CITY WHARF BOAT LANDING.

Read report Acting City Engineer as follows:-

City Engineer's Office, March 3lst, 1917.

His Worship the Mayor. Sir:-

I beg to report on the accompanying minute of the Board of Control Covering application from A. J. Davis for permission to land passengers at the City Wharf, that during the Spring and Summer months this wharf is in continuous use by the Works Department for landing sand and gravel. It is the only wharf property of which the have control on the Harbour front, and should be kept solely for City purposes.

During the summer, when construction work is in progress a large number of teams are employed hauling sand and gravel from this wharf. With a boat landing passengers, and especially an excursion boat, there will almost certainly be an interference with our men employed either teaming or loading on the w harf, and also a certain loss of material due to the scattering of sand and gravel over the edge of the w harf by people walking over it.

There is a public landing at the next dock north, which can be used by the petitioner. I must protest strongly against the City Wharf being used for other than municipal purposes.

CONNAUGHT AVENUE LEGISLATION.

Read report Acting City Engineer as follows:-

City Engineer's Office, April 27th, 1917.

His Worship the Mayor. Sir:-

I find that a clause has been inserted in City Bill No. 54 by the House of Assembly, providing that if providing that if provision is not made for either building a bridge on Connaught Avenue at Coburg Road or for
the diversion of said Avenue within three years, that the
said Avenue for its whole length shall be practically
removed from the official city plan. In my opinion, this
clause should be strongly opposed in the Legislative
Council and every effort made to have it struck out of
the bill.

Connaught Avenue is proposed as a boulevard one hundred and twenty feet wide extending throughout the length of the city from Point Pleasant Park to Fairview, and its location is laid down on the city plan. It was briginally laid down through the property now known as Rosebank Park by J. W. Regan, the then owner. This section of the Avenue was partly graded by him, and subsequently the park was sold to R. P. Bell, who completed the grading and disposed of several lots fronting on the Acenue, on at least ofe of which an expensive residence has been erected. Another section north of Bayers Road, about one mile away from Rosebank Park, was laid down on the plan of the division of property of J. Lorne McGibbon and partly graded. Another section was opened through the proper ty of Mr. Theakston adjoining Coburg Road to the north. The dominion Government in constructing the Halifax Ocean Terminals Railway took a portion of the Avenue through the latter's property at the junction of Coburg Road.

We are using our best endeavours to comple the Railw ay Department to build a bridge to take care of the
Avenue at this point or to pay a p reportion of the additional cost that would be involved in diverting the
Avenue to the eastward of the railway company. Whether we
will be successful in this or not is at present uncertain
but it is anticipated that eventually the Avenue will be
opened, built upon and used, so that a bridge or diversion
will have to be made.

The City of Halifax in its town planning legislation has been far in advance of other cities in Canada, a fact which was brought out at the meeting of the National Conference on City Planning held in Toronto in 1914, when the sections of the city charter dealing with the official plan were published as an appendix to the report of the Conference. In 1915, the Legislature of Nova Scotia passed a Town Planning Act, requiring cities, towns and municipalities to make a comprehensive plan showing among other things improvements and extensions of existing streets, and also new streets.

If legislation such as is proposed in the clause inserted in Bill 54 can be obtained by any owner of property
who thinks he may have a grievance, the whole purpose of
the Legislature in passing the Acts of 1896 and 1915 will
be defeated. Property where who have paid an enhanced
value for lots and erected houses on the line of the
boulevard, trusting to the fact of its having been laid
down on the city plan as a wide thoroughfare, will find
themselves with a much depreciated property on their hands.
As an instance of how the legislation proposed will affect
the City.— Within the past two weeks application was made
for a permit to build on the east side of North Kline Street
and the east line of the Avenue will take about forty feet
off this property. At present the applicant will be com-

Eventually, when the City is prepared to carry out the widening, he will be paid for the land taken. If the clause passes, and the bridge at Coburg Road is not built within three years, this building will be back forty feet from this property line, and instead of being on a main thoroughfare the owner will find himself on a narrow by-way and will, I presume, be unable to claim any compensation for the loss of his land for building purposes: or, if he is able to recover for the latter, the City will have to pay for land which will be of absolutely no use to it.

It is not thought that there cane be any dispute as to the advantages of a well-considered and comprehensive plan for any growing city, such as has been authorized by the Legislature, but the whole object aimed at will be done away with if such changes as are proposed in the Bill are carried out; and I would again urge that every effort be made to have this clause struck out of the Bill.

His Worship the Mayor. Sir:-

I beg to report on the accompanying minute of the Board of Control that section 645 of the City Charter provides that whenever any public sewer is built in any provides that whenever any public sewer is built in any street, every owner of real estate on eigher side of the street fronting on such sewer, shall pay the sum of \$1.25 for each lineal foot of his property so fronting.

At the time this amount was fixed, our sewers were costing from \$3.15 to \$5.00. For the past five years the average cost has been abot \$6.34 so that the assessment average cost has been abot \$6.34 so that the assessment at the rate of \$1.25 a foot is not sufficient to make up at the rate of \$1.25 a foot is not sufficient to make up one-half the cost. Even when the sewers were costing less one-half that from 1890 to 1905, owing to exemptions, the I find that from 1890 to 1905, owing to exemptions, the City only received 42% of the cost of the sewers.

I estimate that it will as necessary to fix the rate at at least \$1.75 to assure getting one-half the fost.

AND WHEREAS, on the 17th and 18th daysof April, in the year A. D., 1917., a notice containing a description of the rights in the lands and premises so required, was duly served on each of the persons claiming to be the owners respectifely of the said land and premises, which said presons are enumerated in the schedule to this resolution, together with a notice of the intention of the Council to expropriate the said rights in the said lands and premises from the said owners after the expiration of the time required by law from the date of the service of such notice;

AND WHEREAE, a notice containing a description of the said rights in the said lands and premises so required, and a notice of the intention of the City Council to expropriate the said rights in the said lands and premises after the expiration of the time required by law from the date of such notice, was duly published by the City Engineer in the Acadian Recorder, Evening Mail and Daily Echo, three news papers published in the City of Halifax for two weeks by insertions each week; namely on the 15th and 17th and 23rd and 24th of April, A. D. 1917;

THEREFORE RESOLVED that the said rights in the said lands and premises be, and the same are hereby expropriated which said rights in the said lands and premises are described as follows:-

The rights to be expropriated are the rights hereinafter set out in, under, over, above, upon and along the
lands and premises described as follows, that is to say,

on each side of the centre line of the sewer and overflow

to say -

The right to construct a sewer or sewers of such materials and such size and shape ant at such levels with such

manholes, catchpits and other appurtenances as the City Engineer of the City of Halifax approves of under, in or upon the said lot.

Also the right to enter on the above described lot with carts, horses, workmen and servents at any time or from time to time by right or by day, and dig up and excavate the said land, and remove the earth therefrom and do all things necessary for the laying or construction of a sewer or sewers and its or their appurtenance in the above described lot.

Also the right where required, to fill in and raise the said lot with earth, stones or other suitable materials for the covering and protection of the said sewer or sewers and its or their appurtenances in such a way and to such a height as the City Engineer deems advisable.

Also the right from time to time and at any and all times hereafter whenever the City Engineer or other City Official acting in his stead, considers it requisite, to enter open such land with workmen, servants, horses and carts, to inspect, clean, alter, repair, renew, reconstruct, add to or rebuild such sewer or sewers and its or their appurtenances and for that purpose to dig up and excavate and open such lot and to do thereon whatever may be necessary for inspecting, cleaning, altering, repairing renewing, reconstructing, adding to or rebuilding such sewer or sewers and the appurtenances of the same;

Also the rights to set and amintain monuments marked the boundaries of the said lot.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized by and on behalf of the City of Halifax to pay into the Supreme Court of Halifax for the rights in so much of the said land and premises as is alleged to belong respectively to each of the persons set out in the schedule, the sum set opposite to the name of each of such owners respectively, making in all the sum of Seventeen Dollars, (\$17.00) the said sum being in the judgment of the City Council a reasonable value for the said rights in the said properties respectively, and that the City Engineer notify each of the said alleged owners so set out in the schedule of the said exprorpiation and the said payment into Court.

The undersigned was asked by your Worship and the late Board of Control to make a report in respect to the necessity and desirability of continuing a female police necessity and desirability of continuing a female police officer, in connection with the City force. The present, incumbent, Mrs. Paint, has been connected with this Department for the past few months and, having had an opportunity of observing the nature of the work this lady is called upon to do, I consider I am in a position to judge of the necessity of the further employment of such an officer. I feel obliged to say that with deference the money's pent in respect to such an officer would be more advantageously employed in the securing of an extra policeman. For a City of the size of Halifax, I fell that such an officer as a female police officer is not needed. Her work particularly is among deliquent and insubordinate girls, (I do not think Halifax has very many of this cales), and In such cases in my experience in the Police Department, adequate and excell ent service has always been rendered by the S. P. C. Society through its admirable agent, Mrs. Egan. I feel the Halifax Police Department can get along quite successfully without the appointment of such an officer, and this opinion, as requested, I submit for your consideration.





INVESTIGATION

held by Board of Control into reports of misconduct on part of E. S. Tracey, Liquor Inspector, during search by him for liquor at King Edward Hotel, March 20th, 1917.

Present His Worship the Mayor and Controllers Taylor, Murphy and Finlay.

WILLIAM WILSON, Proprietor King Edward Hotel, called and sworn --

On the 20th of March last, while raiding my house, I suppose looking for liquor, Mr. Tracey, I think unnecessarily did some very ungentlemanly work by interfering with the privacy of guests' rooms. He got what he thought was sufficient to convict me if he wanted to and he had to my mind no necessity to go to those people's rooms. After finding the champagne in the linen room (according to the Court evidence)he demanded admittance to other rooms. He had previously opened room 14 occupied by some naval officers, and afterwards he went to Mr. Sorrette's room and found him in bed, who told him that he thought that he could not have been very long from his mother's apron strings or he would have had better manners. He asked me to open No. 11 room, and I said it was occupied by a lady and gentleman and I had no right to open it, and he said if I did not open it he would break it, and he took a bar out of his pocket. There was a chair about four feet from the door and he got on top of it and flashed a flash light over the fan-light to see who was in the room. They were in the bath room along the hall, but that did not make any difference to my mind. After that he demanded admittance to room No. 12, which I also told him was occupied by a lady and gentleman. (The husband of the lady is at present inthis room). said that he could not. The door was not locked, and he turned the handle of the door and walked in. He rummaged in the bureau and went on his knees under the bed and pulled out a dress suit case and rummaged in that. I should judge it belonged to the guests. They had been with me some time. It was not mine. After--wards he went upstairs to No. 44, occupied by two naval officers, and demanded admittance. I said "There are two naval officers in that room. If you do get any-thing you can't take it away." I opened the door, and the people's things were scattered around the room and on top of one of the beds was a dress suit case, which he rummaged through, and he also looked around the room to see if there was anything else. In one room there

wes a lady in bed, and either he or someone else backed out. There were with him sergeant Palmer and some policemen. Whether it was Tracey or the policemen who went into the room, I do not know. The first time they went upstairs I was not with them. They did not find anything in the rooms that I am aware of. I looked upon it as unnecessary interference with the people in the house. The guests wanted to know why they were interfered with in that way. The guests in No. 11 were Mr. Mackinlay and his wife from Springhill, who had registered about three-quarters of anhour before that. They are not there now. The search had nothing to do with the guests' leaving, that I know of. I think they realized the state of affairs and thought it was not necessary to do that. This happened about ten o'clock at night. As near as I can judge, it was about twenty minutes past nine when he came in first and went upstairs.

To Mr. TRACEY --

- Q. Did you deny to me having a drop of liquor on the premises when I first entered the premises?
- A. I told you that I was not selling stuff.
- Q. Did you, or did you not, tell me that you did not have a drop on the premises and had not sold any for some time?
- A. I will not answer that question.
- Q. When we came to that room where we found the liquor, do you remember asking me to take your word that there was not a drop of liquor there -- nothing but linen?
- A. No. I said that the stuff that you found there had been put there for my own use.
- That was after I pulled the cases out; but before when I went to the room and found the Yale lock on it, which aroused my suspicion, I asked you to open the door and you said that you did not have the keys, but I could take your word that there was nothing there but linen?
- A. I do not admit that at all.
- Q. You do not remember stating that fact to me?
- A. No. I do not remember stating that fact.
- Q. You told me that Mrs. Wilson had the keys. When Mrs. Wilson came she did not have the keys, but Miss Wilson had them?
- A. I did not tell you that Mrs. Wilson had the keys.
 The linen room was looked after by my daughter and
 she had the keys. When the keys were produced I
 ordered the door opened. Mrs. Wilson came with the
 keys of the pantry.

- Q. When Mrs. Wilson came and tried the door and said she did not have the keys, but Miss Wilson had them, Mrs. Wilson went away, and I walked down the hall, and a lady came out of the room, whom I supposed to be Miss Wilson, and slammed the door after her, and then you ordered the door opened?
- A. She had been in the room for some time and had a change to put in a bedroom.
- Q. Why was she working in that room in the dark?
- A. It was not necessary for her to be interfered with by you or anybody else. What would she have to do with liquor in any case.
- Q. Why was she working in the dark?
- A. I dont know.
- Q. Can you give me any information why the linen was all disturbed and those cases were wrapped individually in sheets?
- A. There were sheets over them and other linen thrown on top of that.
- Q. The three cases were spread on the floor and the linen was packed around them?
- A. That stuff had been there for a number of months.
- Q. Was it necessary to conceal it in that manner?
- A. I had to put it somewhere.
- Q. After finding the liquor and having it removed to the hall, you asked me what I was going to do with it and you then said it was for your own private use?
- A. Yes, I told you that in the linen room.
- Q. After finding the liquor, did you object to my searching the rooms?
- A. Yes, I objected to your searching the guests' rooms.
- Q. Did you open a door for me?
- A. I opened No, 44 to save further trouble.

- Q. Didn't I simply open a few drawers and valises and close them again?
- A. I gave my evidence before.
- Q. Did you object at the time to my searching?
- A. When you came to me and said you were the liquor inspector and had a search warrant, I said go ahead, and you went ahead and I followed you then. You had been in the house before and I think upstairs before.
- Q. I did not enter any room or look through any transom without knocking first?
- A. That is quite correct.

Mr. TRACEY
TO CONTROLLER MURPHY --

- Q. Previous to your mocking at the door and looking over the transom, did Mr. Wilson say they were occuried by a lady and gentleman?
- A. No. I knocked several times and there was no response and then I looked over the transom. I took it for granted there was no one in the room.

Mr. WILSON To Mr. TRACEY --

- Q. Were there any ladies in the rooms I went into?
- A. In one of the rooms there was a lady in bed. Either you or Sergeant Palmer or one of the policemen went in.
- Q. You dont know of any room that I went into?
- A. No.

RUPERT KAULBACH, called and sworn --

I am a guest at the King Edward Hotel. On Tuesday the 20th of March I occupied room 20. I came into the hotel about ten o'clock and saw two policemen, or more, down stairs and about the same number up stairs. I went along the corridor to my room and found a gentle—man trying to get into my room. I did not know his name then and did not know what was going on and I asked him what he was doing there. He did not give me any satis—faction. I went into my room and then I came out again and I saw the same gentleman get a chair and put it in front of the door of room (I think) No. 11. Thenhe got a box and stood on the box and used a flash lamp over the transom. I do not know whether the transom was open or closed. Before he did this I heard Mr. Wilson saying that those rooms were occupied. Then I enquired what was going on and I was told that he was Mr. Tracey, the Liquor Inspector. I went down stairs and gave instruc—tions to be called inthe morning and I was down a little while talking with the alerk when Mr. Tracey came

That is all I know. I heard Mr. Wilson, previous to Mr. Tracey's looking in, say those rooms are occupied and I refuse to open them. I saw him trying to get in. That is all.

ARTHUR MURPHY, called and sworn --

I came upstairs when Mr. Tracey was at room No. 11 He took a chair and put it up against the door and as the chair was not high enough to see into the room he got a box and put it on top of the chair and got up with a flash light and looked in through the transom, and that is all I saw of it, except that I saw him go out.

CHARLES CURREN, called and sworn --

I am a guest at the King Edward Hotel.

I came in just after the search. I met them in the hall.

When I went in my room the light was on. My wife went in with me and I said "Someone has been here." I found that a valise under the bed had been upset and some of the bureau drawers had been opened. I went down to Mr. Wilson and demanded to know who had been allowed to go into my room and look through my things, and I added that I would like to get hold of him; and he told me that he had advised Mr. Tracey not to go in there because the things belonged to a lady and gentleman; and he took out my valise from under the bed and opened some of the bureau drawers. I would have liked to have been there when he went in. He would not be sitting here now.

To Mr. TRACEY --

- Q. You say that you found your valise topsy-turvy?
- A. I said it had been pulled out. You did it.
- Q. You were not there?
- A. I know you did it.
- Q. You say the bureau drawers had been searched?
- A. Yes, one.
- Q. Did you find anything disturbed?
- A. I could not tell. They were a little upset.
 I did not miss anything.
- Q. How were they upset?
- A. Someone had been looking into them and they were upset a little.
- Q. Did you find anything disturbed in thedrawer?
- A. I cant say, but the valise was all upset. All rummaged as though you had put your hand in looking for something.

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- Q. Did you find the valise open?
- A. Yes, you know that you opened it.
- Q. You did not find anything disturbed?
- A. That I cant swear to.

E. S. TRACEY, called and sworn --

On the evening of March 20th, about 10 p. m.,
I visited the King Edward Hotel with a Search Warrant
for the nurses of contabing the barrent for the purpose of searching the house, as I had been informed that Mr. Wilson was still selling liquor, and as I knew that he had already been convicted under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act. After waiting a while I met Mr. Wilson down stairs in the office and I told Mr. Wilson who I was and my purpose. He said at the time that there was not a drop of liquor in the house and that he had not had any or sold any for some time. I told him that nevertheless it was my duty to search as I wanted to give him a clear report. I started to search at the dining room and pantry and kitchen, then went to the cellar. Then I went upstairs. Sergeant Palmer and Officers Wren and Scott accompanied ne. After finding a number of the rooms locked, which I did not open, I found a number open. In one room there were some young men playing cards and I spoke to them, and then we came to the linen room door, which was locked with a Yale lock. Mr. Wilson accompanied me on the search and we chatted. I asked Mr. Wilson to open the door of the linen room and he informed me that he did not have the key, but Mrs. Wilson had it, and he said "Tracey, you can take my word for it that there is nothing there but linen." I said, "Well, I can open this door if necessary," and he said "Do not break the door. I will get it open." He came back in about five minutes' time with Mrs. Wilson. Mrs. Wilson tried her keys, but could not open the door. In standing close to the door we heard a little shuffle inside, which aroused my suspicion, and I said I would wait until we got Miss Wilson. Mrs. Wilson walked away, in the mean-time I walked down the hall, and while I was down the hall a lady came out of the room and walked away. I walked back quickly and stopped the lady and Mr. Wilson then instructed the lady to open the door. During all this time the room was in darkness. We went in and turnedon the light and found things a little topsy-turvy, and found these cases that we seized had been wrapped in the linen and the linen piled on top of them. The basket was wrapped with several sheets and other linen piled on top. I removed the liquor and stood it out in the hall. Mr. Wilson asked me then what I intended to do and I said I intended to take it away, and he said it was for his own private use, and I said that under the circumstances I would have to seize it. I then started to search the other rooms. I went to several rooms and they were locked. Mr. Wilson informed me that they were guests' rooms and he did not have the key. I asked him if the guests were in or out and he said he did not know. I then knocked several times and shook the door and then I stopped and glanced in and saw empty rooms and I said "That is alright, Mr. Wilson," and we passed along until

we came to a couple of rooms that were open. We came to a room that he said was the naval men's room and he opened it and there was a little excessive bag-gage there I thought, so I opened the bureau drawer and opened a couple of valises and told Mr. Wilson it was all satisfactory; and we went to another room that was open, (I presume it was the room that Mr. Curren spoke of) and I pulled out a valise from under the bed and opened and closed it; and that was all the search that I made of the King Edward. I consider that I let Mr. Wilson off very easily, as half the rooms were never touched. I made the seizure first and then visited the rooms. I had been led to believe that there was liquor kept in a bedroom. The seizure consisted of three cases of champagne and a basket of mixed liquors-whisky, brandy and wine.

TO HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR --

- Q. Where do you draw the line at excessive baggage?
- A. I thought the number of valises seemed excessive for a couple of people to be using in one room. There is no restriction so far as the Act goes under a Search Warrant.
- Q. You are supposed to use common sense?
- A. Yes.
- And you consider that you used that when you used a flash light over a transom, not knowing whether a man and his wife were in bed or not?
- A. I know that I shook and pounded the door sufficient--ly hard to waken anybody.
- Q. You thought when you did not get a reply that you were quite warranted in looking over?
- A. Yes. The time of night was rather early for people to retire in an hotel.

TO CONTROLLER TAYLOR --

- Q. I understand that after you found the liquor you started to search for more?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You had a conviction then -- why did you look for more? Why did you go through the whole house from top to bottom?
- A. I could have done so under the search warrant. I consider that I used him very leniently and Mr. Wilson had no complaint to make. I never saw a guest in any room that I went into.

SERGEANT W. E. PAIMER, called and sworn --

King Edward Hotel. I was present when he was trying to get in one room. I was not with Mr. Tracey all the time. I was with him searching the lower part of the hotel. I am not familiar with the numbers of the rooms. The private rooms referred to are on the third floor. I was on the third floor with him. I was not with him when the linen closet was entered. I was there after the liquor was taken out of the linen room. Mr. Tracey when we first went to the hotel acquainted Mr. Wilson of his visit there and a sked him if he had any liquor or kept any, and he said No, he had not a drop in the place. He said "I have not had any or sold any for some time." Mr. Tracey said that he had a warrant and was going to search the place, and he did. He went to the diningroom and kitchen and then went to the collection and then went to the cellar and searched that part of the building and then went to the third floor where the bedrooms are. We passed along by a door that we afterwards found was the linen room and it was locked with a Yale lock. Mr. Tracey asked Mr. Wilson what about this room and Mr. Wilson said "There is nothing in there except the linen." "You can take my word for it." Then we went through to the rear end of the hall and in one room, if I remember correctly, there were three or four men playing cards. We just looked in. The door was about half open, and we turned and came back along the hall and Mr. Tracey then asked Mr. Wilson again about this room and Mr. Wilson said "You can take my word there is nothing in there." "We have not been selling any liquor or keeping any for sale." I then went to the next floor down stairs. When I came back the liquor was in the hall, taken from the room. Mr. Wilson was present, and Mr. Tracey asked him then what about another room pretty nearly opposite the linen room, and Mr. Wilson said "There is nothing in there." "It is a guest's room;" and Mr. Tracey said he would like to look in as he had a warrant to search the place; and he wrapped two or three times very distinctly and also shook the door, and when he got no response he took a chair which was about four or five feet away and stood on it and looked in over the transom of the door end put his light in. I think the transom was open. I asked him if there was anybody in there, and he said "There is nobody there. I can see quite plainly." Then we telephoned for the wagon and removed the stuff.

Mr. WILSON TO CONTROLLER MURPHY --

- Q. Are all your guests' rooms on one floor?
- A. No. There are rooms on two floors.

SERGEANT PAIMER
TO CONTROLLER MURPHY --

- Q. Did you go toany other floor except the third?
- A. I think I went to the fourth floor.

- Q. Were you present in any room when Mr. Tracey or any other person made any inspection of the effects of the guests' rooms?
- A. No, I was in one or two rooms that were absolutely vacant.

TO HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR --

- Q. Were you in Mr. Curren's room where Mr. Tracey drew the grips or valises from under the bed?
- A. No.

POLICE OFFICER JOHN WREN, called and sworn --

We visited the hotel and searched the old bar in the cellar, the kitchen, dining room and office and on the third flat we found in what Mr. Wilson told us was the linen room there cases of champagne and a basket containing different kinds of liquors. Mr. Tracey searched some other rooms, but I did not see him search. I stood at the top of the stairs on the third flat. I stayed there before the door was open, right by the door. I did not go with Mr. Tracey around the rooms, except to Mr. Kaulbach's room near the linen room. I did not make any search of Mr. Kaulbach's effects. I did not speak to Mr. Kaulbach at his door. Previous to meeting Mr. Kaulbach I was not in his room. I saw Mr. Tracey looking through a transom and know he had a chair, but could not say he had a box. I saw him look through a transom. That was after we had found the liquor.

To Mr. TRACEY --

- Q. Do you remember Mr. Wilson denying that there was anything there but linen?
- A. Yes. He said there was not a drop of liquor in the house. He said there was none in that room where we were looking.

POLICE OFFICER HUGH SCOTT, called and sworn --

I accompanied Mr. Tracey to the King Edward Hotel. I was with him throughout the search. I searched the cellar with him and Sergeant Palmer and Officer Wren. Afterwards we were upstairs and tried several of the doors up there. When we came to one door it was locked. I did It was not the room where we not know whose room it was. found the liquor. We could not get it. I do not think we went to any rooms after that except the linen closet where we got the liquor. I did not hear Mr, Wilson say that the rooms were occupied by guests and he could not admit him. I saw Mr. Tracey look through a transom on a chair and box. Mr. Tracey was in the hotel before I got there. I stood in the hall outside the linen room. I did not go in the linen room. I stayed near the linen room for a while and then went down stairs and telephoned for the patrol waggon. I did not go with Mr. Tracey on his search after he left the linen room. I did not go there with Mr. Tracey. My beat is as far as North Street. I heard they were in there and I went in.

To Mr. TRACEY --

- Q. Did you hear Mr. Wilson deny that there was anything there?
- A. Yes. He said you could take his word.

TO CONTROLLER MURPHY --

- Q. Did you hear him say that the room Mr. Tracey looked into was a guest's room?
- A. No.

Mr. TRACEY To CONTROLLER MURPHY --

- Q. Were you accompanied throughout the search by the officers?
- A. I did not say the officers went into the rooms with me, but I was accompanied to the door. I could tell by the weight of the valises, and I simply opened and closed them and opened and closed the drawers. I think the officers remained outside the rooms. I made a personal search.
- Mr. TRACEY gave the following information: --

There was a conviction against Mr. Wilson October 12th, 1914.

I searched under a Search Warrant, March 20th.1917.

(Search Warrant and Information produced)

There were no women in the rooms that we searched.

I saw none outside of Mrs. Wilson and the lady who came out of the room, who, I suppose, was Miss Wilson.

I gave sufficient warning at each door that I wanted opened to find out if there was an occupant in iter not. I shook the doors and gave three or four loud knocks, and there was positively not a soul in any room that I searched.

The room that I threw the search light in was empty. I think I threw the search light in two rooms. The rooms were empty and the beds undisturbed.

Mr. Wilson accompanied me throughout the search.

Mr. Tracey here quoted Chapter 17, Art.3 of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

Mr. Roderick Macdonald asked if the
Liquor Inspector is a member of the Police Force.

The City Solicitor stated that the Inspector is not a member of the force.

Mr. Macdonald asked if the Board of Control has authority to take evidence under oath outside of the Police Force or the City Prison.

FIRE DEPARTMENT MOTOR PUMPING ENGINE.

Read joint report H. W. Johnston, Acting City Engineer, E. Condon Chief of the Fire Department and Controller Halliday re tenders for a motor fire engine, as follows:-

City Engineer's Office, May 9th, 1917.

His Worship the Mayor. Sir:-

We beg to report that tenders for a motor fire engine were received from -

\$10,600.00 11,457.75 12,000.00 "Seagrave" Austen Bros. Dominion General Equipment Co. "White" American La France Fire Engine Co.

We have written to several of the larger Canadian oities, asking their fire departments for their experience with moror fire engines, of the three makes for which tenders have been received, but there have been replies from only three cities.

The motor engine already in use in our city is the "La France" engine which we have had in service for four years, and which during that time has given therough satis faction. If the price of the three makes had been the same, we would have no hesitation whatever in recommending that another engine of this type be purchased, but as there is a difference of \$1400 between the lowest tender

and the tender for this make, it has been difficult to arrive at a conclusion and make a recommendation. However after discussing the matter thoroughly we agreed that in our judgment it would be in the nestseary best interests of the City, to pay the increased price and purchase another "LaFrance" engine. Some of the reasons which led us to this conclusion are :-

It is found necessary to carry in stock spare parts to the value of about \$500. and this is approximately the value of parts which we have at present in stock. Should an engine of another type be purchased, it would be necessary to increase the amount spent for the engine by this amount, as it is essential that parts be kept in stock so that every precaution be taken to prevent the engine being put out of commission, as very serious results might follow such a contingency.

It is agreed that the adoption of a standard type lends itself to the efficiency of the department, as not only the men in immediate charge of the apparatus, but other men in the department become thoroughly familiar with the standrd type, and in case os sickness or accident there are always men who are competent to run the engine, to replace the regular drivers and engineers.

Having the standard type also necessitates that only one set of parts be kept in stock, thus avoiding consider able expense.

Our experience with the Company buildint the "LaFrance" engine has been satisfactory as regards the upkeep of the engine, as they have each year sent men at their own expense to overhaul the apparatus and advise the Department.

The correspondence with the other departments shows that condiderable difficulty has been met with in obtaining spare parts or repairs for the Seagrave engine, whereas neither they nor ourselves have had any trouble in obtaining these from the LaFrance Company.

The arguments used in above are chiefly in comparing the highest and lowest tenders. Some of them also apply to the comparison of the "White" with the "LaFrance", but in this case the cost of the necessary spare and repair in this case the cost of the necessary spare and repair parts to be carried in stock, would bring the amount of their tender to practically the same as the "La France" engine, and as was stated at the beginning of this report, if the prices were equal, we consider that the existing type of the engine in use in the City, which has fulfilled our sequirements satisfactorily for over four years, whould be purchased.

We beg, therefore, to recommend that the tender of the American La France Fire Engine Company for a 750 - gallon motor fire engine at a price of \$12,000 f.o.b. cars at Halifax, be accepted, and that a contract be entered into with the Company, requiring that their engine fulfil into with the Company, requiring that their engine fulfil such tests as may be approved by the Chief of the Fire Department before payment is made. Department before payment is made.

An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 14 of the Regulation of Hacks.

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Be it enacted by the Council of the city of Halifax, as follows:-

On behalf of the Board of Management and in the interest of the greatest of all national assets — child life-- I, therefore, respectfully request that the City of Halifax transfer to the Children's Hospital of the City of Halifax, N.S., on the same terms and conditions as the previous grant, one hundred additional street from age on Morris Street, running west from the present lot and thence south to a point in line with the present south ern boundary of the Hospital grounds.

It is scarcely necessary to point out to you that this Hospital has been filling a long felt want in this community and when the proposed extension materializes will greater results will undoubtedly be accomplished.

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In view of conditions confronting us, we felt compelled to curtail as far as possible the services outlined above. We borrowed on account of Sidewalks last year the sym of \$35,000.00. This we have reduced to \$25,000.00. The other three items making up the amount set out above are mostly to complete work already undertaken. The contract for the Abattoir, as you know is now under way. I would have deferred the small borrowing on Public Comfort Station were it not for the fact that the balance required was previously borrowed, and is now in hand; as the amount necessary to enable us to carry out this work through is comparatively small, I do not think we were justified in omitting it,

In addition to the amounts set out above, it will be necessary to include in our borrowing bill, the amount of the contract already let, on the North West Arm Sewer; as I understant it is the intention of contin ue this work to completion, we should embody a sufficient amount to take care of the balance of this contract, which the Engineer estimates at \$150,000.00. It would be impossible however, to complete the balance of this work during the coming year. I would therefore recommend that the sum of \$75,000.00, which would take care of the portion of the work which could be put through this year, be included in our borrowing.

As you are aware, we have, during the session fo the Legislature just closed, acquired Legislation enabling us to put down curbs and gutters where thought advisable. feel, considerable improvement could be made, particularly on some of the streets of the North end, by the placing of these curbs and gutters, and we should make some effort during the present year, particularly in view of our curterilling on the Sidewalk work, to make a start at least with ailing on the Sidewalk work, to make a start at least with some of these curbs and gutters. I would therefore recommend that some amount be included in this borrowing, so that we can at least make some effort in this direction. The amount need not exceed \$5,000.00.

We require about two thousand feet of 36-inch sewer for sewer on Jubilee Road and Bloomingdale Terrace. This can be bought of the AMOO sewer blocks, similar to the material used in building the intercepting sewer at the North West Arm, for \$1.91 per foot f.o.b. cars Halifax. This is cheaper than we can manufacture the concrete pipe and besides, we would not be able to manufacture the concrete pipe or time for the work.

I would recommend the purchase of two thousand feet of AMCO segment sewer blocks.







The shhool room doors should open outwards to the hall.

The additional exits near the south-west corner of the building are very small. While these latter exits are in addition to those required by the Building Act, and at first sight it might appear that there would be and at first sight it might appear that there would be and greater exit capacity, yet on account of the narrow much greater exit capacity, yet on account of the narrow ness of them, in case of a panic there might be a jam ness of them, in case of a panic there might be a jam at this point with a liability to danger.

With regard to the doors opening inward, I under-

stand that some authorities recommend this method of having the doors for school rooms, but in my opinion, any room which contains a large number of people, at one time, should have its doors opening outward.

You probably have a copy of the Order-in-Council enacted last November, concerning the prices of some of the necessaries of life, but for convenience I enclose you one.

It is sometimes said that under Clause six, as Minister of Labour, I have powers to conduct a more thorough investigation under oath, &c., than has a municipality. You will observe that under that section I may appoint an examiner, and in writing give him all the power and authority that I myself could exercise. That municipalities may have at their hand all the powers that where a municipality complies with Clause five and by resolution asks me to appoint its solicitor or other official an examiner with all the powers mentioned in Clause six naming the official so chosen, I shall be glad to clothe him therewith that the investigation may at once go forward substantially under local control, and at its expense.

OIL STORAGE TANKS - IMPERIAL OIL COMPANY'S WHARF.
Read report Acting City Engineer, as follows:-

City Engineer's Office, May 29th, 1917.

His Worship the Mayor.

I have an application from the Imperial Oil Company Limited for permission to construct two tanks on their wharf at the foot of Duke Street of a capacity of about wharf at the foot of Duke Street of a capacity of about 100 barrels each, one for storing gasoline and the other, refined oil.

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The proposed location of the tanks is over 200 feet east of Water Street and at the edge of the wharf.— It is proposed to bury the tanks underground, encase same with concrete and have at least two feet of solid filling over them, the tanks to be equipped with proper ventilating shafts and vacuum relief valves. This method of construction is similar to that adopted in other Cities.

City ordinance #26 provides that the Council, may from time to time, as occasion requires, designate a building or buildings within the City to be used for the sotrage of petroleum, naphtha or other inflammable oil. It also provides that no person shall at any time have in any building other than the one so designated, more than ten gallons of naphtha or more than six barrels of petroleum or other inflammable oil.

It would appear to me that the method proposed by the Company of sotring oil would be a afer and less objectionable than having oil stored in barrels in a building. The tanks would be filled from steamers, attaching their discharge pipe to the inlet pipe of the tanks and tank wagons or other receptables are filled by pumping from the tank, so that there is no waste of oil or gasoline, thus minimizing the danger.

MARKET BUILDING.

At the last meeting of the Board of Control I was requested to submit a plan showing proposed arrangement of permanent stalls at the Market. I am preparing a plan, but until some thing is done with the facor, I do not think that the work on the stalls should be begun.

The floor is today in worse shape than at has ever been and is apparently getting worse. The question of relaying this floor has been before the B oard for over a year, and there must be some way of compelling the contractor to complete his contract. As you are aware, this contract was under the supervision of the designing architect, and the terms provided that his decition on points at issue, shall be binding on both parties/ He has already stated that the floor is not laid in accordance with the specification, and that it should be relaid.

I would recommend that a resolution of the Board be passed, urging him to compel the completion of the work.

YOUNG AVENUE WIDENING AT #144.

City Engineer's Office, May 26th, 1917.

His Worship the Mayor. Sir:-

I beg to report on the accompanying minute of the Board of Control covering letter from Dr. Zwicker, that in 1900 the City Council authorized the laying of a granite curb and gutter on the east side of Young Avenue from Inglis to Atlantic Street, provided the property owners would give the City a trip of land 10 feet wide, necessary to widen Young Avenue to the width of 80 feet. A portion of widen Young Avenue to the width of 80 feet. A portion of this work was done in 1900 and the remainder in 1901. The this work was done in 1900 and the remainder in 1901. The city also made a gravel sidewalk. The property owners provided and planted a row of trees in front of their properties.

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In 1903 Mr. Hobrecker made a similar proposition to the City in connection with the west side of the street from Atlantic Street northwardly. The City graded and made a gravel sidewalk and laid a curb and gutter, and in teturn Mr. Hobrecker deeded a ten foot strip and planted the trees.

This is the proposition that I recommended in connection with Dr. Zwicker's property. I do not think that we should do the sodding or plant trees in front of his property, as, according to his own vvaluation, the land required by the City is worth \$486. The estimated cost of laying a granite ourh and gutter in front of his property is \$963, which he would have to pay one-half, or \$482.

Under these circumstances I adhere to my former report that if Dr. Zwicker will deed the land in front of his property, necessary for widening Young Avenue to its tull width, that the City lay a curb and gutter and grade the sidewalk in front of his property. I am attaching Mr. Hobrecker's letter to the Board of Works, dated June 4th, 1904.

Enclosed find copy of resolution, which was passed at the last meeting of our Exhibition Commission, May 22nd, copies of which I have been instructed to forward to the City Council of Halifax for their approval.

WHEREAS after careful investigation this Commission is of the opinion that it is both requisite and necessary that steps be taken at once to borrow money for the purchase and improvement of land, and for the erection, alteration and repair of suitable buildings for Provincial Exhibition purposes, and

WHEREAS in the opinion of this Commission it is estimated that upwards of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars is immediately needed to effect repairs in the buildings in order to hold an Exhibition this year; that Seven Thous and Five Mundred (\$7.500.) Dollars is immediately necessary to deposit with the Supreme Court for the acquisition ary to deposit with the Supreme Court for the acquisition of the Monaghan property by expropriation; that Nine Thousand (\$49000.) dollars is necessary to reimburse the Provand (\$49000.) dollars is necessary to reimburse the advances ince of Nova Scotia and the City of Halifax for the advances

made to the Commission for the purchase of the Cross property; and that certain other amounts are necessary to liquidate an amount borrowed from the Bank and expended by the Commission on Capital Account.

THEREFORE PESOLVED that the Commission hereby borrow on the credit of the Commission and subject to the terms and conditions of Chapter 57, Revised Statutes, 1900 "The Provincial Exhibition Act" as amended by the Legislature at the session of 1917, the sum of Forty Thousand (40,000) Dollars to be expended and appropriated by the Commission for the above purposes, and

FURTHER RESOLVED that this Commission for the purposes of effecting such loan, make and issue its bonds redeemable within such time as the Executive may determine, not to exceed a period of thirty years, and that said bonds hear interest at a rate to be determined by the Executive, not to exceed six per cent (6%) and that the Executive are hereby empowered and have authority if thought advisable, to provide for a Sinking Fund, not to exceed two per cent (2%) per annum,

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Pres ident and Secretary of this Commission be authorized to sign said bonds on behalf of the Commission, and that they further have the power to execute on behalf of the Commission any Mortgage or Trust Deed that may be necessary to more fully effect a loan,

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FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Governot-in-Council of the Province of Nova Scotia, and to the City Council of the City of Halifax for approval.

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor-in-Council of the Province of Nova Scotia and the City Council of the City of Halifax be requested to guarantee the repayment of any bonds that are made and issued hereunder.

Secretary Board of Control. Dear Sir:-

I cannot usefully add more to the opinion which I gave on Mr. Murray's first account. Assuming that legal assistance was necessary, the propriety of the charges would depend on the leggth of time occupied and the importance of the case, respecting which I have no information.

I should, however, point out that many of the matters in respect to which a charge is made, do not seem to me such as would necessarily involve the assistance of counsel. Similar matters are dealt with every day by the Police in the ordinary discharge of their duty, and the late Inspector Mr. Messervey, attended to similar matters almost entirely without assistance. I can understand why a new Inspector at the outset would require legal assistance, but after a short experience in view of the fact that the procedure and evidence in all these cases is practically identical, I see no reason why he should not be able to conduct them as efficiently as was done by Mr. Messervey. In unusual cases Mr. Messervey was always at liberty to obtain any assistance and Mr. Tracey whould have the same privilege.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

Read report City Electrician in reply to letter Nova
Scotia Board of Fire Underwriters, re Fire Alarm System,
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as follows:-

City Electrician's Office.
May 31st, 1917.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of Board of Control. Dear Sirs:-

With reference to the complaint of the N. S. Board of Fire Underwriters regarding the failure of the Fire Alarm system when Box 72 was pulled for the fire at the Home for Aged Men on May 9th, the facts are as follows:

The first two rounds of the box were not correctly transmitted. The balance of the signal, however, came in correctly as well as a second alarm from the same box. I do not know who pulled the box, but it has been reported to me that the man who sent in the alarm received a severe shock from contact with the box, and afterwards his umbrella to pull the trigger.

On examination of the box later in the afternoon I found the release mechanism pulled out of place and the box damaged so that it was necessary to bring it in for repairs. I do now know how much force was used in puriling pairs. I do now know how much force was used in puriling the box, but evidently it was considerable and sustained for more than a minute, or long enough, to interfere with the first two rounds, after which, as before stated, the signal came in correctly.

As to the claim that the box was charged with high tension current. I could find no evidence of it in the box, and there was no disturbance in the office that would indicate any such condition,

I can only remember one similar case in 22 years when Box 15 was pulled so violently that the trigger was bent out of shape so the box could not be pulled a few days later when required for another fire in the vicinity.

I cannot agree with the statement of the Underwriters association that either of the above incidents demonstrate an unsatisfactory condition of the Fire Alarm system. Such an unsatisfactory condition of the Fire Alarm system. Such things are liable to happen at any time, and for matter, are as liable to happen in a system installed today as in one as liable to happen in a system installed today as in one installed 20 years ago. I do not claim that the system is installed 20 years ago. I do not claim that the system is installed 20 years ago. I do not claim that the system is installed 20 years ago. I do not claim that the system is perfect. I could suggest many improvements, but the cost would be considerable and I should be inclined to doubt the wisdom of scrapping apparatus that gives as good service the wisdom of scrapping apparatus that gives as good service as this system is giving notwhthstanding the fact that a considerable part of it is extremely old. I should have no considerable part of it is extremely old. I should have no hesitation in challenging a comparison in the performance of this system with that of any city of similar size with open line work on this Continent.
