BUDGET 2025/26



Please be advised of the following key dates for the 2025/26 municipal budget process.

The municipal budget funds all costs associated with servicing a growing municipality. This includes day-to-day municipal operations, capital priority initiatives approved by Regional Council and capital projects and investments to purchase, construct, rehabilitate and replace municipal assets. There are several milestones in the annual municipal budget process. Below are the key dates for the 2025/26 municipal budget process:

- Tuesday, January 14
 2023/24 Strategic Performance Report and Snapshot: Regional Council will receive the 2023/24 Strategic
 Performance Report, outlining progress on strategic key performance indicators intended to assess advancement on approved priorities from the <u>Strategic</u> Priorities Plan 2021-25.
- Wednesday, February 5
 Budget Introduction and Capital Plan Recommendation:
- Wednesday, February 12 to Wednesday, February 26

Business Unit and Budget

HalifACT COMMUNITY UPDATE




It is exciting to share the sixth issue of the <u>HalifACT community update</u> with you! The update offers an overview of the recent work that the municipality and its partners have been doing to mitigate and prepare for the impacts of climate change. In this issue, we highlight the winners of the <u>Youth Climate Action Fund</u>, the approval of our <u>new watershed management</u> <u>framework</u> and the decision to source renewable wind energy from a local company.



The municipality continues to install rooftop solar panels on eight more municipal buildings, with installations expected to be finished by the end of 2025. Solar energy systems were recently installed at the East Preston Community Centre, Sackville Public Library and the Carrolls Corner Community Centre. Once they are all online, these solar installations will save the municipality more than \$100,000 in electricity costs every year and protect against the volatility of energy prices.

WINTER PARKING AND SNOW CLEARING



The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that the municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect from December 15 through to March 31, 2025. The overnight winter parking ban is enforced from 1:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. during declared weather events and snow removal operations.

Residents are encouraged to plan ahead when snow is in the forecast and secure off-street parking when the overnight winter parking ban is enforced.

The municipality has two zones for the overnight winter parking ban: **Zone 1 – Central** and **Zone 2 – Non-Central** (see map above).

Zone 1 – Central refers to the Halifax peninsula and downtown Dartmouth within Highway 111 (the Circumferential Highway) and some surrounding areas. **Zone 2 – Non-Central** is anywhere outside Zone 1 – Central. Residents are able to determine which zone they're in by searching their address using the interactive tool available <u>here</u>,

The following overnight winter parking ban scenarios may occur before, during or after a declared weather event:

 Municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect/has been lifted for all zones
 Zone 1 – Central
 Zone 2 – Non-Central

Having two zones enhances service delivery by implementing overnight winter parking bans that accommodate targeted snow removal.

Weather conditions and snow clearing operations will determine how long an overnight winter parking ban will be enforced, as it may be in place for more than one night.

Overnight winter parking bans will continue to be communicated to residents via <u>public service</u> <u>announcements</u>, <u>hfxALERT</u>, <u>halifax.ca</u>, and <u>@hfxgov</u> on X. Residents who are signed up for <u>hfxALERT</u> will receive notifications for all overnight winter parking ban scenarios.

Compliance

When and where you park this winter can have a big impact on snow clearing. To help ensure the streets are cleared properly, the municipality has enhanced enforcement in areas around hospitals, schools, bus routes and challenging streets to ensure unobstructed access for snow equipment and emergency vehicles.

Officers will be ticketing vehicles obstructing sidewalk clearing. Vehicles hanging out of a driveway or parked on the sidewalk are prone to damage and become dangerous obstacles for crews. These obstacles prevent crews from clearing sidewalks properly, which can quickly become an accessibility issue.

Regardless of the status of the overnight winter parking ban, vehicles can be ticketed or towed at any time if their vehicle is interfering with snow clearing operations as outlined in Section 139 of the *Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act.*

To avoid a ticket and the costs of being towed, ask yourself these questions:

- Is the overnight winter parking ban currently being enforced?
- Is my vehicle making the road impassable?
- Is my vehicle impeding snow operations in the area?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, do not park on the street. The municipality does not want to ticket or tow. The objective is to keep vehicles off the streets to facilitate efficient and safe clearing and ensure emergency vehicles, buses and other vehicles have proper access.

Safety

Planters, lawn decorations and any other portable objects near the sidewalk should be removed before the winter. Any permanent structures or objects too big to move should be marked with a reflector that will be visible above the snow to help crews identify obstacles.

Important Reminders to All Property Owners

It is against <u>By-Law S-300</u> to throw or pile snow in the street or on the sidewalk. This is a serious problem that can cause safety issues for pedestrians and other users as it complicates snow clearing.

HALIFAX TRANSIT - BARRINGTON STREET TERMINAL


The new Barrington Street Transit Terminal reopened on Monday, December 16. Routes affected are: 1, 2, 5, 7A, 7B, 8, 9A, 9B, 10A, 10B, 10C, 29, 84, 93, 123, 127, 135, 136, 137, 138, 158, 159, 161, 165, 168A, 168B, 182, 183, 185, 186, 192, 194, 196.

Passengers are directed to use the following bays at Scotia Square:

- Bay 1 (6087) Barrington Street after Duke Street: located on Barrington Street before Reconciliation Way. Routes that will service this stop include: 1, 9A, 9B, 10A, 10B, 10C, 182, 183, 185, 186, 192, 194, and 196.
- Bay 2 (2348) located further down Barrington Street, after Reconciliation Way. Routes that will service this stop include: 2, 7B, 8, 29, 123, 127, 135, 136, 137, 138, 158, 159, 161, 165, 168A, and 168B.
 - Bay 3 (6105) located on Barrington Street after Cogswell Street. Routes that will service this stop include: 5, 84, 93, 123, 127, 135, 136, 137, 138, 158, 159, 161, 165, 168A, and 168B.
 - Bay 4 (6108) located further down Barrington Street, in the direction of Duke Street. Routes that will service this stop include: 2, 7A, 29, 182, 183, 185, 186, 192, 194, and 196.
 - Bay 5 (6107) located further on Barrington Street before Duke Street. Routes that will service this stop include: 1, 8, 9A, 9B, 10A, 10B, and 10C.

Regional Express Routes (320, 330, 370) will continue to service stop **9061** at **Duke Street before Albemarle Street** after Monday, December 16. The following map shows the new locations of Scotia Square Terminal Bays 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 effective Monday, December 16.

As of Monday, December 16, 34 routes were also detoured to accommodate the reopening of Scotia Square Terminal. <u>Click here</u> for more details on the routes impacted by the detours.

If you have participated in the program previously, please make sure to complete the <u>Confirmation</u> <u>Form which can be found here.</u> Due to the Canada Post Strike, the municipality will be issuing tax bills this month with an amended due date for payment.

Organizations can request assistance through a payment plan by contacting <u>cashmgmt@halifax.ca</u>, by calling HRM Customer Service at 311, or by email at <u>Contactus@311.halifax.ca</u>. Inquiries or questions of clarification can also be directed to the program's designated email address at <u>nonprofttax@halifax.ca</u>. A payment plan allows for smaller payment by installments which can assist with cash flow.

Lower Sackville's new tiny home community is now open. This supportive housing initiative welcomed approximately 70 residents, providing fully furnished homes and essential wraparound services. It's a compassionate step forward in addressing homelessness and creating safe, stable spaces for those in need.

The vision is that every resident of the Halifax Regional Municipality has a safe, supportive and sustainable home and that all homes are purposely constructed for long-term habitation, built to safety codes and standards, and in a suitable location based on municipal planning strategies, with access to transportation and amenities. 


WINTER SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL SERVICE STANDARDS

PRIORITY ONE - 12 HOURS ROAD SERVICE BEGINS AFTER 2cm OF ACCUMULATION PRIORITY TWO - 24 HOURS ROAD SERVICE BEGINS AFTER 10cm OF ACCUMULATION

Crews begin their work before the winter weather event even begins. They do so by applying salt or brine, to streets and sidewalks across the region. Snow clearing efforts begin once the snow has begun to accumulate.

Learn when clearing will take place - per our standards and timelines - what your street or sidewalk should look like when the job is done and find who to contact if your street or sidewalk is not cleared within timelines.

By entering your address into our <u>interactive</u> <u>map</u>, you can find out if your <u>street</u> is cleared by the municipality or the province, what priority level and the clearing timeline. If you are using a screen reader, please call 311 and an agent will assist you in finding your street priority.

Our crews are out and clearing snow as soon as it begins to accumulate, but the service standards for clearing start when accumulation stops and <u>the weather event end time is</u> <u>confirmed</u>.

Before contacting 311 to report snow and ice clearing issues, make sure the clearing timelines have expired. Please note, clearing timelines may be exceeded during <u>exceptional</u> <u>weather conditions</u>.

If you contact 311 before the specified timelines have passed, your concerns will be recorded but crews will not dispatched, as clearing efforts are still underway within timelines.

Once the service timelines have expired, you can report any snow or ice removal issues on municipal streets/ sidewalks/ bike lanes via email <u>ContactUs@311.halifax.ca</u> or by calling 311.
