INVESTMENTS IN DISTRICT 1

Each fiscal year, all districts are allocated District Funds that Councillors have the ability to designate for community benefit. District Capital Funds, totalling \$94,000 for the fiscal year, can provide a grant to: any non-profit organization or charity, provide funding to support HRM projects or, projects proposed by the Councillor. 
Parks Projects

The following projects have been approved for 2024/25 in District 1:

- MacDonald Sports Park Ball Diamond Lighting Design
- Meaghers Grant Park Court Rehabilitation
- Musquodoboit Rural High School Court Rehabilitation
- Carrolls Corner Community Centre Park Recretional Trails Grant
- Middle Musquodoboit Community Park Development - Phase 2:

The construction of the splash pad was tendered in 2023, but the cost exceeded the park development budget. Under the 2024-2025 Capital Budget, staff requested an additional \$450,000 from Council and have posted a new Request for Proposals for the

splash pad as of March 14, 2024. The deadline for proposals was April 4, 2024. A separate Request for Proposals will be posted for the playground portion of the park later this Spring.

• North Suburban Artificial Turf Field

Lockview High School Park Field is anticipated to close in August 2024 to begin construction of an all-weather turf field scheduled to open in September 2025. The Northern Suburban Area Community Turf Committee championed the project, involving Deputy Mayor Cathy Deagle Gammon, the Hon. Brian Wong, and MP Darrell Samson.

The upgrade to an allweather field will allow for extended seasonal usage with more durable material for use in wet weather and



field lighting of the field to allow for extended hours of use during shoulder seasons. The field will also include a walking path and an Indigenous programming space.

Parks & Recreation recognizes the support of the Province of Nova Scotia and the Government of Canada. We are pleased to work in partnership with the Department of Communities, Culture, and Heritage as well the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program to develop and promote cultural resources for all Nova Scotians.

Active Planning Applications

Case 21460 - Residential Development Opportunity Site C, south of Ingram Drive and west of Highway 102, Fall River

On February 16, 2024 the Province of Nova Scotia designated Case 21460 - Residential Development Opportunity Site C, Fall River as a Provincial Special Planning Area. This application by KWR Approvals Inc., on behalf of Perry Lake Developments, for a Residential Development Opportunity at Site C, south of Ingram Drive and west of Highway 102, Fall River proposes to develop three 3-storey multiple-unit buildings.

On November 8, 2022 Halifax Regional Council rejected a request to amend the District 14 & 17 MPS to remove the requirement for a road connection over the CN rail line connecting Ingram Drive to Cobequid Road.

On October 3, 2022 North West Community Council defeated the Notice of Motion for this Development Agreement. This development agreement request will now be under the jurisdiction of the Province of Nova Scotia.

Case 22009 - Aerotech Business Park

Planning & Development is working to update the zoning for the Aerotech Business Park and surrounding lands within the Airport Industrial Designation. This project includes introducing new zones that will protect and support these valuable industrial lands.

Case 22195 - 19 McPherson Road, Fall River

KWR Approvals Inc., on behalf of LawDia Developments.

Case 22670 - Conrad Quarry Lands Rezoning

On Tuesday, February 15, 2022, Halifax Regional Council held a virtual public hearing and approved the application to consider industrial and highway commercial development on the Conrad Quarry lands.

Cases 24284 and 24282 | Port Wallace & Southdale Special Planning Areas

In July 2022, the Executive Panel on Housing approved the application by Clayton Developments to allow for early construction activities like tree removal and earthworks within the Southdale/Mount Hope special planning area in advance of a Development Agreement for the residential community.

PLANAPP 2023-00673 (Former Case 23188) - Hwy #2, Fall River

Application by KWR Approvals Inc., on behalf of John and Judith MacDonald to enter into a Development Agreement at 3136 & 3124 Hwy #2, Fall River for 12 townhouses, demolishing an office and residential structure. Staff are awaiting a revised submissions from the Developer in order to prepare the draft recommendation report and development agreement for review.
