halifax's prosperity. It has three overarching goals:

- Promote and maximize inclusive and sustainable growth
- Attract, retain and develop talent
- Make Halifax a better place to live, work and visit

Highlights from April 2024 to March 2025 include:

- GDP growth of 2.6 per cent, outpacing national and provincial averages
- Progress on the Housing Accelerator
 Fund, with 39 per cent of the three-year
 housing target achieved in the first year

- Support for African Nova Scotian and Indigenous economic development initiatives
- Expansion of the Student Transit Pass Pilot Program and adoption of the renewed Accessibility Strategy (2025– 2028)
- Ongoing major projects including the Cogswell District Redevelopment and Windsor Street Exchange redesign

<u>Transit Automated Passenger Counts Archived</u>

Data was previously released but due to the large file size, the archived data has been moved to our Open Data Downloads website.

A wide range of data can be sourced for free through the catalogue, such as transit routes and schedule data, solid waste collection schedules, and area rates. New data releases occur several times throughout the year, with the most recent release on June 18, 2025.

The Open Data initiative was launched in early 2014 to help improve resident engagement and enhance transparency on municipal data. The program was formalized by Regional Council later that year through the adoption of <u>Administrative Order 2014-006-ADM</u>
<u>Respecting Open Data</u>.

TRAFFIC DELAY – DUTCH VILLAGE ROAD

There will be traffic delays on Dutch Village Road between Joseph Howe Drive and Alma Crescent until Friday, Dec. 21.

Work details

This work is part of the <u>Dutch Village Road</u> <u>Complete Streets project</u>.

Traffic impacts

Access to nearby businesses and properties is being maintained throughout this project. At 6 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 19, crews expect the current phase of work along the west side of Dutch Village Road to be completed.

After 6 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 19, crews will shift the lane closure to the east side of Dutch Village Road to facilitate the next phase of work. The changes outlined below will also come into effect.

Dutch Village Road will open to southbound traffic from Supreme Court toward the southern intersection of Joseph Howe Drive and Bayers Road. Dutch Village Road will be closed to northbound traffic in the project area.

Access to and from these streets along the west side of Dutch Village Road will open:

- Sunnybrae Avenue
- Central Avenue
- Rosedale Avenue
- Frederick Avenue

HALIFAX WEST ARMDALE

Rufus Avenue

Access to and from these streets along the east side of Dutch Village Road will close:

- Deal Street (local access maintained via the northern intersection with Dutch Village Road)
- Andrew Street (local access maintained via Percy Street)

Detour signage will be in place, and personnel will be on-site to direct traffic. Drivers should expect delays and use alternative routes.

Pedestrian impacts: Pedestrian access will be maintained.

Transit impacts: The existing Halifax Transit impacts will continue to be in place during the second phase of this work.

Inbound routes 28 and 137 will be detoured via Alex Street, Main Avenue and Titus Street to Dutch Village Road. The following bus stops will be temporarily closed during this work:

- Rosedale Avenue at civic 34 (8242)
- Rosedale Avenue before Dutch Village Road (8243)
- Dutch Village Road before Andrew Street (6609)
- Dutch Village Road before Sunnybrae Avenue (6638)
- Joseph Howe Drive before Scot Street (6986) (only for route 28)

Outbound routes 28 and 137 will be detoured via Alma Crescent, Main Avenue and Alex Street to Rosedale Avenue. The following bus stops will be temporarily closed during this work:

- Dutch Village Road after Alma Crescent (9042)
- Dutch Village Road before Rufus Avenue (6614)
- Dutch Village Road before Rosedale Avenue (6613)
- Rosedale Avenue after Dutch Village Road (8245)
- Rosedale Avenue at civic 23 (8244)
- Dutch Village Road before Central Avenue (6788)

SUPPORT FOR BUSINESSES IMPACTED BY TARIFFS

Regional Tariff Response Initiative



<u>The Halifax Chamber of Commerce</u> has shared an update on new support available to businesses impacted by recent U.S. tariff changes.

In response to the U.S. Commerce Department expanding its list of tariffed steel and

aluminum products, the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) has launched the Regional Tariff Response Initiative (RTRI), which helps Atlantic Canadian businesses adapt to shifting trade conditions, diversify markets, strengthen supply chains, and improve productivity. Applications are now open.

Businesses can also access the <u>Tariff and</u> <u>Customs Advisory Program</u>, delivered by the Nova Scotia Association of CBDCs, which provides up to 12 hours of consulting support from customs brokers to help navigate tariffs, compliance requirements, and supply chain adjustments.

ANTI-BLACK RACISM GRANTS PROGRAM



The Halifax Regional Municipality is now

accepting applications for the second year of the Anti-Black Racism (ABR) Grants Program. Launched in 2024, the program was established to address anti-Black racism through grassroots projects and initiatives.

Applications will be accepted from Monday, Sept. 15 to Friday, Oct. 31 at 11:59 p.m.

Anti-Black racism is a form of discrimination uniquely rooted in the history of Black people, informed by the legacies of enslavement and colonization, and experienced daily across the municipality and the world.

Grants ranging from \$500 to \$10,000 are available to support community-based projects developed and delivered at the local level. Applicants must demonstrate how their project aligns with the municipality's commitment to address anti-Black racism by addressing at least one of the following forms of anti-Black racism:

- racial segregation
- historic omission
- lack of recognition
- systemic expropriation
- negative portrayal in the media and literature

The program offers young poets (aged 14 to 18) an opportunity to develop their writing skills, receive mentorship and engage with others on issues that resonate within the municipality.



- Calls for service across HRM increased 7% compared to the same period in 2024, with proactive policing activity (such as foot patrols and traffic stops) seeing notable growth.
- Crimes against persons were up slightly overall, with increases in assaults, sexual violations, and firearm-related incidents.
- Crimes against property rose in HRP areas, particularly shoplifting, while RCMP areas reported fewer shoplifting cases but more fraud and theft under \$5,000.
- Traffic collisions decreased overall, though

PARKS STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM



Regional Council has directed the CAO to develop a Park Stewardship Program.

The proposed program will expand opportunities for residents and community groups to take part in the care and enhancement of municipal parks. It builds on existing initiatives such as community gardens and naturalization projects, while adding new components like Adopt-a-Park and more flexible cleanup opportunities.

Halifax has more than 900 parks, ranging from neighbourhood green spaces to wilderness areas. While day-to-day maintenance is performed by municipal staff or contractors, there is strong community interest in contributing to stewardship activities. The Park Stewardship Program will provide a consistent, coordinated framework for this involvement.

The program is expected to launch using existing resources, with future program growth to be assessed and reported back to Council as required.

The Municipal Archives is the official repository for historical municipal government records from Halifax, Dartmouth, Bedford and the former County of Halifax. It also holds community records from the region. The Municipal Archives include a guide of buildings and properties, historical Council minutes from 1841 to 1996 and over 4,000 historical images of downtown Halifax before massive urban renewal projects of the 1960s – and much more.


