DISTRICT 16 RESIDENTS,

This is my final newsletter for you as your representative on Regional Council. It has been an honour and privilege to serve and represent you during the past 16 years. We have overcome many challenges and seized several opportunities during this time. Many plans and policies have

been enacted, such as the Integrated Mobility Plan and the internationally recognized HalifACT Climate Action Plan that will guide us forward.

Highlights for me in Bedford-Wentworth were the construction of the 4-pad arena, the artificial turf sports field, the performing arts cafetorium at CPA, the additional community centre, the DeWolf Park Washrooms and outdoor gym. We also saw upgrades to our LeBrun Centre, upgrades to the Bedford Leisure Club/Lawn Bowling facility. additional police and HRFE personnel in response to our population growth, a significant investigation into bringing back commuter rail, the expansion of Sandy Lake Park, and our first transit park and ride facility. None of these would have been possible without the tremendous cooperation and support of my council colleagues, municipal staff, politicians and staff from the other orders of government, community groups, and user groups. We have also worked together to achieve significant expansion and improvements to our transit service, traffic calming in many neighbourhoods, several new playgrounds, many existing playground upgrades, and the recent addition of new tennis and pickleball facilities in our community.

We have seen the continuation and growth of our beloved Bedford Days, Canada Day in Bedford, Rouge et Blanc, and Light Up Bedford Parade events. These events would not take place without volunteers and event sponsors, whose energy and passion is astonishing and appreciated!

The recent announcements of an additional fire station in our District, and the finalized funding for our new waterfront library and ferry service are extremely exciting and transformational for Bedford-Wentworth! We will finally see the hub long desired to be the core of Bedford.



Highlights for me for HRM include the downsizing of council, diversity and inclusion hiring practices, freezing residential tax increases three times, construction of the Oval and Central Library, the Cogswell Interchange project, and the tremendous and nationally leading growth of our downtown core. I have strongly supported the steps that council is taking, along with the other orders of government, to try to combat the housing shortage, and support affordable housing initiatives and measures to try to reduce homelessness. During this time, we have also worked together as a municipality and community to respond to the tremendous challenges presented by the pandemic, inflation, labour shortages, huge increases in construction costs, the housing crisis, record flooding, and the unprecedented losses from wildfires. We are still working on solutions, and there is much more to be done.

In this newsletter, I will provide an update on some the projects that you can expect to see over the next year, answers to Frequently Asked Questions, as well as an overview of the schedule for Bedford Days 2024. As always, I encourage you to contact me with your ideas and questions, I am still around until the end of October! I am happy to meet with anyone considering running for council. In this role you can help people and you can make a difference. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to work on your behalf with amazing staff, organizations, individuals and teams striving to improve our communities.



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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q - Is the Bedford Hwy going to be repaved this year?

A – The highway is in pretty good condition within District 16. However, I have been advised by municipal staff and the councillor for the area that some paving will be undertaken in the Princess Lodge and MSVU areas this season. These areas could no longer remain on hold until the larger redesign project.

Q - Is Bedford finally getting a new library?

A – Yes, please see the article on page 3.

Q - Has the Bedford Ferry service been approved?

A - Yes, please see the article on page 3.

Q – Why do the lights in DeWolf Park frequently not work?

A – These aging lights need to be replaced. HRM is piloting solar replacement lighting. They may also be added on the path between Shore Dr and Waterfront Dr.

Q – What is the status of the proposed developments on the Dartmouth Rd and Wardour St?

A – These proposals have been deferred in response to concerns from local residents. They will come forward in the future as part of the Suburban Plan, as well as an investigation into making the area around Scott Manor and the cemeteries a Heritage Conservation District. There will be significant future public consultation.

Q – Has a development been approved for the open space at the bottom of Moirs Mill Rd?

A – No, the developer has withdrawn his application.

Q – Has a development been approved for the open area at the foot of Southgate Dr?

A – Yes. A Development Agreement was approved that was supported by most local residents and the developer.

Q – What is the status of the Papermill Lake area development?

A – A Development Agreement was approved by the former Town of Bedford in 1995 and it has no expiration date. Amendments have been requested by the developer, but the decision has been deferred until a new traffic study is undertaken and an update received on the plan(s) for neighbouring lands owned by this developer on the Hammonds Plains Rd, opposite Bedford Academy.

Q – Is District 16 receiving a new fire station in West Bedford, and will our existing fire and police station remain open?

A – Yes and yes. The Convoy Run station will remain open and an additional station and HQ are being bult on the former Bens Bakery site on the Hammonds Plains Rd.

Q – What is the latest update on development in the Sandy Lake area?

A – The Sandy Lake area has been identified by the provincial government as a Special Planning Area. However, studies have been underway to determine where the development will occur, how much, and how to protect the lake, waterways, and wildlife corridors. I remain confident and determined that the lake will be protected, the protected Sandy Lake Park will be expanded, and that significant traffic and public transit improvements will be implemented as part of any future development, and partially funded by the developers.

Q - What is the status of the West Bedford Pump Track?

A – Councillor Lovelace and I have been working with HRM Parks and Clayton Deveopments over the past 2 years to acquire land for a Recreation Campus on Brookline Dr. There were delays that impacted the construction of the approved and partially funded pump track. Future plans for this land could include a pool and / or community centre, as the area continues to grow. In the meantime, Councillor Lovelace and I continue to advocate for a pump track to be built this season. If this is not possible, the funds we have dedicated will be put in a reserve fund for it for next year.

PLANNING FOR ROYAL HEMLOCKS VACANT LAND FOR RECREATION

The municipality is developing a park plan for Transom Drive Park, located at 195 Transom Drive in Bedford. The plan will consider possible improvements including the introduction of a play lawn, seating areas, and a formal pathway.

The existing playground and the tennis courts will be reviewed, including the consideration of the development of a general hard surface play area for a variety of activities such as ball hockey. The park plan will inform future capital improvements that could be expected in the coming years.

MILL COVE FERRY PROJECT

This transformative project will introduce a brand new ferry route from Mill Cove to downtown Halifax. With funding announced in March 2024, the \$260M project includes building five new 150-passenger ferries that will allow for travel to downtown Halifax in approximately 18 minutes.

It includes a new building Mill Cove that will serve as both a library and a completely rebuilt Halifax Ferry terminal. Both facilities will be net-zero buildings, aligned with HalifACT, our plan to achieve a net-zero economy by 2050. These facilities will be climate resilient and will accommodate projected rise in sea-level and storm intensity. In addition, by choosing electric ferries, the municipality is working towards decarbonizing its transportation network and providing commuters a fast, safe, and sustainable mode of transportation.

This project is an integral part of Halifax's Rapid Transit Strategy (RTS) which builds upon the Integrated Mobility Plan (IMP) to provide transportation options that are connected, accessible, affordable, and sustainable.

Procurement is already underway for the vessels and buildings, and announcements will be made later this year once vendors are selected regarding the vessel style and on the design and construction teams. More details on the building and site and design will be available once the team is onboard. In spring 2025, we expect site work at Mill Cove to begin, along with the construction of a temporary Halifax terminal downtown, which is required during the rebuilding of the permanent facility. MILL COVE LIBRARY

Bedford has experienced incredible growth, and Halifax Public Libraries is excited to add a new library as part of the Bedford Mill Cove Ferry Terminal development. The Mill Cove Library is being envisioned as a modern and sustainably designed community hub on the Bedford waterfront. Beyond the many benefits of co-locating with Halifax Transit, including serving as a gathering space to support commuters and visitors, the early plans for the library include engaging outdoor spaces, community meeting and event spaces, and technology and library materials and programs for all ages.

The current Bedford Public Library branch, located at 15 Dartmouth Road, will remain open during the development, with the intention to relocate that branch to a new leased location further west once the Mill Cove Library is open.
