COGSWELL DISTRICT TRANSIT TERMINAL TO OPEN



Since June 17 Barrington Street, from Upper Water Street to Duke Street, has been closed to accommodate

construction in support of the Cogswell District project. This was a major closure that impacted drivers, Halifax Transit, pedestrians, cyclists, and property owners as it required the relocation of the Barrington Street bus bays and the rerouting of 30 Halifax Transit routes.

Residents are advised that on December 16 the new Halifax Transit Terminal at Scotia Square will open, rerouting approximately 30 Halifax Transit routes that have been on detour for the last six months. The Transit Terminal will include new heated shelters, additional seating and waiting space for passengers, wider sidewalks and an additional bus bay. New trees and landscaping elements will be installed in 2025.

In addition to these changes, Valour Way, which closed in February 2023, will re-open, and the new roundabout, which partially opened in October, will be fully operational as of December 16, with a temporary connection to Nora Bernard Street. The Nora Bernard Street connection will facilitate local access to the businesses on Amalamek Way but will not connect to Brunswick Street at this time.

Cogswell Street, from Brunswick Street to Upper Water Street, will also open on December 16. At this time, the transit lanes along Barrington Street through the roundabout, and on Cogswell Street between Barrington Street and Gottingen Street, will come into effect.

2025 URBAN DESIGN AWARDS



The Halifax Regional Municipality is calling for submissions to the 2025 Urban Design Awards – a celebration of urban design excellence in the Halifax region that occurs every two years. The submission deadline is February 10, 2025.

To qualify for an award, projects must have been completed after January 1, 2020, and meet one of the nine following awards categories (each with different eligibility requirements for award selection):

- Urban Design Plans
- Urban Architecture
- Landscape Architecture and Civic Design Projects
- Urban Elements
- Housing Solutions
- Community Connections and Initiatives

- Heritage Restoration Projects
- Heritage Adaptive Re-use Projects
- Student Projects

A panel of four independent jurors will evaluate the submissions looking for category-specific criteria and broader design principles such as human scale, community context and intentional accessible or inclusive features.

The submission fee is \$402.50 (including taxes) and this fee is waived for nonprofit and student projects. Student submissions will be accepted until April 20, 2025.

An awards ceremony will take place on Monday, May 26, 2025 at the Halifax Central Library. Attendance will be open to the public and additional information will be shared closer to the event.

SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL PROGRAM



There's no denying it – winter is on its way.

Did you know that there is a snow removal program available for seniors (ages 65 and older) and persons with disabilities to help ensure safe access to your home?

The <u>Senior Snow Removal</u> is a YMCA program provided in partnership with Halifax Regional Municipality, and oversees the clearing of front and back steps, walkways, ramps, and access to fuel tanks. Please note that the program does not include driveway clearing.

Those 65+ or persons with disabilities must also meet the following eligibility criteria:

- The participant must reside in a single dwelling home which is owned or rented;
- The participant, also including all individuals who live on the premises aged eighteen or older, must not exceed a total gross household income of \$32,000, and;
- The participant may not be a landlord.

WINTER GREEN CART TIPS



Use a yard waste bag to line your cart to prevent material from freezing to the cart



When temperatures drop, materials in green carts can freeze and cause issues for both residents and waste haulers. To avoid some of the problems associated with green cart in the winter, our Solid Waste Resources team has some helpful tips:

- Put your green cart out for each collection, even if it's not full. This will give material less time to freeze
- Line the bottom of your green cart with a yard waste bag, boxboard or newspaper
- Place your green cart in a place where the sun can reach it
- Wrap food in paper scraps

SNOW CLEARING

While the snow hasn't started to fly yet, I would encourage you to begin preparing your property for snow clearing season by removing planters, lawn decorations and any other portable objects near the sidewalk and trimming any tree branches and shrubs that originate from your property that may obstruct access and visibility for snow-clearing equipment. You can mark any permanent structures or objects with a reflector that will be visible above the snow. This helps crews identify obstacles.

Effective December 15 to March 31, the municipal overnight winter parking ban will be enforced from 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. during weather events and snow removal operations. You can sign up for hfxALERT to receive crucial updates, including Winter Parking Ban notifications.

During snow events, all our equipment and operators work as quickly as possible to clear roads and sidewalks as efficiently as possible. If the <u>service standard</u> has expired for your street to be cleared, please contact 311 and they can dispatch a plow. Before the service standard has expired, please be patient and give our crews time – we are working as quickly as we can. You can find out what classification your street is by searching on our <u>interactive map</u>.

Let's work together to ensure a safe and smooth winter season for everyone in our community. Stay warm and stay safe!


