

HIGHWAY 102 SPECIAL PLANNING AREA

Close to 400 people attended HRM's Open House for the Highway 102 West Corridor Special Planning Area where a massive housing development is being proposed. Still in the early planning stages, the project involves two different developers. Both developers were on hand at St Peter's Church in Rockingham on November 19 to present maps and concept plans to the public.

Studies have been done for the area assuming 11,500 housing units would be built. However at the Open House, the Annapolis Group presented a proposal with an additional 7000 units, bringing the proposed total to about 19,000 housing units. This would mean an approximate population of 42,000 housed between Kearney Lake Road, Bayers Lake Industrial Park, Susies Lake and Highway 102.

The Stevens Group is proposing a development called "The Lakes" consisting of 8700 housing units in clusters of buildings of 4-6 storeys.

Based on what I heard from the Stevens Group representatives, this housing might look similar in size to the apartment buildings at

Rockingham South, only with many more of them.

The Annapolis Group is proposing a larger project with 9972 units. The majority of the housing (9172 units) is a mix of medium and highrise apartments. The Annapolis Group also proposes to build 794 single family homes and 108 townhouses. The company's plan includes land set aside for schools.

Some concerns I'm hearing: the Highway 102 Special Planning Area development designs have only two proposed access points. One access point is located on Kearney Lake Road near Highway 102 and the other is located on Lacewood Drive inside Bayers Lake Industrial Park. Just two access points for a possible 42,000 residents would likely present challenges from both a traffic and emergency response perspective.

Other concerns I'm hearing: these massive housing developments may also present significant environmental challenges for the nearby lakes and for the proposed Blue Mountain Birch Cove Lakes National Urban Park. It may be difficult to maintain lake water quality in such a densely populated area and it's

hard to see how the urban wilderness concept of the proposed park could be compatible with a development of this scale nearby.

One of the more unusual aspects of the project is a proposal to fill an existing quarry with water. This is a large, deep, steep-walled quarry. There are shallower water features in HRM that are fenced in for safety. The potential use and feasibility of this proposed lake will be assessed as part of the ongoing planning process.

It's still very early days. HRM staff will be assessing stormwater, traffic and transit implications of the proposals. They will look at emergency access and the impacts on the environment. Once this work has been done the developers will be asked to revise their plans. HRM will then hold a second phase of public engagement for the revised concept plans. The target date is early 2027 for the second public engagement session.

Special Planning Areas like this one were created by the Provincial government to fast track housing construction and approvals will be made by the provincial Minister for Growth and Development. 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NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBERANCE AND ACTION ON VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

The National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women on Dec. 6 serves as a platform to raise awareness, challenge misconceptions, and advocate for the rights and well-being of people with disabilities.

What is gender-based violence?

Gender-based violence (GBV) is committed against someone based on their gender identity, gender expression or perceived gender. GBV disproportionately impacts women and girls as well as Indigenous Peoples, 2SLGBTQ+, gender diverse, non-binary individuals, persons with disabilities, newcomers, children and youth, and seniors.

- According to the <u>Nova Scotia Domestic</u>
 <u>Violence Resource Centre</u>, women in
 Nova Scotia are approximately 45 times
 more likely to be murdered by a spouse
 or intimate partner than they are by a
 stranger (57.9 per cent versus 1.3 per
 cent).
- Women who self-identified as lesbian or bisexual reported significantly higher rates of violence by a partner than heterosexual women.

How can you help?

Preventing and ending gender-based violence is everyone's responsibility. You can be part of the solution when you:

- Listen to and support survivors of gender-based violence.
- Speak up when you see harmful behaviour and maintain confidentiality if someone in the workplace has experienced gender-based violence.

If you or a loved one is experiencing violence, speak with someone you trust about getting support.

- Call 911 if you or someone you know is in danger.
- To connect with community services including legal aid, counselling, family resource centres, housing, and accessibility support within the municipality, call 211 or search online for community resources.

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MUNICIPAL BUDGET CONSULTATIONS UNDERWAY

Halifax Regional Council has begun the 2026/27 municipal budget process with the release of the proposed Budget Direction on Nov. 19. The annual municipal budget funds all municipal operations and services, including transit, police, fire services, parks, snow clearing, waste collection, capital projects, and required contributions to reserves.

As is typical during the budget cycle, the initial figures presented are a starting point for Council's deliberations. Through the budget consultation and adjustment process, Councillors will have the opportunity to propose changes to the staff recommendations to find efficiencies while balancing the core services the municipality needs.

This year's starting Budget Direction reflects an estimated \$88.9 million increase needed to maintain service levels, meet contractual and inflationary costs, and support previously approved initiatives. Based on current projections, this would require an average residential property tax bill increase of approximately 10.5%.

Business units will present their proposed budgets to the Budget Committee over the coming weeks. Residents will have opportunities to follow deliberations online and participate directly during the public participation portions of each meeting. Members of the public may speak in person or virtually, and can register or submit written correspondence through the meeting agenda page on Halifax.ca, where instructions are posted for each session.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE HALIFAX EXPLOSION

Dec. 6 marks the 108th anniversary of the Halifax Explosion, one of the most devastating events in our city's history.

On the anniversary, residents are invited to gather at 9 a.m. at the Bell Tower in Fort Needham Memorial Park for the annual Halifax Explosion Memorial Service to honour the lives lost and the resilience of those impacted.

On Dec. 6, 1917, the collision of the French munitions ship Mont Blanc and the Norwegian relief ship Imo in the Narrows of Halifax Harbour caused a catastrophic explosion. The blast leveled much of north-end Halifax, killing over 2,000 people and injuring 9,000 more and buildings throughout Halifax and Dartmouth were significantly damaged.

At 9:04 a.m., naval ships across the Dockyard will sound their whistles for one minute in remembrance.

PROVINCE APPROVES DARTMOUTH COVE PLANNING AMENDMENTS WITH CONDITIONS

The Province of Nova Scotia has approved Halifax Regional Municipality's planning amendments for Dartmouth Cove, with conditions.

On Nov. 26, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing confirmed the amendments will proceed, subject to HRM demonstrating that all water lots in the Dartmouth Cove Special Area fall fully within municipal boundaries; that the municipality has authority under the HRM Charter to regulate infilling; and that the measures do not infringe on federal jurisdiction. The province's review was required under legislation, as planning amendments must be approved before taking effect.

At the Tuesday, Oct. 7 meeting, Halifax Regional Council voted 12-3 to adopt planning amendments that would restrict infilling in Dartmouth Cove, following a public hearing. The decision follows a series of motions dating back to 2023 that directed staff to explore options to manage and regulate water lot development in Dartmouth Cove. While staff had recommended deferring changes until completion of the Downtown Dartmouth Waterfront Revitalization (DDWR) Project, Council instead chose one of three alternative approaches presented in the report: a full restriction on infilling within Dartmouth Cove.

Council's decision aims to balance environmental, recreational, and development considerations while ensuring future planning for the Dartmouth waterfront proceeds in a coordinated manner.



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PARKING BAN

The overnight winter parking ban is in effect every year from Dec. 15 until Mar. 31; however, it is only enforced during declared weather events and clearing operations. When the ban is enforced, it restricts any on-street parking between 1 a.m. and 6 a.m. Vehicles in violation of the ban will be ticketed and/or towed.

Remember to stay informed about the status of the parking ban and please think before you park.



OPERATION CHRISTMAS BEGINS

Operation Christmas, an annual province-wide campaign that aims to reduce impaired driving, has begun.

Operation Christmas was kicked off this morning on Citadel Hill, where law enforcement agencies and public safety partners from across Nova Scotia gathered to speak about the impacts of impaired driving.

Officers then set up checkpoints across Halifax Regional Municipality to conduct enforcement

and hand out educational materials about the dangers of impaired driving.

This year, Halifax Transit supported Operation Christmas by donating hundreds of transit tickets for officers to distribute at roadside checkpoints. The donation served as an important reminder that there are always safe alternatives to driving impaired.

Operation Christmas will continue throughout the month of December with an increased number of roadside checkpoints across Nova Scotia.

SNOW CLEARING

Snow clearing in our municipality is a big job and if stretched into a straight line, it would reach from Halifax to Winnipeg. Streets and sidewalks are prioritized based on commuter usage and access to key infrastructure.
