

#### WARNING OF SCAM TARGETING SENIORS



Halifax Regional Police and Halifax District RCMP have received a number of reports in relation to a scam intended to defraud seniors of their money. In each incident, the victim received a call from someone pretending to be a family member who indicated that they have been arrested and are in jail. Another person representing themselves to be from the legal system becomes involved in the call and informs the victim that they need to pay money to have their loved one released from custody. In one case, a suspect made arrangements to pick up the money in person.

If you receive a call like this, do not provide or confirm any personal or financial information and hang up the phone. In Canada, law enforcement and court officials will not attend a residence to collect money in relation to bail.

Police remind people to be suspicious of any emails or calls asking for money and to make sure the person is legitimate before providing any money. Scammers can spoof phone numbers and make it appear as though they're calling from a trusted source. You should not give personal information to anyone, whether solicitation occurs by email, telephone or in person, unless you have initiated the contact or you are certain of the identity of the individual



and/or the legitimacy of the organization they claim to represent.

Police are asking the public to share this information broadly, particularly with seniors, to help raise awareness of this scam.

Call police at 902-490-5020 if you've lost money or your identity has been compromised as the result of a scam. You can report a scam where you haven't been a victim to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, or call 1-888-495-8501.

# **QUICK START GUIDE**



Help keep HRM clean! HRM's Solid Waste Resource Team created the Litterati challenge which will determine which district's residents can pick up the most pieces of litter.

Residents can join the new Electoral District Challenges by downloading the app and searching their municipal district number, plus the word "Cleanup" (e.g. District 12 Cleanup). Residents can also join using the code "HRM" with their district number (e.g., HRM12).

In June, zero waste prize kits will be awarded to the top three litter collectors in each district for the month of May. In October 2023, a second round of prizes will be awarded for the top three litter collectors in each district for the timeframe of April 1<sup>st</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup>. #### **HRM NEW DIGITAL PROCUREMENT** PLATFORM BIDS&TENDERS

On May 1<sup>st</sup>, the municipality launched a new digital procurement platform, bids&tenders.

This new eProcurement system will modernize the HRM's bidding process. HRM will achieve better value to residents through more efficient bidding processes and a robust bidders pool. The new system will allow municipal staff to develop, post, review, and manage more compliant bids in less time on a secure and feature-rich online platform while providing suppliers and project staff with an accessible system that is aligned with HRM's Accessibility Strategy. #### ON STREET PARKING MAPS



Did you know? The Halifax Regional Municipality's on-street parking payment service provider, HotSpot, is now providing a new realtime web and mobile application map that will allow drivers to plan ahead for on-street parking options.

This real-time map will help drivers plan their trip by identifying potentially available on-street paid parking locations before they begin their trip, making it easier to get to where they're going. Rather than displaying individual spots,

the map will display parking availability by total number within a paid parking zone.

#### AFFORABLE ACCESS PROGRAM

With the Halifax Regional Municipality's Affordable Access Program you only need one application to apply for:

- → Affordable Transit Pass (applications open mid-May and processed on a first-come, first-served basis)
- → Recreation programming funding (applications are open year-round with no deadline)
- → Property tax payment assistance (deadline of August 15 for an exemption on your final tax bill)

#### PARKING FEE CHANGES IN EFFECT



Changes to annual parking permit fees, visitor parking permits, commuter permits, carshare parking and the ability to purchase second permits are now in effect.

- →Annual parking permit fees will increase from \$40/year to \$75/year. Residents can purchase a second annual parking permit for \$175/year.
- →Annual visitor parking permits will shift to payper-use: One day: \$15, Two days: \$25, Seven days: \$35.
- →Carshare vehicles will be able to park at any onstreet paid parking location.

- →Commuter permits will see price increases or price decreases, depending on the zone. Student commuter permits will change from a flat rate of \$35/month to \$10/month discount off the regular zone price.
- →All permits will shift to a digital format, removing the need for replacement fees.

These changes, supported by amendments to By-law P1200 and approved by Regional Council, will streamline purchases, increase flexibility and create efficiencies in a new digital format. #### NATIONAL DAY OF AWARENESS FOR MMIWG



May 5<sup>th</sup> is the National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG).

According to the National Inquiry into MMIWG, Indigenous women and girls represented 16% of all female homicides in Canada. Service agencies estimate that of the trafficked or exploited women and girls they served, 51% of were Indigenous.

In recent years, red dresses have become a symbolic representation of the more than 1,000 MMIWG across Canada. According to tradition, red is the only colour spirits can see, and is a way of calling the spirits of those missing and murdered back to their loved ones. On May 5<sup>th</sup>, wear red to not only honour the voices of these women and girls, but to show your support of survivors, community members and those affected by the intergenerational trauma of this ongoing issue.

It's a day where all Canadians are called to join together to take a stand against violence towards women and children and to take practical steps for our collective journey of reconciliation.

What started 11 years ago with a small gathering of men and boys intent on raising awareness of the crisis of violence against Indigenous woman and children, has now become a national ceremony inviting all Canadians to join together to end violence against all women and children.

#### 2023/24 BUDGET RATIFICATION

On April 25<sup>th</sup>, Regional Council approved the 2023/24 municipal budget of \$1.2 billion. During the meeting, we heard your concerns and are happy to have reversed paid Saturday parking! Read the report <u>here</u>.

The average residential tax bill will increase by 5.9 per cent, meaning that the average single-family home tax bill will increase by \$128 in 2023/24 to a total of \$2,288. Due to the increase in property assessment values, the municipal residential tax rate will decrease from 0.794 to 0.760.

The Property Tax Exemption and Deferral Program, part of the Affordable Access Program, offers homeowners assistance with paying property taxes. Residents can apply for a property tax exemption, rebate, deferral of current year property tax and deferral of local improvement charges. There are also payment plan options that can assist taxpayers with personal budgeting. Learn more <u>here</u>.

Overall, the 2023/24 budget invests in critical areas such as transportation, public safety, infrastructure management and addressing climate change. By doing so, the municipality is creating a foundation for sustainable growth and development in our region. This includes HalifACT projects, arts grants funding, park land development, Halifax Public Libraries' collections, and community action planning for African Nova Scotian communities. # WATER SERVICE ADVISORY, WATER DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM FLUSHING

As started on Sunday April 30<sup>th</sup>, Halifax Water crews will be conducting their annual water distribution system flush. This will continue on a five-day cycle from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This five-day flushing cycle will continue for approximately two months as crews move throughout the distribution system.

Customers may experience temporary changes in water pressure or discoloured water while work is conducted. It is recommended that customers with discoloured water run the cold water at one faucet until the water runs clear. Learn more about discoloured water <u>here</u>.
