#### MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR CANADIANS KILLED IN WAR.

A large gathering of clergymen of different denominations appeared before the Board in relation to proposed joint memorial service to be held in either some large building or in the open air as a tribute to the soldiers and sailors of Canada who laid down their lives in the Furopean War.

Rev. Dean Llwyd suggested that a committee of the Board of Control meet with a committee of the clergymen to discuss the matter. Approved.

The Board decides that the whole Board of Control will act as a committee to meet a committee of the clergy.

Rev. Dean Llwyd announced that the committee of the clergy consists of Rev. Dean Llwyd of All Saints' Church of England Cathedral, Rev. Dr. Ross of Fort Massey Presbyterian Church, Rev. Dr. Bond of Grafton Street Methodist Church, Rev. M. L. Gregg of North Baptist Church, Rev. Mr. Stevens of African Methodist Church and Staff Captain Bayer of the Salvation Army.

It is agreed that the joint committee meet in the City Council Chamber this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The Board decided to hold a business meeting immediately following the proposed conference with the committee of clergymen.

Controller Harris and His Worship the Mayor referred to the destroying of receptacles by the garbage collectors.



That Greenwich meantime, as used for the purpose of astronomy and mavigation, shall not be affected.

That this time shall apply to the whole of the Dominion of Canada except the Yokon Territory."

### TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL.

The Board met for the purpose of discussing the matter of the Tuberculosis Hospital, with particular reference to the financial arrangement between the Hospital Board and the City of Halifax.

There were in attendance, at the request of the Board, Mrs. A. Ivan Mader, Mrs. William Schon, J. Fred. Fraser, and Joseph A. Chisholm, K.C., of the Board of Management of the Tuberculosis Hospital, and W. A. Afflect, its Secretary.

After discussion it was mutually agreed that the entire liability of the City in connection with the annual operations of the Hospital is limited to \$2,500,00, and that the Hospital is to be conducted so that sum shall not be exceeded in any year.

Mr. Chisholm, Mr. Fraser and Controller McKeen are appointed a committee to endeavor to secure for the Hospital a deed of the Flinn property, Quinpool Road, which was formerly occupied by the institution, through the favor of the Government.

Alderman Brown, on behalf of the residents in the neighborhood of the City Home, urged that the building on the City Home property now occupied as a Tuberculosis Hospital, be vacated according to agreement.

Mr. Fraser stated that every effort is being made to secure other premises, but no suitable building has as yet been secured. Mr. Fraser further stated that the Board of Management are in hopes of being able to get back to Hazelwood this fall.

The Board adjourned.

Engineer of the Halifax Ocean Terminals, a copy of which is attached, in which the Engineer asks what the City's policey will be in reference to a proposed extension of Robie Street or Connaught Avenue to a point at or near the junction of Francklyn Street and Bower Road.

During the last two years the City adopted a policy which contemplates the construction of Connaught Avenue sooner for later from Francklyn Street near the Basin. It will be much easier to get the bridge constructed now while the railway is under construction than after the work is finished, but if the City does not propose to do anything for years, we could not ask with a good grace that the bridge be erected now when there is no use for it.

Under the circumstances, I am submitting the matter to you for a decision as to the policy which the City shall follow.





# ANNUAL CIVIC REPORTS!

The matter of the early publication of the annual civic report is discussed.

At request of Controller Murphy, the City Auditor, the City Treasurer and the City Engineer appeared before the Board.

The City Auditor and City Treasurer explained that because accounts are not rendered promptly and paid, it has not been customary to close until June 30th the annual statement for the year ending April 30th and that therefore the financial statement cannot be prepared until as of that date.

The City Engineer explained that the general report for last year was published without his report and that he proposed to incorporate his statistics for two years with his next statement.

The City Auditor is instructed to notify the City
Officials to have their annual reports prepared as soon
as possible in order that the City's financial statement
may be issued at once.

### AMOUNTS DUE THE CITY.

### OVERDRAFT FROM ROYAL BANK.

The City Treasurer submitted a letter from the Manager of the Royal Bank requesting that the Board of Control pass a resolution authorizing the loan of \$20,000.00 from said Bank on account of civic year 1914-15.

The City Treasurer explained that on 1914 account, under formal resolution authorized by statute, the City had borrowed for then current expenses the sum of \$198,000.00, but that the taxes for that year not having been sufficiently paid, it had been found necessary to borrow the further sum of about \$20,000.00, making in all \$218,000.00. The amount of uncollected taxes for 1914

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approximate the sum borrowed from the Bank on that year's account.

The Charter provides that the City's borrowings shall not exceed 90% of the amount of taxes uncollected at the time of such borrowing, and shall not in any event exceed 30% of the total amount of the year's taxes.

The matter is referred to Controller McKeen, the City Treasurer and the City Solicitor for report.

### HENNESSEY PROPERTY GOTTINGEN AND YOUNG STREETS.

Robert Daw addressed the Board explaining that before razing the buildings on the Hennessey property at the corner of Gottingen and West Young Streets, he had obtained permission from Gerald B. Ternan, the owner, and from Ex-Mayor Bligh and Ex-Controller Hoben.

### QUINPOOL ROAD.

Controller Halliday complained, on behalf of residents in the meighborhood, that teams are in the habit of driving on the sidewalk on Quinpood Road near the Independent Boat Club House.

Referred to Controller Harris and the Chief of Police.

#### SIR SANDFORD FLEMING PARK.

His Worship the Mayor informed the Board that the Act submitted by the City Council to the Legislature proposing to transfer to the Directors of Point Pleasant Park the care and management of the Sir Sandford Fleming Park, not having been passed by the Legislature, it would be necessary for the city to now deal with the situation.

The City Solicitor explained that the City's Act was not approved by the Committee of the House because of the existence of Chapter 71 of the Acts of 1908 and of the wishes of Sir Sandford Fleming as expressed in his deed of dedication of the Park in which he named

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as his representatives of the Board of Management, Geo. S. Campbell, Dougald Macgillivray and Joseph B. Kenny. (See printed minutes of City Council September 23rd, 1909, p. 224).

It is decided to report to City Council the necessity for the appointment by that body of three Aldermen to represent the City on the Sir Sandford Fleming Park Corporation.

The Secretary is instructed to inform Hector
McInnes, Chairman of the Directors of Point Pleasant
Park, that the legislation proposed by the City for
the transference of the management of the Fleming Park
to the Directors of Point Pleasant Park not having been
passed, that it is not within the power of the City to
transfer the management as intended.

### STREET CLEANING MACHINERY.

The City Engineer is requested to make a report on appliances for street cleaning.

### MOTOR BOATS

R. A. Guildford appeared before the Board stating that it had been drawn to his attention that it is the custom of motor boats carrying passengers to ply their business on the Harbor under all weather conditions overcrowded with passengers without adequate life saving appliances.

The Secretary is instructed to write the Harbor Master, Frank G. Rudolf, calling his attention to this complaint.

# NOVA SCOTIA CAR WORKS FIRE INSURANCE.

Controller McKeen informed the Board that thematter of fire insurance on the building owned by the Nova Scotia Car Works, Ltd., occupied as a foundry, had been referred to him for report, and asked that the City Solicitor be heard.

The City Solicitor explained the conditions as to

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the insurance of this building and states that the City has been fully protected.

The Board agrees that the verbally expressed opinion of the City Solicitor that all the proceedings and financial transactions in regard to this matter have been correct.

### CITY PRISON SUPPLIES.



Some time last fall the City of Halifax made an agreement with Heber Hartlen to take a piece of

his property of Longard Road and to agree to the decision of the arbitrators appointed by the City and Mr. Hartlen.

The City appointed myself to look after their interests and Mr. Hartlen appointed R. O. N. Duggan, and we were to appoint a third party, which has been done in the person of Ex-Alderman J. C. Harris, and we are now all ready to proceed.

As there will be some contentious matters, I, as representative of the City, have been waiting for more definite instructions from the City Solicitor to proceed with the matter.

Will you kindly have this brought up at the first meeting of the Board of Control and give instructions for the necessary proceedings?

Yours faithfully, Melvin S. Clarke.

Mr. Hartlen, in connection with this matter, addressed the Board urging prompt action and stating that he considers the value of his property fronting on Longard Road to be 30¢ a foot.

The matter is deferred.

#### INVESTIGATION INTO FIRES.

A delegation from the Board of Trade and the Board of Fire Underwriters, consisting of Bernard P. Saunders, F. J. Cragg and Hon. George E. Faulkner, appeared before and addressed the Board in respect to fire risks, requesting that the Chief of the Fire Department should continue to make separate reports as to each fire; that he should make a regular inspection of buildings, chimneys, stovepipes, etc., and report on same from time to time to the Board as occasion requires.

In connection with this matter, the Board is also addressed by Alderman Kelly, Rod. MacDonald and Ex-Controller O'Connor.

#### ELECTRIC SIGNS.

Read draft ordinance submitted by the City Solicitor entitled An Ordinance "Of Electric Signs", as follows:-

Be it ordained by the Board of Control and Council of the Cityof Halifax as follows:-

1. The expression "illuminated sign" includes any illuminated structure or device for the purpose of advertisement.



- 2. No illuminated sign shall be constructed, placed or hung on or from the wall or roof of any building or erected as a separate structure until a permit for the same has been obtained from the Inspector of Buildings (hereinafter called the Inspector).
- 3. Before any such permit is granted the application therefor shall be submitted to the Electrician for approval and the permit shall be countersigned by him if he approved of the same.
- 4. Every application forr any such permit shall be in writing, stating the name of the application, the building or locality in which it is proposed to place the same, the size and mode of construction of the sign including the mode of attaching the same to any building, the words, device or other matter proposed to be shewn upon such sign, the mode of illuminating and any other matter required by the Inspector or the Electrician.
- 5. The Inspector may require a suitable plan or plans of the proposed sign and attachemnts, (in color or in duplicate if required) to be furnished along with the application.
- 6. No sign shall be placed on the roof of any building more than feet in height across the fact, or of which the bottom is less than six inches or more than eighteen inches from such roof. Every such roof sign shall be deemed a part of the height of the building to which it is attached within the meaning and for the purposes of Section 796 of the City Charter.
- 7. A permit may be granted for a roof sign exceeding in height feet, provided such sign is so constructed as to permit a free passage of the wind through the same, and is not in the opinion of the Inspector dangerous.
- g. Every illuminated sign must be securely fastened and secured in place to the satisfaction of the Inspector.
- 9. No illuminated sign shall project more than two feet beyond the line of any street or beyond the building line established on any street.
- 10. No portion of any illuminated sign projecting beyour the line or building line of any street shall be less than eight feet above the level of the sidewalk.
- 11. No coloring, solution or other material liable to be washed off or to become streaky or disfigured shall be used in connection with any part of any illuminated sign.
- 12. All electric apparatue and fittings in connection with any illuminated sign shall be installed and maintained in accordance with the laws and ordinances from time to time in force in the City, and a certificate or compliance with this section shall be obtained from the Electrician before electric current is turned on to any illuminated sign.
- 13. Every illuminated sign shall be fully illuminated for not less than two hours on not less than four nights in every week unless prevented by accident or other cause of the sufficiency of which the Inspector shall be the judge.
- 14. Every illuminated sign shall be kept and maintained to the satisfaction of the Inspector and the Electrician, who shall at all timed have the right to inspect the same

and for that purpose to enter in or upon any building to which any such sign is attached and if in the opinion of the Inspector (which shall be conclusive) any such sign is not properly maintained (including compliance with the requiredment as to having the same illuminated the owner or person having control thereof shall put such sign into proper condition to the satisfaction of the Inspector or remove the same, and if he fails to do so within one week from receipt of a notice in that behalf from the Inspector, the Inspector may himself remove such sign at the expense of such owner or person having control, and no action at law shall be maintained against the City or Inspector for removing any such sign.

15. Section 22 of Ordinance No. 4 of streets shall include and apply to any illuminated sign as defined in this ordinance.

R. M. Hattie, representing the Civic Improvement League, asked that further consideration of the ordinance be deferred for at least a fortnight in order that the League may be able to obtain further information.

Emanuel Jensen and Charles Bell requested that in the preparation of the ordinance provision be made prohibiting the advertising of intoxicating liquors on licensed signs.

The opinion of the City Solicitor being asked, the Solicitor stated it is doubtful if the City has authority to grant a license for street obstruction through the erection of signs.

The request of the Civic Improvement League that the matter be deferred for at least a fortnight is conceded to, the City Solicitor in the meantime to report in writing as to the authority of the City to pass the proposed ordinance.


