AFRICAN HERITAGE MONTH

February is African Heritage Month. This year's provincial theme, "Our Smiles, Our Joy, Our Resilience as African Nova Scotians," encapsulates the enduring spirit and resilience demonstrated by people of African descent throughout the centuries in our province. Our smiles tell stories, share our joy, and symbolize our resilience. As we celebrate our heritage and culture, we also align with the final year of the

United Nations' International Decade for People of African Descent (DPAD) 2015-2024, aiming to strengthen global cooperation and increase awareness for people of African descent

Nova Scotia boasts 52 historic African Nova Scotian communities, each with a profound and complex history spanning over two centuries. African Heritage Month provides a special opportunity to celebrate the culture, legacy, achievements, and contributions of our people, both past and present.

Residents are also encouraged to take part in other events throughout the municipality celebrating African Heritage Month:

- City Hall will be illuminated in black, green, and red in honour of African Heritage Month, from January 25 to February 1 and February 11 to 17.
- Throughout February, the Downtown Halifax Business Commission will project light displays on the former Halifax Memorial Library Building at Grafton Park in celebration of African Heritage Month.
- The Pan-African flag will be displayed at both the Burnside and Ragged Lake Transit Centres, as the weather permits, in honour of African Heritage Month.

PARTICIPATE IN THE 2024/2025 BUDGET

The annual budget impacts every operation of our municipality, which ensures our roads are plowed during a snowstorm, there are recreational facilities to enjoy, libraries, regular garbage pickup, and so much more!

The municipality's 2024/25 Budget and Business Planning process has underway and will continue into the spring of 2024. Over the winter, each municipal business unit presents their plans to Regional Council with their intentions for the upcoming fiscal year and outlines the required budgets to achieve their goals. During this process, Regional Council will ask questions, discuss, debate, and consider each department's proposed priorities and budget. This can result in revisions to budget plans along the way.

The 2024/25 Budget and Business Plan approval date is scheduled for April 23, 2024, where Regional Council will finalize next year's budget.

MUNICIPAL BUDGET UPDATE



WINTER OPERATIONS AND SNOW SERVICE STANDARDS

Winter weather is here! With each weather event, crews are responsible for clearing approximately 4,322 lane kilometres of streets. Stretched end to end, that's the same distance as driving from Halifax to Winnipeg. Crews also clear about 1,000 kilometres of sidewalks, six kilometers of protected bike lanes/local street bikeways, 11 kilometers of multi-use pathways and approximately 2,300 bus stops across the municipality.

An important reminder to all property owners: Never clear snow from your property onto the street or sidewalk. Property owners must ensure the snow they clear is piled on their own property. It is against By-Law S-300 to throw or pile snow in the street or on the sidewalk. This is a serious problem that can cause safety issues for pedestrians and other users as it complicates clearing for crews. When this happens, crews are often forced to double back, delaying service on the rest of their routes. The municipality has enhanced enforcement in place to address non-compliance with the by-law.

The Winter Parking Ban can be enforced during declared weather events from 1-6 a.m. Regardless of the status of an overnight winter parking ban, vehicles can be towed any time during the day or night if they are interfering with snow-clearing operations, as per Section 139 of the *Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act*.

For minor (0 to 5cm accumulation) and average (5 to 15 cm accumulation) winter events, snow

clearing updates will be posted three times a day: 7 a.m., 1 p.m., 4 p.m. on halifax.ca/snow and via @hfxgov on X (Twitter). For major events (15 cm or greater of accumulation), updates will be posted four times a day: 7 a.m., 1 p.m., 4 p.m. and 8 p.m. Please note: Additional updates may be posted outside of these times as required.

COUNCIL APPROVES NEW RURAL RECREATION STRATEGY

Regional Council has approved the proposed Rural Recreation Strategy, which provides an analysis of current and future needs for Parks & Recreation services and assets in rural areas of HRM.

With this approval, the municipality will carry out the actions contained in the Rural Recreation Strategy as part of the multi-year budgeting and business planning process. These actions were shaped around six key themes:

- Equitable access to indoor facilities;
- Access to outdoor recreation opportunities;
- Volunteer support;
- Programming that meets rural needs;
- Inter-departmental and intergovernmental partnerships; and
- Advertising and communications that reflect rural communities.

AFRICAN NOVA SCOTIA ROAD TO ECONOMIC PROSPERITY INFORMATION REPORT

HOUSING ACCELERATOR FUND ANNOUCEMENT

HRM is facing significant challenges related to housing affordability and availability. Unprecedented population growth has led to a rising demand for housing that the current rate of residential construction cannot meet. As of 2023, the municipality's housing shortage is estimated at almost 20,000 units – and the shortage is growing. The Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF) is a federal program that works with municipalities to remove local barriers to residential development and fast-track the creation of homes across Canada.

As part of the federal Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF) agreement, the municipality is proposing allowing a minimum of four units in all residential zones within the Urban Service Area among other land use planning changes to enable more housing development. Regional Council has directed the CAO to expedite amendments to planning documents in the Regional Centre and Suburban Area to allow more dense housing development as-of-right.

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that applications have been opened for the next municipal Poet Laureate. The Poet Laureate's term will begin on April 1, 2024, and will end on March 31, 2027.

The municipal Poet Laureate is a resident poet, storyteller or spoken word artist who achieved excellence among their peers and whose work demonstrates connection with and relevance to the municipality's citizens. Acting as an ambassador for poetry, literature and the arts – the Poet Laureate attends events across the region to promote and attract people to the literary world while representing the municipality. The position is intended to broadly reflect the interests, issues and perspectives of the varied communities and individuals of the Halifax region.

The Poet Laureate will receive an honorarium of \$5,000 per year for their three-year mandate.

ICE THICKNESS TESTING PROGRAM NO LONGER BEING CONDUCTED

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that it will no longer conduct the <u>ice</u> thickness testing program.

Residents are reminded that the Canadian Red Cross recommends that ice be at least 15 cm thick for individual skating, and at least 20 cm thick for group skating. Extreme caution is advised in areas where streams flow into and out of lakes. It is also important to note that ice conditions may vary over the entire surface of lakes and are subject to change with weather conditions.
