Canada and to recognize the strength and contributions of people of African descent.

Emancipation Day marks the anniversary of Aug. 1, 1834, when the Slavery Abolition Act of 1833 came into effect, ending slavery in most parts of the British Empire, including Canada.

The day provides an opportunity to reflect on the ongoing impacts of systemic anti-Black racism,

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and to engage in meaningful conversations about equity, justice, and inclusion. It is also a time to honour the heritage, culture, and resilience of African Nova Scotian communities across the region.

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NATIONAL ACADIAN DAY

Since 1881, Acadians have celebrated National Acadian Day on Aug. 15, a tradition established at the first National Acadian Convention in Memramcook, N.B.

The day is marked by community gatherings, music, and the *Tintamarre*, a festive procession where participants make noise as they walk together to celebrate Acadian identity and solidarity.

National Acadian Day is an opportunity to learn about the history and cultural contributions of Acadians, and to participate in celebrations taking place across the municipality.

The Halifax region is home to the largest Acadian and Francophone population in Nova Scotia. In recognition of this important day, the municipality will host its 12th annual National Acadian Day flag raising ceremony at 12:00 noon in the Grand Parade.

UPDATE ON STRONG MAYOR POWERS MOTION



At the July 10
Regional
Council
meeting,
Regional
Council voted
in favour of a
motion
requesting

consultation from the Province of Nova Scotia if it considers introducing strong mayor powers in Halifax or other municipalities.

The motion directs the Mayor to:

- Write a letter to the Minister of Municipal Affairs requesting that the province engage in discussion with Halifax Regional Municipality and other municipalities prior to any legislative changes.
- Write a letter to the Nova Scotia
 Federation of Municipalities Board encouraging them to adopt a similar position.
- Submit both letters by July 22 and circulate any responses to Council.

Council also directed the Chief Administrative Officer to prepare a staff report on how strong mayor powers have been implemented in other Canadian jurisdictions and what lessons may apply locally.

Strong mayor powers vary depending on provincial legislation but could include authority over hiring senior staff, preparing budgets, or vetoing council decisions. How such powers would apply in Nova Scotia would be determined by the province.

UPDATE ON MORRIS STREET EAST CONNECTION



At the August 5th meeting of Regional Council, municipal staff will present

recommendations for any potential changes to the Morris Street East Connection project.





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This follows a letter from Premier Tim Houston raising concerns about the planned changes to Morris Street.

The project was last discussed at the July 8th Council meeting, where a motion was brought forward to explore alternative design options that would maintain two-way traffic on Morris Street and avoid impacts to Lower Water Street. Council voted 13–4 against the motion.

The Morris Street East Connection is part of the broader Peninsula South Complete Streets project and was originally approved in October 2024. The current design includes a two-way protected bike lane and would convert Morris Street to one-way east bound for vehicles.

HALIFAX REGIONAL COUNCIL SUPPORTS NEW COMMUNITY MEDIATION PILOT

Halifax Regional Council has approved funding and directed staff to collaborate with the United Way Maritimes to create and implement a Community Mediation pilot program.

This initiative will provide voluntary, confidential, and impartial mediation services to residents experiencing interpersonal disputes across multiple neighbourhoods in the municipality. The pilot program aims to improve community safety and cohesion by offering no-cost mediation and conflict coaching in accessible, neutral locations, including virtual options.



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The program will focus on common neighbourhood conflicts such as noise, parking, property boundaries, and nuisance issues, while excluding legal and certain sensitive matters.

This partnership leverages United Way Maritimes' extensive community presence and expertise to deliver services in diverse urban and rural areas including Spryfield, Fairview, Dartmouth North, and East Preston. A project coordinator will be hired to oversee program design and delivery, with referral pathways established through municipal staff, community partners, and self-referrals.

This program supports safer, stronger communities by offering a helpful way to solve disputes without legal action. For more information, read the staff report.

MUNICIPALITY LAUNCHES SURPLUS LANDS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING PILOT PROGRAM

Through the federal Housing Accelerator Fund, the Halifax Regional Municipality is launching the Surplus Lands for Affordable Housing Pilot Program to support non-profit housing development. The program will make four surplus municipal properties available to eligible non-profit organizations for one dollar to help offset land acquisition costs:

- 48 Pinecrest Drive, Dartmouth
- 15 Laurelcrest Drive, Eastern Passage
- 18 Scotia Drive, Bedford
- 6850 Bayers Road, Halifax

Applicants must meet existing residential zoning requirements. Successful projects will offer below-market rental units and be ready for construction by October 2026.

The municipality is holding open house sessions where you can learn more and ask questions.

COGSWELL DISTRICT PROJECT CONSTRUCTION TO REACH SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION BY END OF YEAR

The final phase of construction of the Cogswell District project marks a major milestone in transforming this key area of downtown Halifax into a vibrant, connected urban space. Over the next six months, the project will deliver significant infrastructure improvements, including the completion of Upper Water Street's realignment, modernized underground services and new corridors such as Amalamek Way and Nora Bernard Street.

Active transportation infrastructure will be expanded with the completion of the multi-use path network. With new lots prepared for future development, green spaces like Granville Park nearing completion and major roadways reopened or reconnected, this phase will bring the project's construction to substantial completion — creating a more accessible and well-connected downtown district. FREE WILDFIRE RISK ASSESSMENT FROM FIRESMART

CAMPFIRES IN MUNICIPAL PARKS



A reminder, as per By-Law P-600, open fires and campfires are not permitted within municipal parks at any time. While the municipal Open Air

Burning By-law allows campfires in wooded areas, this does not apply to the region's parks. The Parks By-law clearly states that there are to be no campfires at any time.





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NEW ONLINE TOOL FOR BURN RESTRICTIONS



The Halifax Regional Municipality has launched Before You Burn, a new online tool that provides residents and visitors with up-to-date information on whether burning is allowed in the Halifax region.

Before starting an open-air fire, check <u>Before You</u> <u>Burn</u> to stay informed and ensure compliance with municipal and provincial regulations.

WHY BYB?

- No more guesswork this tool is specific to your civic address.
- Quick visual access to the burn status for the municipality (open, restricted, ban, etc.).
- More detail including the Halifax-specific fire risk index.
- Detailed descriptions of all burning types (campfires, brush burning, etc.).

Both the Province of Nova Scotia and the municipality have burning restrictions in effect. The new <u>Before You Burn</u> tool displays the burning restrictions in effect across the municipality by comparing municipal by-laws and provincial legislation with live data from the <u>provincial fire restrictions webpage</u>.

PROVINCE-WIDE BURN BAN IN EFFECT UNTIL OCT 15 UNLESS LIFTED BEFORE

Wildfire risk season in Nova Scotia runs from March 15 to Oct. 15, during which additional burning restrictions are in place. always check Before You Burn to know what restrictions are in place.

On June 30, 2025, the Province of Nova Scotia announced a province-wide fire ban to last until at least October 15th unless conditions change and the ban can be lifted. Until then, specific restrictions apply and **violators are subject to fines of up to \$25,000**.

WHAT"S NOT ALLOWED

- Campfires, bonfires, wood fire pits
- Brush burning
- Chimineas
- Consumer fireworks

WHAT'S ALLOWED

- Charcoal BBQs
- Gas BBQs and stoves
- Devices that follow manufacturer safety instructions



WEEKLY GREEN CART COLLECTION



Weekly green cart collection has returned across the municipality, starting Monday, July 21, continuing until Friday, Sept. 12.

This enhanced summer service is a helpful way

to manage food waste during peak heat months.

While in previous years it ran through the full summer, Regional Council approved a slightly shorter collection period this year as part of the 2025–26 municipal budget process.

To ensure pickup, please have your green cart at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day—and remember to keep items secured from wildlife. The easiest way to confirm your schedule is by checking the Halifax Recycles app or visiting halifax.ca

Please note: Printed collection schedules distributed before June 10 are no longer accurate. For the most up-to-date information,


refer to the app or municipal website. Bi-weekly collection will resume starting Monday, Sept. 15.

Leaf and yard waste that doesn't fit into the green cart belongs in paper yard waste bags. Did you know that each household that receives curbside collection can place up to twenty yard waste bags out on collection day? This makes disposing of leaf and yard waste easy.

REDUCTING GREEN CART NUISANCES



Items left in our yards may unintentionally attract the attention of wildlife. Follow these tips to help reduce the chance a green cart is one of them.

- Place wet food waste in boxboard or newspaper.
- Line your green cart with a yard wastepaper bag to help absorb moisture.
- Place the green cart curbside each collection day, even if it isn't full.
- Store the cart in a ventilated, shady location.
- Food waste can be stored in the freezer until collection day.
- If you use a bungee cord to lock the cart lid, it must be removed on the morning of collection.
- Report any cart damage to 311 for repairs or replacement as needed.

HRM MOVES TO BLUESKY



As directed by
Regional Council, and
following a recent
staff report, the
municipality will be
phasing out its use of
X (formerly Twitter)
and moving to
Bluesky, a growing

platform where users can view short posts that include text, images, and videos.

This change reflects feedback from the public, emerging trends in other jurisdictions, and input from provincial and partner organizations.

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Content on Bluesky will mirror what has traditionally been posted to X—such as updates on programs, services, events, disruptions, and emergency notifications. While an account is not required to view content on Bluesky, residents can follow and engage more actively by signing up. Municipal X accounts will be discontinued by July 14, 2025.

This change does not affect Halifax Water, Halifax Regional Police, or Halifax Public Libraries, as they manage their own social media platforms independently.

LAWN MOWING

Residents are reminded that they are responsible for mowing the grass in front of their properties, including the strip between the sidewalk and the road, known as the right of way. While the municipality previously mowed some of these areas, particularly along major streets with a high number of non-residential properties, that approach changed with budget adjustments in recent years. For the 2025 season, maintenance of these grassy strips is the responsibility of the adjacent property owner.

Under the <u>Streets By-law (S-300)</u>, all property owners, including landlords and owners of commercial or private residential properties, are expected to keep the grass on their property, as well as the adjacent right of way, trimmed to a reasonable height of about six inches.

The municipality does not mow grass on privately owned properties or sites owned by other government agencies. If a complaint is received about long grass, a Compliance Officer will inspect the site. If the property is found in violation, the owner will receive an Order with a deadline to cut the grass. If the work isn't completed by that date, the municipality will hire a contractor to do the work, and the cost will be billed back to the property owner and applied as a lien on the property.

TICK CHECKS



As we spend more time outdoors, it's important to be aware of ticks and how to protect yourself. Ticks can be found in wooded areas, tall grass, and shrubs — even in urban parks and backyards.

To reduce your risk:

- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Tuck pants into socks and shirts into pants
- Do a full body check after being outdoors
 on yourself, children, and pets
- Shower within two hours of coming inside
