PARTICIPATE VIRTUALLY IN COUNCIL CHAMBER MEETINGS

We've introduced virtual public participation for in-person meetings held in Council Chamber as of November 14!

This option is now available for any meetings taking place in Council Chamber where there is an opportunity for the public to speak, including meetings of Budget Committee. This is in addition to a livestream of all meetings, which is available on the municipality's YouTube channel.

In August 2023, Regional Council passed amendments to *Administrative Order One* –

Respecting the Procedures of the Council to enable virtual participation. These amendments provided the necessary legislative changes to accommodate virtual participants.

BUSINESS UNIT BUDGET PRESENTATION SCHEDULE

Regional Council has begun the 2024/25 municipal budget process by presenting the 2024/25 Budget Direction on November 28.

The annual municipal budget funds all costs to service a growing municipality. This includes day-to-day municipal operations (i.e. transit, police, fire, garbage collection, snow clearing, staffing costs), capital priority initiatives approved by Regional Council (i.e.: HalifACT, Cogswell District project, Integrated Mobility Plan), as well as capital projects and investments to purchase, construct, rehabilitate and replace municipal assets such as buildings, roads, active transportation, parks and bridges.

The Budget Direction is presented annually to Budget Committee with recommendations for tax and non-tax revenues to accommodate changing operational costs, capital investments, as well as debt and reserve changes. It is also reflective of ongoing and emerging opportunities and challenges.

Municipal staff will present their business unit proposed budgets on the dates outlined below. Information on each of these items will be posted on Halifax.ca the Friday before the meeting.

SNOW SEASON IS HERE



With each weather event, snow-clearing crews are responsible for approximately 3,844 lane kilometres of streets and about 1,000 kilometres of sidewalks! We can't control Mother Nature or what this winter has in store, but if we work together, we can all be better prepared for whatever the season may bring.

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
HRM has service standards for streets, sidewalks, and bus stops and the timing varies depending on the priority level. We prioritize commonly used streets, bus routes and roads that provide access to hospitals and schools. When the snow stops, operators work as quickly and safely as possible to have all the roads cleared within 24 hours and major roads and bus routes within 12 hours.

Before contacting 311 about snow clearing, please ensure the service timelines for your area have expired. You can find detailed information about snow-clearing service timelines on the interactive map or in the "when should clearing be complete?" section on the website.

If your street or sidewalk has not been cleared by the indicated time in each chart, please email ContactUs@311.halifax.ca or call 311 so crews can be dispatched to address the issue. If an emergency vehicle needs to access a street, staff dispatch a plow immediately to that street.

Residents should note that in snowfalls greater than 30 centimeters or in blizzard conditions, more time may be needed to complete clearing. The same exception may apply when there are rapidly changing weather conditions. Crews will continue working until all streets and sidewalks are clear and safe. Of course, some roads are taken care of by the province, depending on where you live. Provincial road information can be found here.

OVERNIGHT WINTER PARKING BAN IN EFFECT

Weather conditions and snow-clearing operations will determine how long an overnight winter parking ban will be enforced, as it may be in place for more than one night. The easiest way to stay informed about the status of overnight winter parking bans is to register for automated notifications by signing up for hfxALERT. Subscribers will receive timely alerts by phone, email, and/or text message when the ban is in effect and again when it is lifted. Residents are encouraged to plan ahead when snow is in the forecast and secure off-street parking when the overnight winter parking ban is enforced

The municipality has two zones for the overnight winter parking ban: **Zone 1 – Central** and **Zone 2 – Non-Central** (see attached maps).

Zone 1 – Central refers to the Halifax Peninsula and downtown Dartmouth within Highway 111

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(the Circumferential Highway) and some surrounding areas. **Zone 2 – Non-Central** is a designated area outside of Zone 1 – Central. Residents are able to determine which zone they're in by searching their address using the interactive tool available <u>here</u>, or by referring to the attached maps.

The following overnight winter parking ban scenarios may occur before, during or following a declared weather event:

- Municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect/has been lifted
- Zone 1 Central overnight winter parking ban is in effect/has been lifted
- Zone 2 Non-Central overnight winter parking ban is in effect/has been lifted
- Zone 1 Central overnight winter parking ban has been lifted, but will continue to be enforced in Zone 2 – Non-Central
- Zone 2 Non-Central overnight winter parking ban has been lifted, but will continue to be enforced in Zone 1 – Central

Sometimes, targeted snow removal in certain downtown areas is required. Having two zones enhances service delivery by implementing overnight winter parking bans that accommodate targeted snow removal.

Overnight winter parking bans will continue to be communicated to residents via <u>public service</u> <u>announcements</u>, <u>hfxALERT</u>, <u>halifax.ca</u>, and <u>@hfxgov</u> on X. Residents who are signed up for hfxALERT will receive notifications for all overnight winter parking ban scenarios.

Compliance

When and where you park this winter can have a big impact on snow clearing. To help ensure the streets are properly cleared, the municipality has enhanced enforcement in areas around hospitals, schools, bus routes, and problem streets to ensure unobstructed access for snow equipment and emergency vehicles.

Officers will be ticketing vehicles obstructing sidewalk clearing. Vehicles hanging out of a driveway or parked on the sidewalk are prone to damage and become dangerous obstacles for crews. Such obstacles prevent crews from clearing sidewalks properly, which can quickly become an accessibility issue.

Regardless of the status of the overnight winter parking ban, vehicles can be ticketed or towed, at any time, if their vehicle is interfering with snow-clearing operations as outlined in Section 139 of the *Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act*.

To avoid a ticket and the costs of being towed, residents should ask themselves these questions when considering parking on the street this winter:

- Is the overnight winter parking ban currently being enforced?
- Is my vehicle making the road impassable?
- Is my vehicle impeding snow operations in the area?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, do not park on the street. The municipality does not want to ticket or tow — the objective is to keep vehicles off the streets to facilitate efficient and safe clearing. This, in turn, ensures emergency vehicles, buses, and other vehicles have proper access.

Safety

Planters, lawn decorations, and any other portable objects near the sidewalk should be removed before the winter. Any permanent structures or objects too big to move should be

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marked with a reflector that will be visible above the snow to help crews identify obstacles. Safety is our top priority for residents and crews. We ask for residents' continued cooperation and diligence during declared overnight winter parking bans.

Important reminders to all property owners

Never clear snow from your property onto the street or sidewalk. Property owners must ensure the snow they clear is piled on their own property. It is against By-Law S-300 to throw or pile snow in the street or on the sidewalk. This is a serious problem that can cause safety issues for pedestrians and other users as it complicates snow clearing. The municipality has enforcement tools in place to address non-compliance with the by-law.

heading out on a frozen body of water can be tragic.

HRM provides ice thickness testing during the winter, however, it has not yet begun for the season. Testing will begin once ice has formed, and it is safe for staff to begin testing. Currently, it is not safe to be on frozen lakes or ponds, as there is noticeable thin ice and open water in many lakes across the region. Visit our website for ice thickness testing results for more than 70 lakes and ponds throughout the region once testing has begun for the season.

The Canadian Red Cross recommends that ice be at least 15 cm thick for individual skating, 20 cm thick for group skating, and 25 cm for snowmobiling. Extreme caution is advised in areas where streams flow into and out of lakes. It is also important to note that ice conditions may vary over the entire surface of lakes and are subject to change with weather conditions.

SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL PROGRAM

There's no denying it – winter is on its way. There is a snow removal program available for seniors (ages 65 and older) and persons with disabilities to help ensure safe access to your home.

The Senior Snow Removal is a YMCA program provided in partnership with Halifax Regional Municipality and oversees the clearing of front and back steps, walkways, ramps, and access to fuel tanks. Please note that the program does not include driveway clearing.

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Those 65+ or persons with disabilities must also meet the following eligibility criteria:

- ✓ The participant must reside in a single dwelling home which is owned or rented;
- ✓ The participant, also including all individuals who live on the premises aged eighteen or older, must not exceed a total gross household income of \$32,000, and;
- ✓ The participant may not be a landlord.

 The Senior Snow Removal operates on a firstcome, first-serve basis. When maximum
 capacity is reached, the program will come to
 a close and individuals will be placed on a
 waitlist.

EMERA OVAL IS OPEN FOR THE SEASON!



VOLUNTARY VULNERABLE PERSONS REGISTRY (VVPR)



The VVPR provides essential information to first responders and Emergency Management staff and volunteers to help prioritize responses to residents' needs in situations such as sustained power outages or severe storms.

The VVPR is a voluntary, self-referral list intended for residents without 24-hour support who experience severe difficulty with any of the following:

- Mobility
- vision impairment
- hearing impairment
- developmental disabilities
- · cognitive impairment
- · mental health conditions
- any resident who requires electricity for life-sustaining equipment such as Those not eligible include (exceptions may residents receiving 24-hour support from a caregiver or home care aide
- residents receiving care or assistance from a long-term care home or supportive housing facility
- residents under the age of 18 who receive parent/guardian support; however, children with intensive needs that require electricity for life-sustaining equipment may be considered

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Applications can be submitted only by individuals seeking to become part of the VVPR or their representative/legal guardian. All applications will be reviewed by municipal staff to confirm eligibility and verify personal information upon submission of the selfreferral online application form. When the VVPR program is activated, a warning will be sent through hfxALERT, the municipality's mass notification system, to registrants, their representatives/legal guardians, and emergency contacts. Emergency Management staff will then conduct phone calls if needed or attempt door-to-door contact through Emergency Management volunteers.

After the event, Emergency Management staff will provide check-in communications through hfxALERT to registrants, their representative/legal guardian, and emergency contacts. Prioritization checks will be conducted based on personal information included in the registration form, with door-to-door contact, as necessary.

2024 PROPERTY ASSESSMENT NOTICES

Over the next few days, property owners throughout Nova Scotia can expect to receive their 2024 Property Assessment Notices which reflect a market value as of January 1, 2023. Assessments are determined by Property Valuation Services Corporation (PVSC), the independent, municipally funded, not-for-profit assessment authority for Nova Scotia.

PVSC assesses every property in Nova Scotia every year. They collect and analyze sales and financial data to determine property values. The Property Assessment Notice (https://www.pvsc.ca/your-property-assessment-notice) you get every January shows the estimated value of your property one year ago, on January 1, based on market sales and financial data. It also reflects the characteristics and physical state of your property on December 1, one month before your Property Assessment Notice is mailed.

2024 property assessments are based on sales and financial data and reflect a market value as of January 1, 2023, and the physical state of properties as of December 1, 2023, including new construction, renovations, demolitions, and impacts from natural disasters.

This year's rate for the provincial government's Capped Assessment Program (CAP) is 3.2 per cent. The CAP rate reflects the annual Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Nova Scotia as confirmed by the Province. The CAP limits the annual increase in taxable assessment for eligible residential properties to no more than the CPI rate for the year. About 68 percent of residential assessments, and 415,576 property accounts, qualify for CAP for 2024.
