What is the Point-In-Time Count (PiT)?

- A coordinated data collection strategy that counts the number of people experiencing homelessness in a region within a 24-hour period.
- A snapshot (estimate) of the extent and nature of homelessness in our community.
 - Under reports the number of people experiencing homelessness
 - Done in November 2024 vs Spring in 2022 & 2018
 - Federal, Provincial and Municipal effort, coordinated by AHANS, conducted by service providers

Update on Homelessness

- Homelessness in HRM ↑ (increased by 93% in 2 years)
 - o 2018: 220
- 2022: 586 2024: 1132 (414% in 6 years)
- People sleeping rough ↓ (reduced by over 50%)
 - o Over 200, now 70 in designated locations and 30 in non-designated
- Chronically homeless ↑ (tripled in 2 years)
- 34% of homeless were evicted from their home.
- 80 beds available in various options




Who is experiencing homelessness?

- 65% men & 32% women
- 23% involved in the child welfare system
- 17% black and 6% indigenous
- 8% are couples
- 6% have children or dependents with them
- 4% have pets
- 2% experience homelessness with friends or other family members



PiT count age breakdown



Health Concerns

- 59%: Mental health concerns
- 48% Substance abuse concerns
- 45%: Illness or medical condition
- 39%: Physical mobility
- 38%: Cognitive functioning concerns
- 18%: Acquired brain injury



Why are people homeless?

- 39% lack of income
- 14% conflict with partner or spouse (+18%)
- 12% unsafe or unfit housing condition
- 10% conflict with landlord
- 10% substance abuse
- 9% renoviction

Sources of income


- 47%: Income assistance
- 24%: Some level of employment
- 12%: No income
- 9%: GST/HST refund
- 8%: Disability benefit
- 7%: Senior's benefit
- Less than 5%: EI, friends, family, or veteran benefits

Racial Identity


- 67%: White
- 11%: Black
- 7%: Black-African
- 6%: Indigenous only
- 2%: Asian-South or Indo-Canadian
