#### NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

National Fire Prevention Week runs from Oct. 6 to 12. This year's theme is "Smoke Alarms: Make Them Work for You". Working smoke alarms save lives by providing early detection and warning in the event of a fire, giving you and your family valuable time to escape safely. Below are some important smoke alarm safety tips for residents:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (e.g. hallway) and on each level (including the basement) of your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or stop responding when tested.

Residents are encouraged to ensure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, especially those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency is running a contest from Oct. 6 to 12 to promote National Fire Prevention Week and smoke alarm safety.

#### WILDFIRE SMOKE

It's not unusual to notice the smell of smoke in the air during wildfire season (March 15 – Oct. 15), especially in the morning.

Most of the time, it can be carried from fires burning elsewhere in the province or even farther away. You should call 911 if you see a defined column of smoke, you notice visible flames or there's a new, dark plume of smoke in the sky.



### MANDETORY WATER CONSERVATION



Halifax Water is implementing mandatory Stage 1 water restrictions for Dartmouth, Burnside, Cole Harbour, Westphal, North Preston and Eastern Passage. This is due to the ongoing dry conditions and lack of precipitation. As a result, Lake Major has moved to the warning phase.

In order to conserve water, Halifax Water requests that all residents and businesses supplied by the Lake Major Water Supply Plant stop the following activities:

- · Watering lawns.
- · Washing vehicles.
- Filling pools.
- Watering golf courses.
- Bulk Fill Stations serviced by Lake Major will be closed

With the move to mandatory, residential and commercial customers are now expected to adhere to these measures. Failure to do so may result in a warning, a non-compliance fine, or suspension of service. See their <u>website</u> for more information.





### INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL

Oct. 11 is <u>International Day of the Girl Child</u>, a, a day dedicated to celebrating the voices and power of girls, championing their rights worldwide, and reflecting on the challenges they continue to face because of their gender.

Canada led the international effort to establish this day to draw attention to the persistent inequalities and dangers that too many girls face around the world. The United Nations subsequently adopted a resolution to formally recognize this important date. Across Canada and around the world, girls are making an impact and creating positive change in their communities and far beyond. They are leading the way as students, entrepreneurs, volunteers and activists, and proving that you are never too young to shape the future and improve the lives of others.

## AFFORDABLE HOUSING GRANT PROGRAM FUNDING

Regional Council has directed the Chief Administrative Officer to allocate \$1.5 million from the Density Bonus Reserve to fund affordable housing projects in the regional centre. The program provides project-specific grants to non-profit and charitable housing providers for new construction, conversions, repairs, acquisitions and studies.

The AHGP supports municipal priorities to increase the supply of affordable housing and to improve and maintain existing stock. Since 2021, the program has awarded \$14 million to create or preserve more than 730 units and rooms of affordable housing.

#### **PERSONS DAY**

Oct. 18 is Persons Day in Canada. It marks the day in 1929 when the historic decision to include women in the legal definition of "persons" was handed down by Canada's highest court of appeal. This gave some women the right to be appointed to the Senate of Canada and paved the way for women's increased participation in public and political life. Though this decision did not include all women, such as Indigenous women and women of Asian heritage and descent, it did mark critical progress in the advancement of gender equality in Canada.

### SHARED MICROMOBILITY PILOT PHASE 2 LAUNCHES

Phase 2 of the Shared Micromobility Pilot launched on Sept. 3. The service boundary grows and e-scooters increase from 300 to 600. With more riders and students back to school, ride safe: follow speed limits, don't ride on sidewalks and park in designated zones. With more people using e-scooters across the municipality, it's important to know where and how they can be used.

Under By-law M-300 (the Micromobility By-law), as well as the Province of Nova Scotia's Motor Vehicle Act, here's what you need to know:

#### Where e-scooters are allowed:

- On roads with speed limits of 50 km/h or lower
- In bike lanes
- On multi-use pathways within streets

#### Where e-scooters are not allowed:

- On sidewalks
- On park trails, unless they are specifically signed as permitted
- At speeds over 25 km/h on roads or bike lanes
- At speeds over 15 km/h on multi-use pathways

#### Safety first:

- Riders must wear a helmet
- Riders must be at least 14 years old

E-scooters may also be used on private property with permission from the property owner. By following the rules, we can all help ensure micromobility options like e-scooters continue to be a safe and accessible part of how we move through our communities.

#### **CANADA POST STRIKE IMPACTS**

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents and vendors that the ongoing Canada Post strike may cause delays in municipal mail delivery. As a result, property tax bills and vendor payments sent by mail may arrive later than expected. Residents can learn more or sign up to receive property tax email or text (SMS) notifications on the municipality's property tax website.

If residents have not received their property tax bill in the mail, they can request a reprint at no charge visiting our <a href="website">website</a>. Requests can also be made by calling 311 or emailing: <a href="contactus@311.halifax.ca">contactus@311.halifax.ca</a>. Note that the September tax bill is due Friday, Oct. 31, 2025. If a cheque was mailed before the strike was called, residents are asked to wait until Wednesday, Oct. 17, before contacting the municipality to confirm receipt of the payment. Response times may be longer than usual due to the high volume of calls and email inquiries as a result of the Canada Post strike. Residents are reminded that property taxes can also be paid by:

- online banking
- cash, debit or cheque at a Customer Contact Centre
- due-date pre-authorized debit
- credit card (fees apply)

Vendors can sign up for electronic (EFT) payments or may email invoices directly to <a href="https://hrmaplink@halifax.ca">hrmaplink@halifax.ca</a>. Cheque pickup may also be arranged at municipal Customer Service Centres with advance notice and valid government-issued ID. For more information, visit our website.

### SEMI-ANNUAL CRIME AND TRAFFIC STATISTICS REPORT

On Sept. 3, Halifax Regional Police and RCMP provided a presentation to the Board of Police regarding the Crime and Traffic Statistics for January to June 2025.

The presentation showed that calls for service across HRM increased 7% compared to the same period in 2024, with proactive policing activity (such as foot patrols and traffic stops) seeing notable growth. Crimes against persons were up slightly overall, with increases in assaults, sexual violations, and firearm-related incidents. Crimes against property rose in HRP areas, particularly shoplifting, while RCMP areas reported fewer shoplifting cases but more fraud and theft under \$5,000. Traffic collisions decreased overall, though HRP and RCMP continue to respond to impaired driving and serious collisions.

#### **ACCESSIBILITY STRATEGY**

The municipality has released the 2025–2028 Accessibility Strategy. It outlines 30 recommendations in six key areas to improve accessibility and representation.

The recommendations are to be completed over a three-year period and represent a call to action to create a municipality that is accessible to all, regardless of ability.

## ANTI-BLACK RACISM GRANTS PROGRAM

The Halifax Regional Municipality is now accepting applications for the second year of the Anti-Black Racism (ABR) Grants Program.

Launched in 2024, the program was established to address anti-Black racism through grassroots projects and initiatives.

Anti-Black racism is a form of discrimination uniquely rooted in the history of Black people, informed by the legacies of enslavement and colonization, and experienced daily across the municipality and the world.

Grants ranging from \$500 to \$10,000 are available to support community-based projects developed and delivered at the local level.

## SUPPORT FOR BUSINESSES IMPACTED BY TARIFFS

The Halifax Chamber of Commerce has shared an update on new support available to businesses impacted by recent U.S. tariff changes.

In response to the U.S. Commerce Department expanding its list of tariffed steel and aluminum products, the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA) has launched the Regional Tariff Response Initiative (RTRI), which helps Atlantic Canadian businesses adapt to shifting trade conditions, diversify markets, strengthen supply chains, and improve productivity. Applications are now open. Businesses can also access the Tariff and Customs Advisory Program, delivered by the Nova Scotia Association of CBDCs, which provides up to 12 hours of consulting support from customs brokers to help navigate tariffs, compliance requirements, and supply chain adjustments. #### PARK STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

The proposed Park Stewardship Program will expand opportunities for residents and community groups to take part in the care and enhancement of municipal parks. It builds on existing initiatives such as community gardens and naturalization projects, while adding new components like Adopt-a-Park and more flexible cleanup opportunities. The program is expected to launch using existing resources, with future program growth to be assessed and reported back to Council as required.

#### **HALLOWEEN SAFETY**

Halloween is just around the corner! We look forward to the fun that comes with this spooky day, but it is important to keep safety a priority.

For those who will be trick-or-treating, limit your street crossings and always watch for vehicles. We recommend wearing bright, reflective, warm costumes and avoiding masks if possible. Trick-or-treat in groups and bring a flashlight or stay in well lit areas. Never enter someone's home while trick-or-treating and make sure to check your candy when you get home.

Motorists, please be extra cautious on Halloween - drive slowly and be careful backing up.

Homeowners, please keep your doorway well lit, and clear of tripping hazards and open flames. Please give out only commercially-wrapped snacks and keep pets inside on Halloween. Wishing everyone a safe, fun-filled night!

### **CIVIC ADDRESSING CHANGES**

Several streets in District 3 have recently been reviewed by civic addressing and will be receiving updated civic numbering. These changes are not made lightly and are usually to combat public safety concerns from emergency management services. Renumbering is not determined through public engagement but with consultation, but through our civic addressing <a href="by-law">by-law</a> and <a href="AO">AO</a>. While we understand this can cause inconveniences, these renumbering changes are important to public safety and can help with package delivery as well.

#### **NEW OPEN DATA SETS**

The Halifax Regional Municipality has released one new dataset on <u>Open Data</u>, as part of an ongoing commitment to provide public access to data created and managed by the municipality.

## TAX RELIEF FOR NON-PROFIT AND CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

The 2026/27 Tax Relief Program is now open for applications.

Because the Jan. 31, 2026, deadline falls on a weekend the application deadline has been extended to Monday, Feb. 2, 2026.

Late or incomplete applications will not be accepted.

HRM's website has an overview of the program and the Application Form for those organizations seeking to add a property to the program next fiscal year.

For those organizations already accepted into the program ("Renewals") the web page also has the annual Confirmation Form. This form must be completed and submitted by the stated deadline to avoid a 50% reduction in level of tax relief up to a maximum of \$5,000 per property. Any deduction for non-compliance with the program's reporting requirements will be apportioned between the interim and final tax bills.

## HEMLOCK WOOLLY ADELGID TREATMENT AND MANAGEMENT

Regional Council has approved the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA) Treatment and Management Plan to protect eastern hemlock populations in the municipality.

HWA is an invasive pest first detected in Nova Scotia in 2017 and in Halifax in 2023. Left untreated, it can decimate native eastern hemlock forests within a few years. The plan outlines how Halifax will survey, mark, and treat hemlock trees, focusing initially on 15 priority parks. Treatment will be carried out by a combination of municipal staff, contractors, and supervised volunteers, using chemical methods that remain the only effective option to reduce HWA's spread. Its goal is to preserve healthy hemlock stands in Halifax for current and future generations. For more information, read the staff report.

#### HOUSEHOLD LITTER IN PARKS

Household litter does not belong in parks.

In November 2021, HRM Solid Waste Resources began enforcement of new illegal dumping regulations. Municipal staff enforce enhanced measures related to illegal dumping and litter, including in parks. Penalties range from \$200-\$10,000.
