CANADA POST MAIL DISRUPTION

Due to the ongoing Canada Post strike, there may be delays in receiving property tax bills and vendor payments. However, the September tax bill remains due on Oct. 31, 2025.

Residents can sign up for property tax email or text notifications, request a free reprint of their bill, or explore alternate payment options such as online banking, pre-authorized debit, or paying in person at a Customer Contact Centre.

Vendors are encouraged to sign up for electronic payments or submit invoices directly by email. Cheque pickup at Customer Service Centres can also be arranged with advance notice and ID.

BEECHVILLE, LAKESIDE, TIMBERLEA COMMUNITY CORNER

Traffic Light Installation on Timberlea Parkway

Thank you everyone for your patience while this project is underway. The light installation is substantially complete. The remaining work includes installing a few extra sensors at the intersection to bring the lights to optimal performance. The left turn arrow signal onto Timberlea Village Parkway from St. Margaret's Bay Road is being programmed with proper timing and we hope to have it functional as soon as possible.

St. Margaret's Bay Road Sidewalk Update

The St. Margaret's Bay Road sidewalk improvements between Raines Mill Road and Beechville Park Drive is substantially completed. Remaining work includes installation of fencing, final site cleanup and deficiency work.

These upgrades will enhance pedestrian safety and accessibility along this busy corridor. Thank you to residents for your continued patience as final touches are completed.

Sept. 24 Townhall with the RCMP on the BLT **Community Policing Office**

I partnered with the RCMP on a community town hall on the upcoming BLT community policing office. Work is currently underway on recruitment of six officers and a public servant administrative support person. The RCMP is working with HRM on site selection. The officers may temporarily work from the Tantallon RCMP office until a site is identified.

Munroe Subdivision Update

Significant progress has been made within the Munroe Subdivision project and it has now reached a level of substantial completion. The remaining work includes the installation of fencing, final site cleanup and deficiency work.

CLAYTON PARK, WEDGEWOOD COMMUNITY CORNER

Washmill Lake Drive & Regency Park Drive **Proposed Development**

There are no significant updates at this time regarding the proposed development. Negotiations with the applicant are ongoing and nearing completion. Once finalized, a recommendation report will be prepared, with the application expected to go before Halifax and West Community Council in late 2025 or early 2026.

Traffic impacts are being reviewed as part of the process. A Traffic Impact Study is available on the application webpage for public reference.

A Public Hearing will be held before Council makes a decision. Property owners within the notification area will receive direct notice, and updates will be posted on the application page on the HRM website.

I will continue to share updates as they become available.

Parkland Drive Crosswalks

A new marked crosswalk is proposed for Parkland Drive at Heathside Crescent, where combined pedestrian and park user volumes are nearing the threshold for installation. This location was selected to improve connectivity to nearby bus stops, trails, and community amenities.

Civil work will be required before installation, and the crosswalk will feature Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) for enhanced safety.

The project is planned for inclusion in the 2026/27 draft budget, pending Council approval.

Volunteer tutors are needed at Keshen Goodman Library this fall to help adults from their area learn and practice English.

In 1993, Premier John Savage and Mi'kmaw Grand Chief Ben Sylliboy declared October as the official month to recognize and celebrate Mi'kmaw culture and heritage.

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmag people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

TAX RELIEF FOR NONPROFIT AND CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

The 2026/27 Tax Relief Program is now OPEN for applications.

Because the Jan. 31, 2026, deadline falls on a weekend the application deadline has been extended to Monday, Feb. 2, 2026.

Late or incomplete applications will not be accepted.

HRM's website has an overview of the program and the Application Form for those organizations seeking to add a property to the program next fiscal year.

For those organizations already accepted into the program ("Renewals") the webpage also has the annual Confirmation Form. This form must be completed and submitted by the stated deadline to avoid a 50% reduction in level of tax relief up to a maximum of \$5,000 per property. Any deduction for non-compliance with the program's reporting requirements will be apportioned between the interim and final tax bills.

ANTI-BLACK RACISM GRANTS **PROGRAM**

The Halifax Regional Municipality is now accepting applications for the second year of the Anti-Black Racism (ABR) Grants Program.

Launched in 2024, the program was established to address anti-Black racism through grassroots projects and initiatives.

Anti-Black racism is a form of discrimination uniquely rooted in the history of Black people, informed by the legacies of enslavement and colonization, and experienced daily across the municipality and the world.

Grants ranging from \$500 to \$10,000 are available to support community-based projects developed and delivered at the local level.

PARK STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM



Regional Council has directed the CAO to develop a Park Stewardship Program.

The proposed

program will expand opportunities for residents and community groups to take part in the care and enhancement of municipal parks. It builds on existing initiatives such as community gardens and naturalization projects, while adding new components like Adopt-a-Park and more flexible cleanup opportunities.

Halifax has more than 900 parks, ranging from neighbourhood green spaces to wilderness areas. While day-to-day maintenance is performed by municipal staff or contractors, there is strong community interest in contributing to stewardship activities. The Park Stewardship Program will provide a consistent, coordinated framework for this involvement.

The program is expected to launch using existing resources, with future program growth to be assessed and reported back to Council as required.





AFFORDABLE HOUSING GRANT **PROGRAM FUNDING**

Regional Council has directed the Chief Administrative Officer to allocate \$1.5 million from the Density Bonus Reserve to



fund affordable housing projects in the regional centre.

The program provides project-specific grants to nonprofit and charitable housing providers for new construction, conversions, repairs, acquisitions and studies.

The AHGP supports municipal priorities to increase the supply of affordable housing and to improve and maintain existing stock. Since 2021, the program has awarded \$14 million to create or preserve more than 730 units and rooms of affordable housing.

2025-2028 ACCESSIBILITY STRATEGY

The municipality has released the 2025-2028 Accessibility Strategy. It outlines 30 recommendations in six key areas to improve accessibility and representation.



The recommendations

are to be completed over a three-year period and represent a call to action to create a municipality that is accessible to all, regardless of ability.

Four versions are available: plain text, plain language, condensed and condensed & plain language.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Halloween is just around the corner! We look

forward to the fun that comes with this spooky day, but it is important to keep safety a priority.

Trick-or-treaters, parents and guardians:



- · Look both ways before crossing the street but try to limit cross-crossing the street (go down one side of the street and up the other). Always watch for vehicles.
- Trick-or-treat with people from your household or your close social group - never go alone.
- Ensure Halloween costumes are bright, reflective, fit well and are warm. Consider using face paint or makeup instead of a mask.
- Carry a flashlight and stay close to well-lit areas.
- Be sure an adult checks all Halloween candy before trick-or-treaters dig in.
- Trick-or-treaters should tell their parents and/or guardians their Halloween route and when they expect to be home.
- Never enter someone's home while trick-ortreating.

Motorists:

 Drive slowly and be careful backing up and drive with extra caution in residential areas.

Homeowners:

- Keep your doorway well-lit; clear of tripping hazards and open flames.
- Give out only commercially wrapped snacks.
- Keep pets inside on Halloween.

We'll take care of the rest and ensure a scroll is prepared to mark the special occasion.


